KELLER

Mrs. Sue Harris Keller, who died at her home in Louisville Friday night, March 27, 1936, was buried Sunday in the family lot in Spring Hill cemetery, with service at 1:15 o'clock in the afternoon by Dr. Horace Cady Wilson, pastor of Warren Memorial Presbyterian church, Louisville, where Mrs. Keller was a devoted and esteemed member.

She was 84 years old, a native of Harrodsburg and the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Nim Harris, prominent citizens here of that period. She was the widow of Dr. William E. Keller, also of Harrodsburg, who was a former well known minister of the Presbyterian faith and by whose side she was laid to rest following the funeral in Louisville.

Surviving are a daughter, Miss Elizabeth Keller, and two sons, Garrett and Edwin Keller, and a grandson, all of Louisville.

Besides members of the family others who came here for the funeral were Mrs. Bettie MacMordie Henry and son, Mr. W. Huling Henry and Mrs. Henry, Louisville; Mrs. Sam McDowell, Danville, and friends from the church who were pall bearers.

Mrs. Fisher, a native of Georgia, lived in Jessamine county for a number of years. She is survived by her husband, T. W. Fisher, and four children.

Fisher Wilmore, Harrodsburg, and Turner Wilmore, Lexington, cousins of Mr. Fisher, went to Cochran to attend the funeral services. Mr. Fisher and his wife were guests in the Wilmore home, Beaumont avenue, last summer.

Laura Ann Patterson, the seven-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Houston Patterson died Tuesday night, March 31, 1936, at 11:35 at the home of her grandparents, near Talmage. NORRIS

Miss Anna B. Norris the seventeen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Norris died of pneumonia, Sunday, March 29, 1936 at her home at Vanardale, this county. She was a bright and popular pupil at the high school at Salvisa. She is survived by her parents, Albert and Bertha Foley Norris, one brother and two sisters. A brief prayer service was conducted at the home on Monday morning and she was taken to Mt. Sterling where the funeral was held at the grave at 2:30 in the afternoon.

BUCKLEY

Miss Eliza Buckley, one of the best known women of the Curdsville community in east Mercer county, died Tuesday, March 31, 1936 just after the noon hour, of pneumonia. She had suffered an attack in February from which she had never regained her normal health, and she was unable to combat renewed trouble later. She was the daughter of the late Thomas and Eliza Burns Buckley and was born in Manchester, England, July 7, 1888. Her parents moved to the United States when she was young. They settled near Curdsville some years ago and became splendid citizens of this county. Miss Buckley possessed many fine traits of character and was much liked. Since the death of her parents she and her brother, Mr. John Buckley, have resided on the home farm. Besides her brother, she leaves one sister, Mrs. Violet Wettig, of Covington.

Miss Buckley was a member of the Harrodsburg Methodist church, and her pastor, Rev. G. R. Tomlin, conducted the funeral which was at the home on Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. Burial was at Highland cemetery, in Covington, where the family formerly resided.

VANARSDALE

Mrs. James F. VanArsdale, 75 years old, died unexpectedly about 12:30, Wednesday morning, April 1, 1936 at her apartment at Hotel Harrodsburg. While her health had been declining for a year or two, she had seemed in no immediate danger even after a heart attack earlier in the evening from which she was resting easier until she suffered a collapse near midnight.

Mrs. VanArsdale was formerly Miss Ella Owens, of Somerset, a daughter of the late Dr. Samuel Owens and Mary Newell Owens, members of splendid old families of that place. After her marriage in 1883 to the late James F. VanArsdale, a prominent attorney here, who died some years ago, she made her home in this city where she held the love and esteem of everyone. Combining a high type of Christian character with culture and graciousness, she was one of the valuable and popular women of the community. Devotion to her family and church were her strong characteristics, and to them she gave true and unselfish service.

Surviving are two sons and two daughters: Mr. Harold P. VanArsdale, architect, of Cincinnati; Mr. S. Owens VanArsdale, Detroit, traveling auditor for General Motors Company, who with Mrs. VanArsdale arrived at his mother's bedside only a few days ago after a year's business trip for his company in Australia and the Orient; Mrs. L. Meriwether Smith, Washington, D. C., wife of Lt. Col. Smith of the Judge Advocate's General's department of the U. S. Army, and Mrs. Don Yuell, Honolulu, wife of Capt. Yuell now stationed in the Hawaiian Islands. Surviving also are three grandchildren, Miss Virginia Smith, Washington; Don Yuell, Jr., and Owens Yuell, of Honolulu, and one sister, Mrs. Evans Tibbals, of Somersets.

Mrs. VanArsdale's funeral was at the United Presbyterian church Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, conducted by her pastor, Dr. John W. Carpenter, assisted by Rev. T. Hassell Bowen, pastor of the Christian church. Burial was in the family lot beside her husband in Spring Hill Cemetery.

STONE

Mrs. Artie Stone, 61 years old, died Tuesday night at 9:10 o'clock, March 31, 1936 at her home on the Brumfield road, near this city, after a short illness with pneumonia. She was the wife of George T. Stone, who is also critically ill with the same disease. She was the daughter of Charles and Mary Crume Jacobs, and a member of the Methodist church. Surviving are her husband, two daughters, Mrs. Ed Roberts, Miss Virginia Stone, and one son, Thomas Stone, all of Harrodsburg. She also leaves five grandchildren and her mother, Mrs. Charles A. Jacobs, a sister, Mrs. Lizzie J. Walsh, both of Lexington, and a brother, Fred Jacobs, Orange City, Fla.

Mrs. Stone's funeral will be at St. Andrew's Catholic church here this morning at 10 o'clock with burial in Spring Hill cemetery. Rev. Clarence Meyers will conduct the services.

Mrs. Malinda Anderson died Wednesday night at 9:45 o'clock at her home in this city. She was born March 1, 1861, being 75 years old at the time of her passing. She was the widow of Luke Anderson. B. & O. RAILROAD PLANNING TO CUT PASSENGER FARES

The Baltimore and Ohio railroad announced this week that, if necessary, it would stand alone in the East in reducing passenger fares from 3.6 to 2 cents a mile to win back business from buses and automobiles and to gain new patronage.

Daniel Willard, B. & O. president, who waged a five-year fight for the reduced fares as a means of rejuvenating railway passenger business, said, regardless of the position of other lines, his road was moving to put the new rates into effect by June 3.
