LETTERS from Our Readers

Frankfort, Ky.
May 4th, 1936

Editor Harrodsburg Herald:

Your readers will likely be inter-
ested in learning something of the
leaders on the Democratic side of
the House and Senate. One of the
Democratic leaders of the Upper
House is Senator Franklin Rives, of
the county of Christian. This splen-
did gentleman was born in Mont-
gomery county, Tennessee, he was
brought by his father to Hopkinsville
where he has since lived. Senator
Rives graduated from Cumberland
University Law School at Lebanon,
Tenn., 1895, and has practiced law
at Hopkinsville since. He was a
candidate for State Senator in 1905
and while Christian county, was
heavily Republican he carried it by
5-0 majority; later served as Mas-
ter Commissioner for six years; was
elected State Senator in 1905 to
1909, and again in 1917 to 1921.
He was elected County Judge for four
years and later was elected Sena-
tor to fill the unexpired term of
James Breathitt, Jr., a brilliant
young man at the time of his un-
timely death. The Senator says he
belongs to two organizations, the
Methodist church and Democratic
party. He tells his friends when a
candidate he will do his best and
has never failed them. He is con-
sidered one of the ablest members of
of the State Senate and the people
of Western Kentucky are justly
proud of his record. It is safe to
say this splendid gentleman can
have anything he wants in his dis-
trict.

Senator John T. Murphy, of Cov-
ington, Ky., is a native of that city,
and is held in high esteem by the
people of Northern Kentucky, where
he has spent his entire life. When
a candidate for the Senate some
two years ago he received as many
votes as both of his splendid oppo-
nents and at the following Novem-
ber election defeated his Republi-
can opponent by more than sixteen-
thousand votes.

Senator Murphy, like William
Goebel, has fought big business and
corrupt combination and in return
has been bitterly fought by these
combinations who would like to
have him on the Ohio side of the
river when the Kentucky Legislature
is in session. Could they succeed,
they likely would have more success
in getting measures through not
wanted by the people of Northern
Kentucky.

We understand these Representa-
tives of utility and other public ser-
vice interest can get Senator Murphy
in Ohio anytime the Kentucky Leg-
islature is not in session, in fact, he
is in Cincinnati many times during
the year and seems to be seen by
these same gentlemen, who seem to
want him only when Kentucky law-
makers are in session.

The writer has watched this Sena-
tor's actions closely and believes he
is ably taking care of the people's
interest who have shown their con-
fidence in his integrity and ability
by giving such a splendid majority
while a candidate tender such
changes. We have been told the
lady who is said to be seeing him for
obtaining money from her by fraud,
paid him more than fifty-thousand
dollars in 1935 for service rendered
her in various legal actions against
her during the past few years. It
has been stated to us this same
lady has been married four times
and is expecting to become a bride
in the near future. What the writer
has seen of Senator Murphy during
the past two months on the floor of
the Kentucky Senate leads him to
believe he is an able lawyer and
one who is trying to meet the duties
of his responsible position as a state
Senator in such a manner that the
district that sent him to represent
them will say, "well done" when he
returns to his home among them.
And may we say to public utility
and other corporate attorneys you
will find Senator Murphy in Cincin-
nati much of the time during the
year 1936.

Another Senator who has attract-
ed much attention is the able broad-
minded gentleman, B. M. Williams,
who ably represents the 33rd Sena-
torial District that was poorly rep-
resented by Senator Hiram Brock.
This gentleman seems to have the
ability to always have a number of
his sons and daughters on the state's
payrolls, especially during the Laf-
foon Administration. It is stated in
Frankfort by reliable people that,
owing to Brock's influence at the
Capitol troops were sent to Harlan
county last fall to intimidate the
voters of Eastern Kentucky by hop-
ing thereby, to return Brock to the
Senate and carry that section of the
state for the Hon. Tom Rhea for
Governor.

Senator Williams is a graduate of
one or two colleges, who taught
school for twenty years and a gen-
tleman splendidly equipped to look
after the interest of the people, who
elected him to represent them. In
politics he is a Republican of the
broadminded kind that votes with
his party where he thinks they are
right, and for measures he thinks
are for the best interest of his con-
stituents and the people of the state
of which he is more than proud.
Should he continue in the way he
has started his people will show
their wisdom as returning him as
their representative, for one we be-
lieve they can depend on him to do
the right thing at the right time,
and they will more than likely let
Ex-Senator Brock repose peacefully
under the Sweet Peas for many years,
where Senator Williams so neatly
and easily placed him. Another Sena-
tor of much influence is the high
class gentleman from the city of
Owensboro, Senator Lee Gibson. He
has been a consistent supporter of
Democratic measures and policies
throughout the present session. The

Senator is a clear thinker. Easy and
winning in his manner of presenting
facts which makes him friends and
enables him to influence men to his
way of thinking. He is popular with
members of both House and Senate
and has more than met the expecta-
tions of the people of his splendid

LEXINGTON HERALD OWNERS BUY WLAP

J. Lindsay Nunn, who with his son,
Gilmore Nunn, recently bought the
Lexington Herald, purchased Radio
Station WLAP, Lexington, it was an-
nounced Tuesday. The sale was made
April 17, the day after the newspaper
was bought, but it was not confirmed
until Tuesday. The newspaper and the
radio station will be operated in
connection with each other, it was
said.

The sale is subject to approval by
the Federal Communications Commis-
sion, but such approval is usually
granted as a matter of course, and
no difficulty is anticipated in that
connection, it was said.

Mr. Nunn purchased the radio sta-
tion, which is located in the Walton
Building on the Esplanade, from the
American Broadcasting Corporation of
Kentucky and it will continue op-
eration under that corporate name.
It now operates on 250 watts until
sunset and 100 watts thereafter. It
uses a wave-length of 1,420 kilocyc-
les.

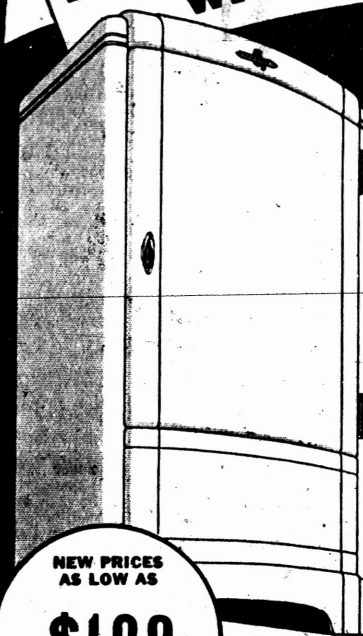
