SHORTAGE OF POTATOES GREATEST SINCE 1919

The greatest potato shortage since 1919 is stepping up prices daily, N. Y. commission merchants report. They see no break in prospect for the next six weeks or two months.

Fewer potatoes were planted, Government experts said, and unfavorable weather further diminished the supply.

The average retail price today for old potatoes was 27 cents or more for five pounds, more than three times what they cost a year ago.

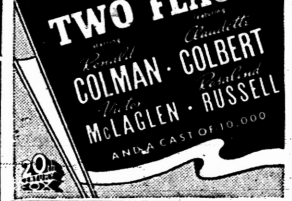

EUROPE'S OPINION OF US

In spite of their preparations for the greatest crime, war, European nations as a rule have far less common crime than we have.

News wires from New York recently carried this brief:

"A group of European tourists, arriving today in the liner Girolstein, refused to land until Customs Officer Arthur Webb assured them they would not be shot immediately by gangsters."

Trivial and absurd on the face of it, of course. It makes little difference what a handful of European tourists think of us over here. But the significance of this affair lies in the reasons back of this odd European conception of America and Americans.

We have, tolerated the criminals and condoned the corruption of public office for so long that it is difficult now to stand out before the world as a nation of essentially honest people. Our crass indifference to lawlessness not only injured our national character, but it smeared our reputation at the same time.

Of course, as students of sociology have long contended, we have had so much corruption within the law and so much social crime through laws for a powerful few, and we have had such a complete carrying out of the theory of individualism which says that every man must be for himself and the devil take the tailmost, that it is little wonder we now see all sorts of crime in the common sense.

Our society has been largely predicated on what is, in the last analysis, an anti-social conception—to wit, it's all right if you can get away with it. And the bigger and more powerful you are the easier you can get away with it.

KENTUCKY WILL FOLLOW U. S. INCOME TAX PLAN

Administration of the income tax law passed by the recent special session of the general assembly will be modeled after the federal income tax system, James W. Martin, chairman of the state tax commission, announced. The commission has started preparation of rules and regulations for putting the law into effect on August 7.

The law taxes individual net incomes not in excess of \$3,000 two per cent; those of more than \$3,000 and not in excess of \$4,000, three per cent; those of more than \$4,000 and not in excess of \$5,000, five per cent. Single persons are exempt \$1,000. Heads of families or husband and wife are exempt \$2,500 plus \$400 for each dependent. Corporations doing business in the state are taxed four per cent of the net income of such business. Non-residents and foreign corporations are taxed in the same proportion as the percentage of their income derived from sources in Kentucky.

BONUS BONDS CROOK-PROOF

Postoffice inspectors and secret service men said Monday they are prepared to move swiftly against anyone who seeks to rob veterans of their bonus payments. The two agencies said that plans for the large scale bonus disbursement which started June 15 are "as nearly crook-proof as they can be made."

"The criminal possibilities should be very small," one postoffice said, "the bonus will be delivered only to addressee in person. Most of these people are known to their mailmen."

"The bonds are worthless to anyone but the man named on them. Before he could get cash for the bonds, a person would have to be personally identified as being the veteran named. Again, he'd have to pass the scrutiny of a banker in attempting to cash the check sent in payment."

Gibbs

Sir Henry Gibbs of Honington County, England and his descendants claimed the coat of arms that appears here. Warwick, son of Sir Ralph Gibbs, was the father of Robert Gibbs a prominent Boston merchant who came to America about 1660.

A grandson of Robert Gibbs was buried in 1769 in the Old North Burial Ground at Providence, Rhode Island where the coat of arms presented here are to be found on his tombstone and that of his wife, a daughter of Col. Joseph Whipple.

It is believed that a great many of the Gibbs families in America can trace their ancestry to the above Robert Gibbs.

Description of Arms: On a black shield three silver battle axes.

Crest: Three broken tilting spears bound with a wreath.

Motto: Firm of purpose.

MODERNIZING OF OLD HOME IS COMPLETED

Modernizing of an old residence built in 1825 on a 3,600-acre estate purchased some time ago by John Perry, New York, president of the American Press Association, has been completed at a cost of \$85,000. It was announced by Stratton O. Hammon, architect. The estate is situated in Owen county and fronts the Kentucky River for a distance of seven miles.

Mr. Perry purchased the estate for use as a summer home, it was stated. The estate is being managed by Mr. Perry's brother, N. A. Perry, who recently sold his interest in the Carrollton News-Democrat in order to devote his full time to the upkeep of the estate.

