C ounsel from a sign standing sentinel by a church in my town: "God Doesn't Have a Plan B."

Today's declarer found that just one plan wasn't enough. Against four spades, West led a trump (he figured dummy's club suit wouldn't be too productive), and South won and tried a diamond to the king, seeking ruffs in dummy.

East took the ace and led a second trump, and South led another diamond. West won and led his last trump, and though South threw a heart on the ace of clubs, he lost two more diamonds. Down one.

Club Trick

After declarer put up the king on the first diamond, Plan A was hopeless, and there was no time to try Plan B. South must cash the king of clubs before he leads a diamond, reserving the chance of setting up a club trick.

When East takes the ace of diamonds and leads a trump, South wins with dummy's nine, takes the ace

of clubs, ruffs a club, leads a trump to the king and ruffs a club. He can cash the top hearts and take the good club for his 10th trick.

■ Daily Question: You hold: ★ K 9 2; ♥ A 4 2; ♦ K 5; ♣ A 10 9 6 3.
You open one club, your partner bids one spade, you try 1NT and he jumps to three hearts. The opponents pass. What do you say?

■ Answer: It's easy to return to spades (you should certainly show your three-card support instead of persisting with notrump). Since you have a fine hand with a spade honor, bid four spades. You'd try a noncommittal bid of three spades with a hand such as • 10 8 7.
