Dear Uncle

I received your letter in which you mentioned that you had purchased some Barley & Clover seed. the clover seed has come to hand but the barley has not made its appearance and as it is time it was sown I am anxious to obtain it. and if you will send me one hundred and fifty dollars. I should be able to quite some hongry fellows. who are constaintly after me.

The spring continues ^warm the peach trees show the red of their blossom but have not opened yet. I have sown my clover seed and harrowed the grain where I sowed it. the meadows have been harrowed and roled. I have sown oats & to day I planted one acre in potatoes. The manure from Hanover has been hauled spread and ploughed in. the whole of the manure Hanover has produced for one year. in fact last spring I got none. barely covered five acres. when there was a fence about there stables the quantity was quadrupled what it is now. we are all well.
