Language of Jesus

While scholars are not agreed as to the language spoken by Jesus, it is generally supposed that it was the Galilean dialect of the Aramaic or Syriac language, a corrupted form of the Hebrew proper. This was the language of the common people, while Hebrew remained the learned and sacred language of the Jews. Both Latin and Greek were also used in Palestine, particularly by the Roman rulers and the trading classes.

Democratic King

Nicholas I, who ruled Montenegro from 1860 to 1918, was one of the most democratic kings of modern times. In Cetinje, the capital, where his subjects called him "Boss" and he called them by their first names, he also acted as judge, poet, physician, theater director and even postmaster, personally selling his stamps—often with a free drink on the side—in a room of his palace.—Collier's Weekly.

Famous Courtesan

Thais was an Athenian courtesan, famous for wit and beauty. She accompanied Alexander the Great to Asia and induced him, during a festival, to set fire to the palace of the Persian kings at Persepolis. After the death of Alexander she lived with Ptoemy Lag, king of Egypt, who is said to have married her.

Greatest Sword-Swallower

The greatest sword-swallower in history was "Chevalier Cluquot," who reached the peak of his fame in America and Europe during the 1890s. His outstanding performance took place in New York city when he swallowed, at one time, 14 swords up to their hilts.—Collier's Weekly.

Ancient Durazzo

Durazzo, a port of the youthful kingdom of Albania, was founded as Epidamnus at the end of the Seventh century B. C. Quarrels over its ownership led to the Peloponnesian war of 431 B. C. It changed hands many times until the Kingdom of Albania was created in 1913.

The Ballet Russe

The Ballet Russe of Monte Carlo was organized in 1932 by W. de Basil, a Cossack colonel, who managed a Russian opera house in Paris. The princess of Monaco assisted him in assembling children of Russian emigres who were trained in the old Imperial Ballet school.
