



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Records Fall By Wayside At 20th Anniversary Convention

Old records fell and new ones were established as auctioneers from all parts of the United States gathered at the historic Hotel Roanoke to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of the National Auctioneers Association. Five Canadians made it truly an international affair.

Facilities of the spacious Hotel were taxed to capacity as the hotel staff worked hard to make everyone comfortable and get them fed on time. Total attendance figure was 685 persons, topping last year's record attendance in Oklahoma City by almost 100 heads.

Auctioneers and their families from 42 states and one Canadian Province were in attendance, the first time as many as 40 states had ever been represented at one convention. When the convention officially opened at noon on Thursday, 523 people sat down for Luncheon, a new record. By evening, there were 626 ready to share in the Buffet Dinner, also a new record. To show that they came early and stayed late, 580 were still there on Saturday evening for the Grand Banquet.

Virginia, playing host to their first National Convention since 1950, turned out with the most people as would be expected, 82 being registered. There were 62 from Ohio and 58 from Wisconsin. Tennessee, a state ranking third in total NAA membership, was represented by 42 people and Pennsylvania registered 37. North Carolina was close behind with 36.



Pop's Ponderings

Auctioneers' Groups Are Here To Stay

Again your writer has come to the time and day to start writing for the 21st year a column for this N.A.A. publication, our year running September '69 through July '70.

From all contacts I have had concerning our July Annual Convention, the auctioneers in the good old state of Virginia were great hosts, and the pages of this issue will be filled with information on the great event. The 1969 convention will no doubt go down in history as one of the very tops in attendance and progress. There is no doubt in my thinking that the entire membership will be proud of our progress, as we enter into this our twenty-first year, and of our new HOME which will stand as a shrine for Auctioneers of our Country assuring "The Auction Way of Selling" and the name of "Public Sale Auctioneer".

This name "Public Sale Auctioneer" is a highly recognized profession for those who can achieve the right to have such a motto line listed in the position you are presenting. The history books show that this art of Public Sale Auctioneer was a livelihood back as far as the Biblical days, down through all the world achievement, down through the discovery of America to this modern age where the name of "Auctioneer" is now the highest recognized of all time, and it looks now that it could be listed on the MOON. Any auction minded person who is looking for new and wider territory to serve can look at the Moon and PONDER.

While it has not been my pleasure to be so situated to attend our past conventions, it has been so inviting and through our members, and through my regular column to receive mail and be in close contact with auctioneers of many distant locations. Some very close friend-

ships have been established yet today I have not met them in person.

Way back in the early 1900's I became interested and saw the need of good state and national auctioneers associations. I saw Ohio start and disband. Also I was a member of the one-time International Auctioneers Association and saw it pass into oblivion. All went down for lack of interest. We now have in our Ohio a very strong state association that has remained solid for nearly 35 years and is still going strong. Our NAA is now in its twentyfirst year and is supported by some 36 state auctioneers associations. With progress far beyond the ponderings of any ponderer this all came to pass by the auctioneers who possess open minds and recognize the value of unity.

This has been very true in all forms of businesses and professions. They received their strength when they opened their windows and viewed the world around them and what it had to offer.

At this time I want to say thanks to our NAA Board of Directors and the members of the NAA for the high honor in extending me the Degree of Honorary Life Member. This I will look upon at all times and recall the greatness of the people within the organization. The membership, framed for the occasion, will be the top star of all honors received in my work of auctioneering that are now on the walls of my workshop of pondering.

Since writing for the July issue and skipping the month of August this is the time of year I get a little careless. The weather gets hot, I let my whiskers get new roots by not shaving every day, I get into some old clothes and play in the dirt, cleaning out such places that have caught everything not used or needed. I like to

get a clean start for the fall and winter seasons. Last year I pulled this stunt and when I was about to call it done I was caught by having visitors from the state of Oklahoma, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Jones. Mom Hess gave me the going over that I must have impressed those folks as being a member of the Sewer Gang and not a column writer for "The Auctioneer". However, the visit was a great pleasure and the Jones' are still surviving.

Now this year, July 1969, on Tuesday July 15th, two days after the close of the National Convention we decided that it was a good day to do what we were going to do in the month of May. We had had hot days, cold days and rainy days but this week it was warm and clear. I got into my dirty work duds, left my whiskers grow untouched and by midafternoon the job was complete. Our garage looked as clear and clean as Mom's kitchen and I assure you that it was clean and in order.

At that point I got lazy, got out the old pipe, took a good loafing chair and started to take a good rest and do some tall smoking. The phone rang, Mom answered it and in no time flat she got to me and said, "Hurry, someone from off somewhere is going to call. Hurry, get cleaned up." Well, by the time I got half way started to shave and change, in came our callers and how happy we were to see them. It was our good friends, and past president of the NAA, Col. John Overton and Mrs. Overton. They had left the convention on Sunday the 13th, took a homeward tour through Pennsylvania into Ohio, the state where they once resided and came through our town. It was a short visit but a wonderful one. They were heading for Indiana for an overnite visit with friends there, then heading home where they now reside in the state of New Mexico and have a large auction service in that area.

