## Bataan Survivor Will Get Home For 60 Days

We're glad to be able to revise an item that appeared in last night's Herald.

It said that Sgt. Charles Quinn, the Dayton soldier who spent three years as a Jap prisoner in the Philippines and who was scheduled to come home on an extended furlough, only had 10 days before he had to report back for duty and wouldn't get a chance to come here after all.

That's what his mother, Mrs. Carrie Quinn, 311 Morton avenue, told us yesterday after she talked with him over the telephone from Harrodsburg, Ky. He was in Harrodsburg to tell an aunt of her son's death in the Philippines.

Mrs. Quinn left for the Kentucky town, leaving lot of disappointed relatives here in Dayton. Last night one of them, Mrs. Melvin Quinn of 705 Osmond avenue, decided to call Harrodsburg again. She did, and found that in her excitement the young soldier's mother got the story twisted.

Sergeant Quinn has to stay in Kentucky for 10 days in order to be near the Louisville Army hospital for a series of treatments. After that he'll be here in Dayton for 60 days before the Army will have any claim on him again.
