The Plaintiff, J. T. Ingram states that he is in business as under the firm name and style of Ingram-Buick Co; that beginning with March 16 1920 to and including Dec. 14, 1920 at the times more particularly stated in the itemized account filed herewith, that he furnished, sold and delivered to the defendants either to J. Howard Vanarsdall individually, or to him acting as the agent of the defendant Lottie Vanarsdall the supplies, repairs, parts, and labor as stated in said itemized account amounting to the sum of \$108.80; that said articles were all furnished for and actually used in the maintenance, repair and up-keep and operation of a certain HupMobile Touring car Motor #15593; that said car belongs to the defendant J. Howard Vanarsdall as this plaintiff is informed and believes and as he was informed and believed at all times prior to April 1, 1921, but that he now is informed that the defendant Lottie Vanarsdall makes some claim of some kind to a title to or interest therein and he calls on her to assert herein any right to or interest in same.

He states that on June 10, 1921 he filed in the Mercer County Court Clerk's office- the County of the residence of the defendants- his affidavit and an itemized statement of said account with all credits to which the defendants are entitled, said affidavit stating the furnishing of said articles, the failure to pay for same and the fact that they were furnished for and used on, in and about the aforesaid automobile and asserting a mechanic's lien thereon for \$108.80 interest and \$1.25 costs of filing and recording said lien and releasing the same.
