How to Conduct a School District Meeting.

Instructions from the State Superintendent to School Officers of Wisconsin.

The school district board must meet on the Saturday preceding the date of the Annual Meeting for the purpose of examining the accounts of the treasurer and making an itemized report of all school receipts and expenditures since the last regular annual meeting. This report must be made in writing, placed in the hands of the district clerk after it is read, and then recorded in the *clerk's record book* as a part of the minutes of the meeting.

Outline for Conducting School District Meetings.

1. Elect a chairman. The person so elected need not be a member of the school board.

2. The district clerk must keep a full record of the proceedings of the meeting and the business transacted. If the clerk is not present appoint someone to act in his place. The business transacted must appear upon the minutes and should be made a matter of permanent record.

3. The minutes of the last annual meeting and all intervening special meetings, if any, must be read and approved; if corrections are necessary, have them made.

4. The reports of the clerk and treasurer of the board are next in order. These reports must be itemized. The report should show the amount of money received by the district since the last report and also the amount of money paid out. The balance should show the amount of money *actually in the treasury at the time of the school meeting.*

(If the school meeting is held the first Monday in June and the school has not already closed, the board can easily estimate the expenditure necessary for the remainder of the year up to June 30th. This estimate should not be a part of the regular report but simply serve as data in estimating the amount of money needed to be raised by the district for the ensuing year.)

5. Hear report of the audit committee.

6. Determine the length of time school shall be taught during the coming year. The law requires at least eight months and state graded schools must maintain at least nine months of school.

7. Vote to raise an amount of money by tax to enable the board to properly maintain the school for the ensuing year. It is recommended that the school board at the board meeting required to be held on the Saturday previous to the Monday fixed for the

annual meeting shall reach a satisfactory conclusion as to the sum that is needed for the different purposes. Remember that no teacher can be legally hired for less than forty dollars per month without forfeiting the right to share in the distribution of school moneys.

8. Appropriate sums of money for repairs to the fences, outbuildings, grounds, schoolhouses, for additional furniture, for proper heating and ventilation, for repairing, or furnishing new, blackboards, for the purchase of library books, etc.

*

11. Elect officers. All elections of school officers must be by ballot. The law requires this.

12. Appoint a committee of three taxpayers to make a report to the next annual meeting upon the correctness of the business transactions of the school board.

13. If money is to be borrowed by the district remember the following:

a. Money may be borrowed from some bank or individual or from the state trust fund.

b. The resolution authorizing the board to make the loan must be clear in its directions as to source from which the money is to be borrowed.

c. The maximum amount must be named.

d. The maximum rate of interest should be named.

e. If borrowed from the trust fund the only rate is four per cent. The time can not exceed fifteen years and the amount cannot exceed \$25,000.

(For forms of resolution, method of procedure, see "BORROWING MONEY" in your copy of school code. Read with care the directions given under "Be Sure You are Right, Then Go Ahead." It may be a good plan to get the blank forms and circulars from the Land Office, Madison, Wis., before the meeting in case a loan is contemplated.)

f. Follow directions strictly. "Short cuts" lead to trouble.

g. If money is to be borrowed the members of the school board should, before the meeting get together and carefully consider the amount, the purpose and the length of time for which the loan should be made.

h. A loan from the trust funds may be made for the following purposes:

(1) To build a school house.

(2) To refund district indebtedness.

14. The electors may vote a certain fee for tuition

per month to be charged for attendance of non-resident children. The fee for attendance upon a one-room school cannot be more than a dollar per month, and for attendance upon state graded schools and grades below the high schools, not more than \$1.75 per month. In case the electors do not vote on the matter of tuition, the fee is determined by the school board.

