Miss Edna Robinson has been ill with pneumonia and is getting along nicely.

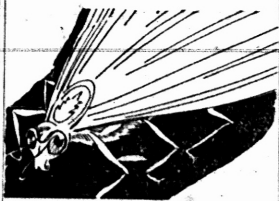
