The Administration turned over a new leaf this year with the change of principal and the establishment of a new office, assistant-principal. This new program was developed to help the principal with her multiple duties.

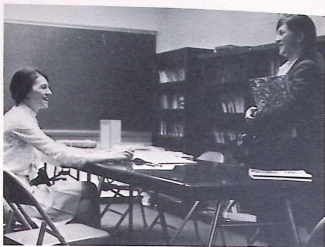

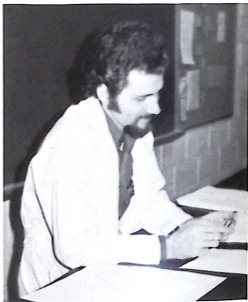
## Foreign Languages: New Experiences

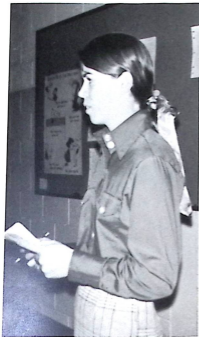

## Develop Esthetic Skills

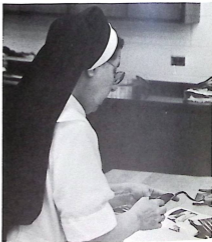

These are all offered on the semester basis.

Fine Arts, with all nine week courses offers the following: Design, Drawing, Lettering, Pottery, History of Art, Painting, Sculpture, Figure Drawing, Ceramics, Commercial Art, Ceramics II, and Jewelry.



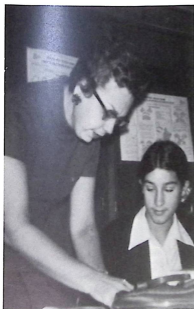

Various tasks which keep the members of this department busy are lawn care, school maintenance, visual aids, and the stacking of the vending machines.



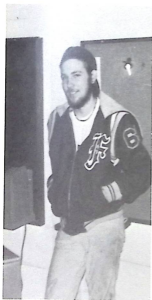

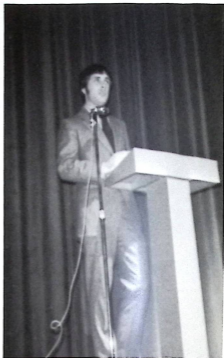

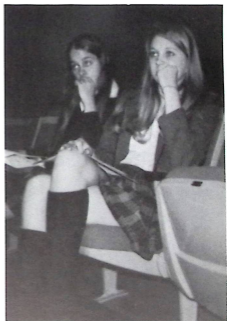

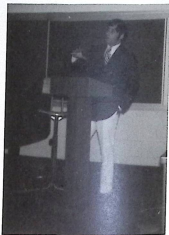

# Choir

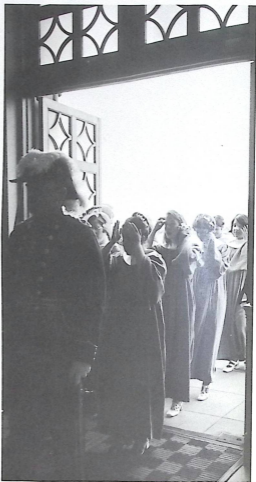

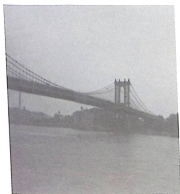

On May 28th, the graduating class of 1971 wined and dined, whirled and twirled as Senior Prom 1971 took place.

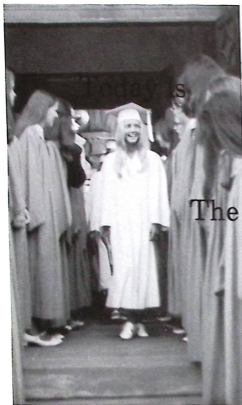

Those who have a character which is in accord, not with one of these things, but with all of them - these, I contend, are wise and complete men, possessed of all the virtues.

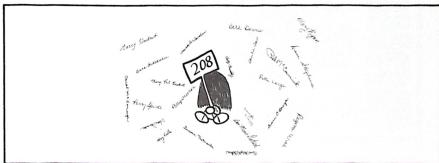

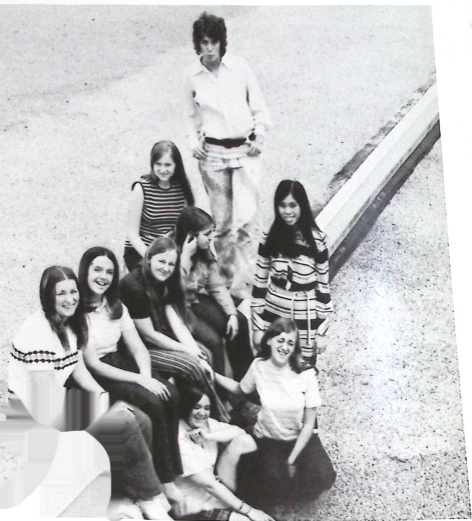