BONUS DOLLARS EXPECTED TO DELAY THE DECLINE IN TRADE

Soldiers' bonus dollars, \$2,000,000,000 strong, are expected to ward off for several weeks the normal summer trade decline, a canvass of the Nation's business men indicates.

Whether the veterans' funds are promptly clamped, into banks, used against debts, or laid on retail counters, merchants from coast to coast say the effect will be the same—an abnormal quickening of the pulse of trade.

On Monday, June 15, the march will start. Farmer service men who want automobiles, clothes, farms, houses, horses, teacups for their wives, shoes for their children—and freedom from debt—all will file toward their respective goals with cash in hand.

A large part of the money will pay off old debts. In turn, retail analysts argue, landlords, doctors, dentists, grocers, garage mechanics and other creditors probably will buy—from thumbies to chickenwire.

Much of the money already is "in hock," say merchandisers in some sections. That part of the total which will actually move into cash tills in exchange for goods, the survey indicates, will go for miscellaneous needs which long have been clamoring for fulfillment.

RADIO BEAMS DIRECT PLANES

Air planes are now able to hold to their courses by means of the radio beam. Radio beams are invisible electric beams heard thru the pilot's head phone. By a series of signals, the pilot can tell when he gets off the course. The signals are so designed that the pilot can tell whether he is to the right or left of the course, and when he is directly on it. The projectors which project these beams are located 200 miles apart. There are 140 of such stations operated by the Federal Department of Commerce along the 22,000 miles of lighted airways.

JUNE 30, KENTUCKY DAY AT TEXAS EXPOSITION

Kentuckians, who played a major role in the winning of Texas Independence, 100 years ago, will take charge of the \$25,000,000 Texas Centennial-Exposition on June 30 which has been officially designated as Kentucky Day.

The special program for that date is being arranged by the Centennial Exposition Kentucky Club, of which Mrs. W. G. Maddox, formerly of Covington, Ky., is president. The club numbers some 500 former Kentuckians living now in Dallas.

PARKING SPACE

In a midwestern town which has developed a Saturday parking problem, the merchants voted on a plan to leave their cars at home Saturdays. Placards in each store window announce: "For Your Convenience We Have Parked Our Cars Elsewhere." The courtesy was much appreciated by the trade that drove to town from a distance.

A SMALL FIRE CAN BE STOPPED

When a fire breaks out, we sound the alarm; we hurry-skurry, breathless, excited—call the department—turn on the hose—a house is burning! If the fire is discovered in time, the building is saved.

Now these bodies of ours are the veritable houses we

live in, and they sometimes catch fire, as physicians know. Then we begin to procrastinate; we wonder if the fever-fire won't die out of itself, if we keep on at work and

let it alone. We hate to go to a doctor—and we can't really afford to lay off and be sick! You know how it is.

The fire grows into a holocaust. The physician fire-chief, is called in a hurry; he finds the building in great danger of destruction, if not a total loss—just by neglect of the small fire.

If you are running a temperature—a little every afternoon—which breaks into a perspiration just after going to bed at night, consult your physician at once. The stitch in time may save a hundred later on. A fever invariably means that something is radically wrong; it is a

warning. A battle is going on inside—the forces of good against the demons of evil. The cause of the warfare must be removed.

If your child is running a temperature, look after his throat, his lungs, his digestive tract; he has a poison somewhere. Find it and force its elimination. But, be sure you are right before you do anything. You cannot afford mistakes. They cost lots of money, and may cost a life. Don't neglect the small fire; it is the easier put out. "First aid" is, to clean house. Apply water outside and inside. And put nothing into the body that might feed the flame. Call the doctor in time.

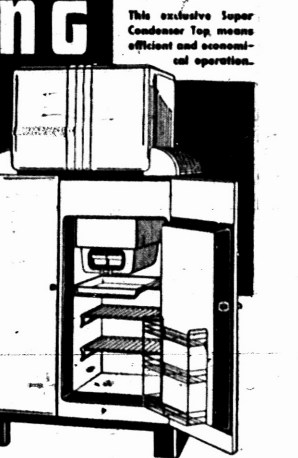

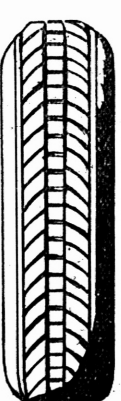
