### Spain Turns A Castle Unto Library

Other parts of Europe may be re-arming, but Spain calls attention to the fact that it has just turned its old castle of Simancas at Valladolid into a library. Its warlike atmosphere has been transformed. Fifty-two rooms have been given over to books. Some were there long before, as the castle was owned at one time by the King, Charles V, who in 1549 laid the foundations of a small but valuable book collection. Details of the political negotiations with Germany, Saxony, Poland, Prussia and Hamburg since 1403 and with France since 1567, figure in the archives. Legal, political, social and municipal history is recorded among the millions of pages on these shelves.

In addition, interesting domestic details are available, and the modern housewife may find with envy that in the days of the sixteenth century a loaf of bread cost half a cent, eighteen kilos of olive oil cost 45 cents, four pounds of beef cost half a cent and a quart of milk a fifth of a cent.

#### Morris

The above Coat of Arms was used by Lewis Morris, Lord of the Manor of Morrisania in 1697. The Emigrant was of Welsh extraction, the family originating from Tintern County Monmouth. The Welsh spelling of the name was Mawr Rys or the Great Rys. Lewis Morris was the first governor of New Jersey in 1738. He died in 1746 at the age of 73. His oldest son was a Brigadier General in the Continental Army and one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. Another son, Governor, was Minister to France and a United States Senator. A third son Richard was a Judge of the admiralty. There is another, also well known family of Morris, descendants of Amos Morris of East Haven Ct.

### Sportsmanlike Driving Subject of Pamphlet

Manual Sent Out By Blue Grass Automobile Club to All School Superintendents in State.

A specially prepared manual for use in teaching safety in the public high schools has been forwarded to all school superintendents in central and southeastern Kentucky. It was announced by Glen Weinman, secretary of the Blue Grass Automobile Club.

The booklet which has been prepared by the motor organization is entitled "Sportsmanlike Driving" and will aid instructors in making the subject of safety a regular part of the school curriculum, Mr. Weinman stated.

The manual points out the need of safety education in the schools by showing the traffic accident records during period 1922-1933. During the ten year period, the traffic death rate for children in the five to nine year group decreased 25 per cent; for the age group ten to fourteen increased 3 per cent; while in sharp contrast to these, the death rate for the fifteen to nineteen age group increased 130 per cent.

Facts are also shown that during the lives of every 100 youths 18 years old, 12 will be killed or seriously injured and 65 will sustain minor injuries or a total of 77 will be killed or injured in traffic accidents of the present trend continues.

The Automobile Club has also made available to the grade schools a series of safety posters which are to be distributed monthly. Each poster portrays some idea which is to aid the instruction of safety.

Mr. Weinman stated that the program was being introduced at the request of many teachers who are vitally interested in the subject of safety but have been handicapped in introducing a suitable course due to the lack of proper material.

### OLD SPANISH DOLLAR (Courier-Journal)

Discovery of a Spanish dollar, minted in 1779, uncovered by a Woodford county plow, is a rare find, but not difficult to account for. What it is worth as a souvenir probably is no greater than its value in Virginia paper money at the time it was lost.

Kentucky was using foreign coins brought in by General Wilkinson's New Orleans tobacco trade, "the doubloons and piasters of Spain, the louis and ducats of France, the ducatoons and the rix dollars of Holland, the goulds and ducats of Austria, the frederics and florins of Prussia, the cruzadores and moldores of Portugal, the lires and pistoles of Italy, the sequins and tomonas of Arabia and the maces and rupees of India"; but most of them drained off East for things Kentucky didn't manufacture.

There never was enough money, and when it was unavailable, skins, tobacco, warehouse receipts or Virginia land warrants served as the medium of exchange. Barter was prevalent after Kentucky attained statehood. Coins which circulated on their intrinsic value were at a premium. Early Governors were concerned about industrial development to conserve the supply of money. Credit was scarce and interest rates high, but embargoes and the War of 1812 gave an impetus to manufacturing. Paper money, however, produced inflation and consequent disaster. That Spanish coin is a memento of distress that has survived from the days of the Spanish Conspiracy, through the "Old and New Court Fight" and the collapse of "Coolidge Prosperity" to witness the importance of a medium of exchange adjusted to economic conditions.

### "MONTH THE MOON SLEPT"

A new glass has been made by the admixture of a little iron which will stop more than 50 per cent of the sun's heat.

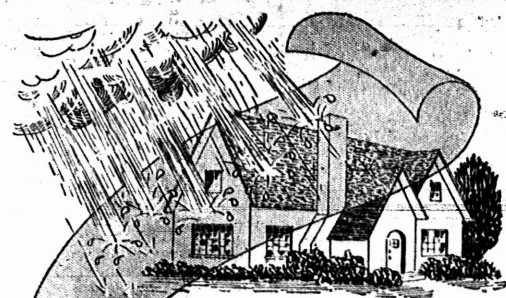

### CCC BOYS GET CREDIT FOR DUCK-REFUGE WORK

Much of the success of the waterfowl refuge programs of the United States Biological Survey is due to the work of 22 CCC camps. Under the direction of survey engineers and biologists, the CCC boys have done a thousand and one necessary jobs, says J. C. Salyer, Chief of the Bureau's waterfowl division.

An outstanding example is the seed gathering and food and cover planting for wildlife. Tons of seeds and tubers were collected last fall on many refuges by the CCC and stored for planting.

In addition to developing the natural supply of foods CCC workers planted patches of corn, wheat, barley and millet and hauled screenings donated by elevators to the refuges for feed. More than 80 tons was stored for this winter in granaries built with CCC labor.

On some areas the Bureau found it necessary to raise stock in nurseries and many an embryo nurseryman was discovered among the workers.

### MORE COPPER IN A NICKLE THAN IN A ONE-CENT PIECE

A nickel has all the appearance of being solid nickel while a penny appears to be all copper. But there is actually more copper in a nickel than in a one-cent piece. In a nickel there are 56.87 grains of copper, while in a one-cent piece there are only 45.60 grains.
