Academic Senate Angered By Clark Kerr Firing

The Academic Senate has decried the firing of University President Clark Kerr as "reckless and precipitate", and "part of an ominous pattern of destructive political intervention in the affairs of the University."

Seemingly, the entire faculty experienced the same initial visceral response of shock at the Board of Regents action on Friday. But in short time the shock turned to anger -- anger directed at the Regents and against Ronald Reagan, the man they believe engineered the firing for political and/or ideological reasons.

Therefore, the Academic Senate met and demanded that: (a) the Regents "resist political intervention", (b) "the Legislature provide financial support adequate to sustain the present high quality and growth of the University", (c) tuition free education "not be abandoned", (d) "the advice
