

During the month of April, 1920 there was three thousand five hundred and seventy (3570) copies of the Louisville Times sent to Ben Steele at Harrodsburg, Kentucky at a price of one cent (1¢) per copy making a total of thirty five dollars and seventy cents (\$35.70) due for papers sent during the month of April, 1920. From May 1st to May 22nd inclusive 1920, there was two thousand six hundred and sixty (2,660) copies of the Times sent to Mr. Steele at Harrodsburg, Kentucky at a price of one cent (1¢) per copy making a total due for papers sent during May, of twenty-six dollars and sixty cents (\$26.60). The amount of the April account of thirty five dollars and seventy cents (\$35.70) and the amount of the May account of twenty-six and sixty cents (\$26.60) makes a total of sixty two dollars and thirty cents (\$62.30). On May 25th, 1920, we received a remittance from Mr. Steele on his Times account amounting to twenty three dollars and seventy cents (\$23.70) which leaves a balance due of thirty eight dollars and sixty cents (\$38.60) which has never been paid.

Now taking up the account of the Louisville Courier-Journal: During the month of April, 1920, there was a total of one thousand and forty (1040) copies of the Daily Courier-Journal sent to Mr. Steele and seven hundred and sixty (760) copies of the Sunday Courier-Journal sent to Mr. Steele at Harrodsburg. The price of the Daily Courier-Journal was one cent (1¢) per copy or a total of ten dollars and forty cents (\$10.40). The price of the Sunday Courier-Journal was four and one-half cents ($4\frac{1}{2}$ ¢) per copy or a total of thirty four dollars and twenty cents (\$34.20) making the total amount for the month of April, 1920 on the Courier-Journal account, forty four dollars and sixty cents (\$44.60). During May of 1920, there was a total of seven hundred and sixty (760) copies of the daily Courier-Journal sent to Mr. Steele and seven hundred