15. Take a vote upon the question of closing the district school for one or more terms or for the entire year. If the district school is closed authority must be given to the school board to pay tuition and transportation to adjoining districts, in accordance with Section 430—1 to 430—8, and Section 496q to 496t of the statutes. These Sections will be found in the school code of 1911, pages 69, 71, 216, 218. When the provisions of Section 496q are complied with the district is entitled to receive \$150 of special aid from the state, in addition to the regular school money apportionment. Be sure to have the school laws with you at the meeting.

16. Determine whether or not the electors of the district are in favor of authorizing the school board to enter into a contract with parents or guardians for transporting children to and from school. (For further information read Sections 430—1, 496q, 496r, 496s, school code 1911.)

17. If authorized to pay for transportation or tuition, or both, have tax levied if necessary for the purpose of providing money to meet the expense.

18. The question of furnishing free textbooks

must be voted upon at this meeting. The only way by which the district can furnish free text-books is for the electors to adopt the plan by a majority vote.

19. Call attention of the electors to the question of consolidation of school districts. (Read Sections 419b, 419h, school code 1911.) It may be profitable to organize a state graded school. A two-department state graded school receives the usual aid based upon the number of children residing therein, and a special aid of \$200 a year, and a three-department state graded school will receive \$300.

21. Any other matters relating to the management of the affairs of the district may be brought up at this time.

22. If the business of the district has been satisfactorily completed for the year, and there does not appear to be any occasion or necessity for another meeting, adjourn sine die — without day. If the business has not been satisfactorily completed, and there appears a probable necessity for other meetings of the electors, the meeting should be adjourned to some definite later day. This adjournment will avoid the trouble incident to calling a special meeting. As many adjourned meetings as are necessary to complete the business of the district may be held. All the business that can be transacted at the annual meeting may be transacted at an adjourned meeting, except election of officers.

The Roster of The School Officers.

Section 446, page 269, code of 1915.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

1. To report the name and postoffice address of each officer of his district to the town clerk and to the town treasurer, or if a joint district to the clerk and treasurer of each town in which his district is situated, within ten days after the election or appointment of such officer.
8. To notify any person of his election or appointment to a district office within five days thereafter.

Section 431, page 258, code of 1915.

The officers of the district shall be a director, treasurer and clerk, who shall be residents of the district and hold their respective offices for three years and until their successors have been elected or appointed, but not beyond ten days beyond the expiration of their term of office without being again elected or appointed; provided, that at the first election of such officers in any newly organized district, the Clerk shall be chosen for one year, the Treasurer for two years, and the Director for three years; and thereafter each officer shall be chosen for three years.

Any person present at a meeting at which he shall be elected one of the board shall be deemed to be notified thereof; and any person so elected and not present shall be notified thereof by the clerk of said meeting within five days thereafter; and unless each person elected and notified shall within ten days after his election file with the clerk his refusal in writing to accept the office he shall be deemed to have accepted the same.

Section 433, page 259, code of 1915.

The board may fill by appointment any vacancy that may occur in their number within ten days after such vacancy shall occur; and if such vacancy shall not be so filled the town or village clerk, and in the case of a joint district the clerk of the town or village in which the schoolhouse is situated, shall fill such vacancy by appointment. Any person upon being notified of his appointment shall be deemed to have accepted the same unless within five days thereafter he shall file with the clerk or director a written refusal to serve; and any person so appointed shall fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 433a, page 259, code of 1915.

When the clerk, director or treasurer shall be and remain absent from the district for which he was elected for a period exceeding sixty days his office shall be deemed vacant.

Minutes of the District Board.

Section 432, page 259, code of 1915.

The director, treasurer and clerk shall constitute the district board. Meetings of the board may be called by any two members thereof by serving on the other member a written notice of the time and place of such meeting at least twenty-four hours before such meeting is to take place. No act authorized to be done by the board shall be valid unless voted at its meeting. No formal notice of a meeting will be required where all members are present and consent to consider matters relating to the district.

Section 446, page 269, paragraph 3, code of 1915.

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enter in the record book provided by the board the minutes of its meetings, orders, resolutions and other proceedings.
