

Dr. MacCain to Speak at Library
Dedication

Erskine's modern McCain library, constructed by Daniel Construction company of Greenville, S. C., and completed in August, will be formally dedicated November 18. The library, a part of a duobuilding program costing over \$200,000, was begun December 2, 1948. Mr. Charles Fant, architect from Anderson, S. C., drew up the plans for the building.

The principal contributors to the building fund were: the General Synod of the A. R. P. church, the General Education Board of New York, alumni and alumnae, the Arbuckle foundation, and Mr. W. H. McQuiston.

The McCain library is named for Dr. John I. McCain, who was head of the English department at Erskine for almost 60 years.

The library has a capacity for 50,000 volumes. On the ground floor there is a large reading room which covers the entire floor. In the basement are storerooms, work-rooms, and seminar rooms, where teachers may meet pupils for private consultations. The equipment in the library totaled a cost of over \$2,600.

On Dedication day, November 18, between 3 and 5 p. m., open house will be held in the library to which the public is cordially invited. Punch and cookies will be served.

## Reid Science Hall Is Well Equipped, Modern

"Physical equipment, buildings and laboratories do not constitute a department; they are only means to an end. A department is made of men who are truly interested and fitted to do the work," Dr. E. L. Reid, head of the science department of the college, stated with reference to the Reid science hall to be dedicated to him in observance of Founder's day, November 18.

"We have built up the department from scratch," he added. When Dr. Reid came to Erskine 55 years ago, the science equipment consisted of one large bare room with cement floor with no apparatus of any kind. Desks designed and built by Dr. Reid appeared, followed by hoods to rid the chemical laboratories of fumes. Alcohol lamps were used because there

was no gas or electricity. Water had to be carried in tubs to the labs.

The ground floor of the new science building consists of two lecture rooms, two physics labs, one for freshmen and the other for sophomore courses, a dark room for light experiments and a smaller lab used for physical chemistry and advanced organic chemical work. The entire first story is floored with asphalt tile.

On the second floor are two large chemical laboratories that will accommodate 94 general, 48 analytical and 48 organic chemistry students per week. Also one lecture room and a balance room containing several balances for analytical work are on the second floor.

The labs are connected by service rooms and the chemical supply room is across the hall from the labs. Desks in all the labs are supplied with water, gas, electricity, and compressed air.

The alumni dinner is to follow at fivethirty p. m. in the men's dining hall at which time Dr. Graham Reid, son of Dr. E. L. Reid, for whom the science hall is named, and Dr. James R. McCain, son of the late Dr. John I. McCain, for whom the library is named, will speak. Both graduates of Erskine college, Dr. Graham Reid is now a physician of Charlotte, N. C., and Dr. J. R. McCain is president of Agnes Scott college, Decatur, Ga. To speak also will be Mrs. E. A. Anderson of Charlotte, who is president of the woman's division of the Erskine college alumni, and Dr. W. L. (Buck) Pressly who will preside. Announcements will be made concerning alumni work for the coming year. The

college quartet will sing at the dinner. Highlighting Dedication day will be the program at Memorial hall at 8 p. m. At this time Dr. Oliver C. C'armichael of New York City, president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, will make the principal address on "The Place of the Teacher in the Liberal Arts College."

Dr. J. R. Young of Anderson, S. C., chairman of the directors of the Erskine Living Endowment, will make the presentation remarks. The keys of the buildings will be delivered to the chairman of the Erskine college board, Dr. Francis W. Bradley, and in turn presented to the president of the college, Dr. R. C. Grier. The prayer of dedication will be made by Dr. S. A. Tinkler, vice-moderator of the General Synod. The college chorus will sing three numbers.
