

of the Sunday Courier-Journal was four and one half cents ($4\frac{1}{2}\$$) per copy making a total for the month of May, thirty four dollars and fifty six cents (\$34.56). The Daily Courier-Journal and Sunday Courier-Journal combined for the month of May makes a total of forty two dollars and sixteen cents (\$42.16). April account of forty-four dollars and sixty cents (\$44.60) plus the May account of forty two dollars and sixteen cents (\$42.16) makes a total of eighty six and seventy six cents (\$86.76). On May 25th, we received a remittance from Mr. Steele amounting to fifty dollars and eighty six (\$50.86) and on May 28th, an additional remittance of fifteen dollars and thirty cents (\$15.30) total of which amounts to sixty six dollars and sixteen cents (\$66.16), this will leave a balance due of twenty dollars and sixty cents (\$20.60) which has not been paid.

Q. 5. Do you know anything further in reference to this account which would be of benefit to either parties?

A. I do not, as this is an exact copy of my records and that is all I know about the matter.

Said witness in answer to questions propounded by Ben C. Allin, attorney for defendant, deposed as follows:

Q. 1. Is it not a fact that you were having considerable trouble with your agents at Harrodsburg, prior to the time Steele was appointed?

A. We had been having some trouble in Harrodsburg in finding dependable agents -- agents who recognized the necessity for paying their bills. This condition was not limited to Harrodsburg alone. It is common in many localities.

Q. 2. Do you know of your own personal knowledge the number of subscribers you had at that time for the papers, Courier and Times?
