SOIL CONSERVATION PROGRAM OUTLINED

(Continued from page 1) payments offered by the Government in accordance with the act will help him to do this." President Franklin D. Roosevelt stated and added: "This new program represents a sincere effort both to conserve the soil in the interests of producers and consumers and to prevent the economic gains that farmers have made during the past three years."

On Thursday, April 2, a meeting of the temporary county committee of the Soil Conservation Program and a group of other farmers interested in such a program met at the County Agent's office at which time E. A. Johnson, Specialist, from the Kentucky Experiment Station, outlined the program as given above. Notices of community meetings will appear in next week's issue of The Herald.

In commenting on the program, County Agent Park states that the new Soil Conservation Program is not in any sense a commodity program as the old A. A. A. program was. He also states that this program is not a control program and there is no control of crops other than insofar as conservation of the soil is concerned at all to this extent there is available to grants to farmers under the recent Act of Congress, \$470,000,000 per year.
