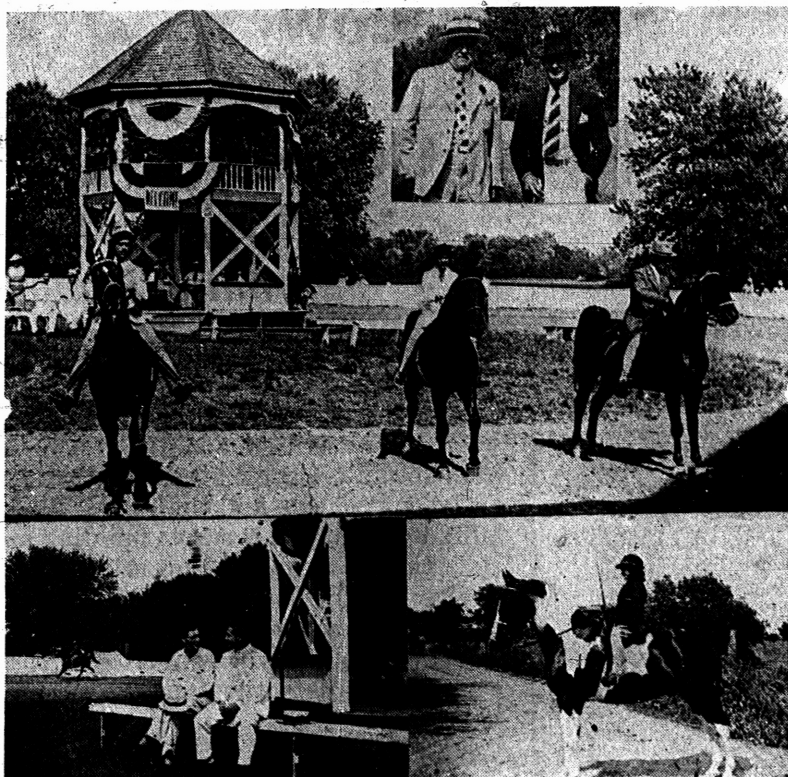


Snapshots Of Scenes In Show Ring at Harrodsburg
