payments offered by the Govern-  
ment in accordance with the act will  
help him to do this," President  
Franklin D. Roosevelt stated and  
added: "This new program repre-  
sents a sincere effort both to con-  
serve the soil in the interests to pro-  
ducers and consumers and to pre-  
serve the economic gains that farm-  
ers have made during the past three  
years."

On Thursday, April 2, a meeting  
of the temporary county commit-  
tee of the Soil Conservation Pro-  
gram and a group of other farmers  
interested in such a program met at  
the County Agent's office at which  
time E. A. Johnson, Specialist, from  
the Kentucky Experiment Station,  
outlined the program as given above.

The Herald.
