

Lisbon Farm May 26th 1844

Dear Uncle

I thank you for your kind offer of loaning me money. but I can avoid the necessaty of it except for very small somes. Al-
tough I must now ask you to send me fifty dollars by mail. as I have
a small debt to pay. and at this busy time of year it seems necessary
to have a little cash. If I do not make a sale of some calves I
have on hand to the country butcher I shall be in town next week with
them. in two week of yesterday. We had a frost one night since you
left that made a great show but oweing to a fog and a southerly wind.
it went of without injureing the crops. but in some places in the
wood it killed the oak leaves.

The showery weather we had in the latter part of the time you where
up has brought the rust on the leaves of the rye. so that when I walked
amiong it in my shirt sleeves it coulered them with it. though if the
weather continues favourable I do not think the injury will be
serious.
