In my message in the Annual Report of the Chamber in January 1979, I outlined a number of goals for the Chamber to accomplish during the year. The Chamber made substantial progress toward those goals through the able efforts of its staff and volunteers.

The first goal I listed, was for the Chamber to work with the City of Springfield in identifying, designating and planning for a new industrial area for the City of Springfield. As a result of the Chamber's efforts, a special committee was formulated by the City which resulted in the designation of several areas for future industrial growth. Those areas are currently being incorporated into the Metropolitan Plan, to recognize them for future community zoning and planning efforts.


