RAISES BLUEBERRIES

OLYMPIA, May 19.—Experiments looking toward the development of a domestic blueberry adapted to the Puget Sound climate are being conducted by Joseph Eberhardt, a Thurston county grower, according to E. F. Dehne, who is working in the county as assistant horticultural inspector with the department of agriculture. Mr. Eberhardt has imported blueberry plants from New York state, but on finding that they were not so successful here as was anticipated, he has decided to secure some plants from Alaska, which he has found can be successfully cultivated in their native climate. Mr. Eberhardt is also cross-pollinating sallow, wild huckleberries and Oregon grape in the hope of developing a commercial product.
