\$100,000 GAIN SHOWN IN SALES TAX COLLECTION

Collections from the 3 per cent sales tax for November of this year amounted to \$936,917 compared with \$803,983 for November, 1934. W. R. Robinson, retiring head of the gross receipts tax division of the state tax commission, announced Tuesday.

Collections for December of this year have not been tabulated and are not due to be reported until next month—December, 1934, collections totaled \$950,039.

PIONEER PARK NOTES

It is really worth a visit to see Old Fort Harrod under its heavy mantle of snow. No Christmas card could be more beautiful than the snow bedecked block-houses and cabins, and the bare limbs of the trees outlined in feathery white flakes. Even the silent frozen spring inside the fort is an object of magical beauty touched by the wand of King Winter.

One of the principle visitors during the past week has been old man Winter, clad up to his eyes in ermine and wearing long penants of glittering ice-jewels. He brought with him his rollicking son, Hy Wind and several snow maidens, and took possession of things in general. After paths had been carefully made from one cabin to another, mischievous Hy Wind would at once proceed to fill them up with snow drifts and quite obliterate them, while the brown log cabins took on the appearance of layer chocolate cakes with a heavy topping of thick snow-white icing. Some of the old pioneers would have felt quite at home again could they have looked upon the wintry scene. All that was

needed was the ruddy gleam of wood fires in the great stone fire places, and the fur-clad hunter coming in with his long rifle, and over his broad shoulders the game he had been fortunate enough to secure for a meagre larder and a hungry and expectant family, who were waiting to give him a joyous welcome.
