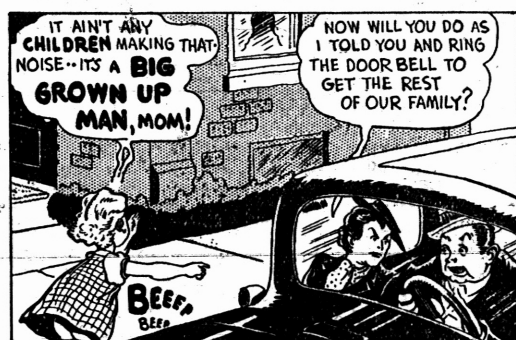
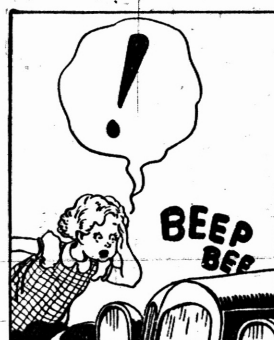
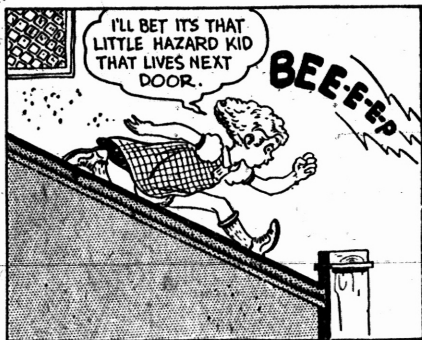

Fish, Game Laws
In Kentucky

We have had fish and game laws in Kentucky for nearly a quarter of a century. These laws establish the game limit and also fix the size of the fish that can be put on a string. The hunters and fishermen each day pay licenses in order to support the fish and game law through wardens. What has Kentucky accomplished by its fish and game laws? Persons would presume by the number of fish that have been put in the streams and the number of quail that have been put in the fields Kentucky would have more fish and more birds; with their supposed protection against dynamiting, seining, and shooting fish, and with fishing prohibited during the month of May. Yet it is indefinitely worse. The fishing is not half as good today as it was when the fish and game law was passed.

This is equally true about hunting. There is a great scarcity of quail reported every year throughout the State and they are found in numbers in wooded and practically uninhabited sections. The News would not say, of course, that the fish and game law has decreased the number of quail but it has not increased the number of either. We either have inefficient protection of game and fish under our laws or else we have people in great numbers who do not respect the law.

Game has increased enormously in Pennsylvania in the last twenty-five years under the game laws of that state. It has decreased as much in Kentucky under the game laws of Kentucky. Who is to blame?

Rust according to scientists, costs as much as interest on the public debt, which certainly is bringing up two unpleasant topics in one breath.

One of my patrons is now 86 years old. He is not a freak; he is a normal man, and has been so for four-score years and more. He has no need of my medicines or advice; he knows how to live, perhaps better than I do; but he regularly lets me take an inventory—his blood pressure, condition of his heart and circulation in particular. He just wants to know if anything is wrong that he hasn't noticed!

Now if this man can live so long and happily, why cannot you and I do as well?

He does not lie in bed too late mornings. He is up at five A. M. every day. We go to bed too late nights; he is in bed before 9:30 every night. We stuff our bodies with food at the wrong time of the day; his best meal is breakfast, his lightest meal, supper. We have high blood pressure, tubby bodies, indolent nerves, poisoned arteries, and all that goes with them. He doesn't. Yet, he is just the same sort of human being that we are.

He has done everything in the shape of hard work that came along—it hasn't hurt him any. We accuse our work of being the cause of our troubles—when it is excess food and indolent habits. My old patron has lived in the open. We are inside all day and out most nights. If our mode of living is absolutely unavoidable, then we should not complain, if we die before our Creator intended us to.

It sets the feet of the exotic flat-dweller once more upon his own land. It ministers to the elemental craving to build and to do.

In the life of my trees I shall lift my face to the sun and cast my shadow upon the earth for a hundred years. My advice to the members of my congregation is this... extend your influence... live a hundred years... plant a tree.

GEN. LEE'S COURIER
DIES AT AGE OF 96

Andrew J. Frazier, who spent most of his long life in the Kentucky mountains after serving under Lee at Gettysburg, died at his home in Prestonburg April 29. He was 96 and had outlived his wife and most of his children.

"Uncle Andy," as neighbors called him, rarely spoke of his war experiences but at times could tell a vivid story of watching Pickett's charge and said that he was one of two couriers who carried Lee's orders for the charge.

He served in Company E, 16th Virginia mounted infantry, and was one of six brothers in the Confederate army. Two died in battle and the courier surrendered at Appomattox. He came to Prestonburg a few years later.

IMPROVED; CABINS PLANNED

The new improvements at Mammoth Cave Hotel include a reworking of the dining room and the lobby. A new red beech floor has been laid in the dining room, the walls newly papered and all woodwork repainted. The lobby improvements include the new stone fireplace, a rearrangement of the desk and curio section, and new paint and paper. The improvements involve the expenditure of several hundred dollars.

Plan has also been completed for the installation of a \$20,000 water system at the Mammoth Cave Hotel. The system will be large enough to care for any growth of the hotel within the next 25 years.

The National Park Service is preparing plans for ten modern and up-to-date tourist cabins in the Mammoth Cave Area. These cabins will be the latest type construction and will be equipped with all conveniences including bath.

Dr. H. L. Donovan, president of Eastern, has received hundreds of acceptances of his invitation to high school seniors, principals, teachers, and parents and friends of 1936 graduating classes to be present for a full day's program on the campus.

Plans for the entertainment of high school seniors include greetings by Dr. Donovan, music by the men's and women's glee clubs and a one-act play by the college Little Theater club.

All the visitors will be guests of the college at lunch at Burnam Hall following an inspection tour of the campus. In the afternoon the Eastern orchestra and band will play for the visitors and a physical education demonstration will be given at the college gymnasium.

A farewell program at the recreation room in Burnam Hall will close the day's program.

Richmond day was observed by Eastern Ky. State Teachers College yesterday with a parade of the student body and faculty led by the fifty-piece college band through the business section of the city.

CARNEGIE HERO AWARD

The Carnegie Hero Fund Commission has awarded to Walter C. Cloninger, 47, Covington, Ky., automobile mechanic, a bronze medal in recognition of his heroism in saving Bernard A. McGannon, 37, from burning last July 7. Cloninger, wearing only underwear and trousers crawled through a burning room to rescue McGannon, a yellow roomer, who was too weak to crawl from a second-floor bedroom.

THE TAX MEN GOT HIM

Nicholas Vassos, Chicago restaurant owner, told State agents he was broke and unable to pay \$1,800 in State sales taxes. Tuesday they obtained a warrant charging him with evading the tax laws. Protesting, Vassos has shown a newspaper clipping of a week ago in which he claimed his home was burglarized of \$6,265, Government bonds and jewelry.

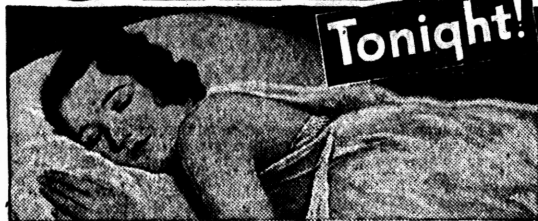
