

Convention Registration Tops All Previous Years

It was only fitting that the greatest year of the National Auctioneers Association should be climaxed by its greatest convention, and this is exactly what happened.

Auctioneers, their wives and families were present from 39 states and one Canadian Province, the greatest distribution of registrants we have ever enjoyed. The attendance was also a record when final figures indicated 587 people had filled out registration forms. This tops our previous record, set in 1963 at Cincinnati, when 574 persons were registered.

Oklahomans, while not being much on attending in the past, turned out strong and did a wonderful job as hosts for the meeting. They had 77 persons registered.

Illinois was second in registrations with 43, closely followed by Wisconsin with 41. Nebraska and Kansas were also well represented. A complete breakdown of registration by states follows:







Illinois' Oard Sitter Stricken By Death

The death of L. Oard Sitter, Anna, Illinois, on June 17, 1968, removed one of the country's most colorful auctioneers from the earthly scene. Col. Sitter started in the auction business in 1925, although he graduated from Washington University the year before with a D.D.S. degree. The development of an eye condition prevented him from practicing dentistry.

Oard Sitter was endowed with a booming voice and he made the best of this asset in his career as an auctioneer. The many unusual sales conducted by him would fill a lot of space. Probably the project that earned the most publicity was the selling of the pig, King Neptune, at bond raising affairs during World War II. More than \$19,000,000 was raised in these auctions. King Neptune was buried on a plot of ground six miles east of Anna, on old Highway 146, after death from natural causes in 1950.

Col. Sitter, who was 74 years old at the time of his death, was an active supporter of all organizations relating to his livelihood including his state and national auctioneers associations. In his later years he became active in politics and served four years as Assistant State Treasurer of Illinois, and a similar term as an administrative assistant in the Division of Markets of the Illinois Agriculture Department.

Survivors include his widow, a son, Lloyd, who is a prominent auctioneer in southern Illinois, a daughter, one grandchild and a brother in addition to a host of other relatives and friends.






the few where I have no responsibilities and can have all the time I need to visit with others in the same situation. I certainly missed renewing old acquaintances at this meeting as well as making some new ones.




Benton Harbor Site Of Michigan Picnic


