The plaintiff J. L. Gritton states that William Brown and Raymond Brown are indebted to him for goods, wares and merchandise and foods stuffs, such as flour, meal and lard and other provisions for the family, and chiefly for provisions, in the sum of \$32.00 which is past due and which they have promised to pay again and again, but have paid no part thereof; that said amount is due under contract and that he ought to recover of defendants the sum above stated; that ~~neither~~ said defendants and neither of them have property in this State subject to execution sufficient to pay the ~~and~~ said debt and that his debt will be in danger of being lost in obtaining judgment ~~and~~ a return of no property found.

He prays for judgment for thirty two dollars with interest from this date and his costs herein expended, for a general order of attachment against defendants and ~~from~~ that J. M. Ransdell and Burley Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association be summoned to answer herein as garnishees.