Col. Overton gave us a short briefing of the convention but with the 125 miles ahead of them that day, their stay was much too short. After they had left, Mom and I visited about what wonderful folks they were. But, Mom couldn't help reminding me that this was the second

time I had received callers when my appearance looked like I belonged to a Sewer Gang.

Our mail has been quite light through late June and July. Our Ohio auctioneers had an unusually busy spring and summer run this year, and many are heavily booked for the fall and winter season. We are in an area where there are three or four auction houses selling what you have about the place that is no longer needed. They seem to be well stocked each sale day. Ohio has around 1200 licensed auctioneers and within the auctioneering business there is always a sale of some kind that some one of the many public auctioneers is conducting.

However, the heavy farm, livestock and farm equipment sales are handled by less than half of these 1200. Ohio has many weekly livestock auction yards and within the state there is an average of 8 to 10 each weekday. Some of our auctioneers sell at one of these sales each day of the week.

Ohio has not yet gotten into very many Sunday auctions for which I am glad. I join with many auctioneers of the land to say Amen and hope that it can be kept that way. In my fifty years of selling I have no record of getting involved in a Sunday auction except once. We were selling building lots in a two day auction and when we ran out of bidders on Saturday evening we had a few lots left. The owners announced they would run the next afternoon. They had my services as auctioneer under contract without mention of "No Sunday sales" so I had no choice but to finish the job. I know I can raise an argument on this with many and will agree that many events of all types are held on Sunday, but I feel that every auctioneer needs to have his religious thinking revived one day a week as well as a few extra hours rest for the big day on Monday.

In Ohio as you will note we have the Knotts School of Auctioneering located at Gallipolis. This location is on the Ohio river with West Virginia on the other side. Their instructors and students are from many locations and reach well into the

deep south according to notes and letters I receive. Recently I received a letter from one of their instructors and a busy auctioneer, Col. Bill S. Brown of New Marshfield, Ohio. 

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


This is the beginning of a new day—I have been given this day to use as I will... I can waste it or use it for good. What I do today is important because I'm exchanging a day of my life for it.

A social hour was enjoyed the first evening, followed by a Chuck Wagon Dinner. A Fun Auction and dancing completed the evening's festivities.



He is also survived by two daughters, Margaret and Marian, a son, John, Jr., and one sister.

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

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



This column has devoted quite a lot of space toward the permanent home for the NAA. The Roanoke convention brought this dream closer to a reality. The response to Grover Howell's plea for funds for this project on the first day of the convention certainly removed any doubts those in attendance might have as to its success.

Now the question is, "When?" It can be as early as next spring if our membership will continue to respond with their donations to the Building Fund as many have already. We ask you to refer back to Grover Howell's article, "Growth For Progress", and especially note those who have designated themselves as "Founders". Shouldn't your name be in this group? this group?

Nebraska auctioneers went to work on the building project as soon as they got home from Roanoke. Marvin Grubaugh, President of the Nebraska Auctioneers Association, immediately called a meeting of the Board of Directors and past presidents of the group. Each one was assigned members in his respective area to solicit for donations.

We commend the Nebraska group for this action. What is taking place in your state? We know that interest in the project is rather low in some states but we are hoping this will change soon. Ten years from now they are going to wish they had been represented by more contributors—and then it will be too late. The \$40,000 subscribed at Roanoke is definite proof the goal of \$100,000 will be reached. Join with those whose names who appear in the article mentioned above while you can.

Attending a number of state conventions each year, it is a comfort to see the Secretary and/or Convention Chairman worry about his guarantee to the Hotel or Motel on number of persons for each

meal. I have been going through it for years and just when I thought it was getting easier it actually got harder.

For the past few years we have had a good many folks around on Wednesday of Convention Week. This year, it was very depressing to see so few in the lobby of the Hotel in comparison to previous years. It certainly didn't look like any records would be broken then. But by Thursday noon we had the largest first meal attendance on record. One of the reasons for the poor forecasting was the weather conditions prevailing in the Roanoke area. Never before have so many arrived by plane and the Roanoke Airport was closed practically all day Wednesday.

All will agree that Morris Fannon did a wonderful job as Convention Chairman. He secured an outstanding array of Program Talent and he saw the convention through from beginning to end in an efficient and business-like manner. But few convention chairmen have had such loyal support from their home-state auctioneers as did Morris. And from our mail we find that former Vice President, Hubert Humphrey, turned auctioneer in Washington, D. C., to help get funds for educational TV. He sold a book by Harry Truman for \$320, an American flag for \$150, and two stuffed animals for \$320.

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Accepting The Challenge

"President's Acceptance Address"

This is without a doubt one of the two greatest honors that an old Idaho farm boy has ever experienced. Thirdly and last I would like to give honor to someone who has without a doubt done more to promote the auction business than the auctioneer himself. 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
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also be fitting and proper for every wife, sweetheart, and mother to rise and receive the applause of the membership.

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
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


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
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
