

IN SPRINGTIME

"That tired feeling" that we have heard of for several years has been made a topic of ridicule and humorous quip. It has been called "Spring fever" by those who regard it as acute laziness. But there are those to whom the tired feeling incident to spring-time means a curable disorder, a disorder that interferes really enough with capable functioning; it is this condition that I am now talking about—seeking to correct.

Any undue tiring of the body in normal action, should be regarded with concern. It means that something is wrong—and may lead to something more serious if unattended to. The perfectly healthy human body does not tire easily, and it is almost impossible to wear it out by the sweat-shop employee, the toiler in extreme temperatures, often overtime can hardly expect to keep fit for a very long period of time. These break down prematurely.

If you are tired on rising in the morning, you are warned in advance. You probably ate too much at the last evening's feed; you are poisoned, that's all there is about it. Clean out, clean up, and stop your dissipation in diet. Give attention to your elimination through bowel and kidneys; use fruits and green vegetables; plenty of water. If, after a week of self-regulation,

you are no keener of mornings, take your physician a specimen from your kidneys.

AMERICA'S BIGGEST BILL

(Hopkinsville New Era)

Talking about the fact that the United States government is heading toward a \$35,000,000,000 debt doesn't mean much to most of us. The figures are too big for us to understand and besides it is sort of like saying our neighbor is up to his neck in debt.

By some comparisons just developed by the United States News, a newspaper published in the nation's capital, brings the facts home to us in an intelligible way.

For example, the News shows that the 125,000,000 people in the nation spent \$2,000,000 a year for light and power, \$6,000,000,000 for clothing, \$10,000,000,000 for rent, and \$11,500,000,000 for food. And for taxes, to operate federal, state and local governments, the News finds they spend \$12,000,000,000 making that the nation's biggest bill.

Going a little further than the News went, we find some equally surprising facts. For every man, woman and child in the country, some body spends an average of \$15 a year for light and power, \$40 for clothing, \$80 for rent and \$92 for food. But the tax cost per person is \$96.

Take the average family of four—father, mother, daughter, son. Each day, that family contributes \$1.08 in taxes while it spends only \$1.00 for food, 87 cents for rent and 45 cents for clothing. That, of course, is only an average. The man who is unfortunate enough to own his own home or an automobile or anything—literally anything, for everything nowadays bears a tax—has a much heavier load.

More than \$38,200,000 was spent by the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company in 1935 in taxes, wages and plant additions, improvements and replacements to meet the demands for high grade telephone service in the section it serves.

Most of the thirty-eight million dollars found its way back into the avenues of trade in the South.

To care for the 55,950 new telephones added and the eight per cent increase in the volume of traffic, the Company increased its personnel, expanded its plant and made a substantial improvement in the quality of its service.
