## HEROES OF AMERICAN HISTORY



### HE PUT THE WORLD ON WHEELS

Henry Ford was born on a farm near Dearborn, Michigan. He had little schooling, his interest from the first turning to machinery. At 18, he left home for Detroit and went to work in a machine shop, with watch repairing as an evening occupation, a trade in which he had become expert by repairing all the watches of the neighboring farmers at home.

Ford set out to build a popular, low-priced automobile. His first car was a success, and from it grew the present Ford Motor Co., the largest motor car company in the world, and incidentally made Ford one of the richest men of all time.

Ford introduced new methods of mass production that revolutionized industry and enabled him to place an automobile at the disposal of people of moderate means. Through his genius, the isolated farmer and the dwellers in small communities were brought into close contact with urban civilization. Although in mechanics he is a master mind, Ford's ventures in the fields of politics and social reform, as in the case of the "Peace Ship," have generally been failures.

**Skibo Castle**  
Neither Andrew Carnegie's autobiography nor other authorities state the price he paid for Skibo castle and estate in 1898, which gave him the nickname "Laird of Skibo." Carnegie was a native of Dunfermline, Scotland, and a year after his marriage in 1887 he purchased Cluny castle. Ten years later he bought Skibo castle, near Dornoch, in the Highlands of Scotland, for a summer home, adding to it and making an estate of 40,000 acres. The old castle, built about 700 years, had been the residence of the bishops of Caithness, then the property of the Mackays and the Dempsters.

**Pure Copper Pink Color.**  
Pure copper is not exactly copper colored, but rather a silvery pink. The coppery shade is the result of the partial obscuring of this natural color by a thin coating of the darker colored copper oxide. But the colors shown by gold and some of its alloys, writes Dr. Thomas M. Beck, in the Chicago Tribune, are not due to any such oxide film, since gold is exceedingly reluctant to combine with oxygen. Rather they are due to the actual color of the metal.

**Indians Are Strong**  
Tarahumara Indians in the southern part of Chihuahua, Mex., are so prodigiously strong that in hewing bridge timbers they will turn out twice as much labor daily as the average Mexican. The secret of the Tarahumara's speed is that in wielding an adz, he cuts clean through and hits the wood again on the back-stroke.

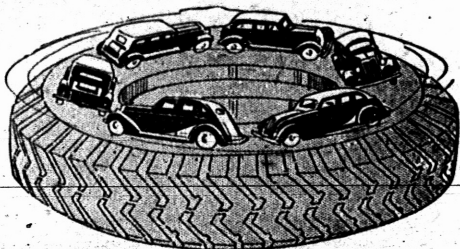

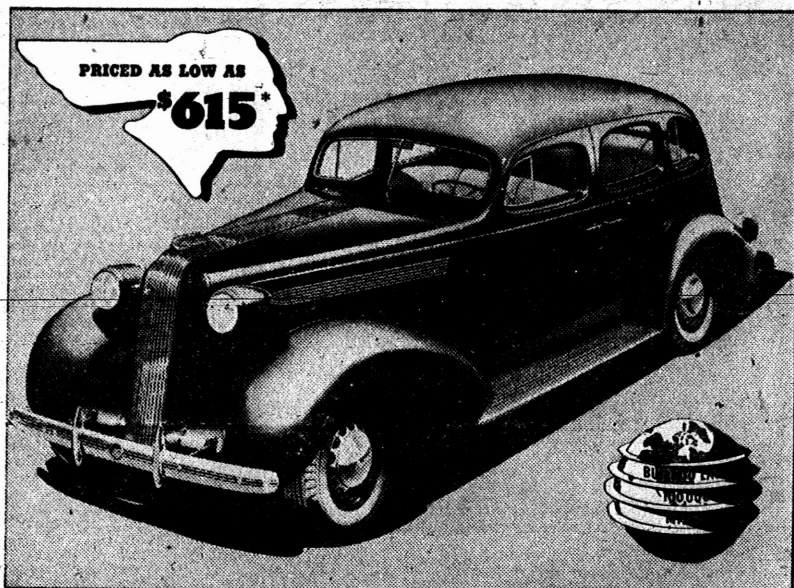
