Whitesbog Village was home to New Jersey's largest cranberry farm in the early 1900s, and was also the site of the first cultivated blueberry. The former company town is now listed on the National and State Registers of Historic Sites. Almost all of the town's original buildings are still standing, such as company housing, the packing and sorting house, barrel factory, post office, school house and more. Other attractions here include a variety of recreational activities in the surrounding Lebanon State Forest and modern and abandoned cranberry bogs. There are also special events and natural history programs.



## FORT DIX MILITARY MUSEUM

The Fort Dix Military Museum has a fascinating collection of more than 100 posters relating to World War I and World War II. A leading mass medium of their time, the posters were used to promote various aspects of the war effort, such as conservation, bond buying and recruitment. Other items in the museum's collection include uniforms, photographs, equipment and firearms. There is also a wonderful oil painting of Civil War General John Adams Dix, for whom the post is named.

## SMITH-CADBURY MANSION

The Smith-Cadbury Mansion houses an extensive research library maintained by the Moorestown Historical Society. The collection includes nearly 500 books on local history and families, news articles, photographs, maps and information about local buildings. The 1738 mansion, which is listed in the National and State Registers of Historic Places, also contains an exceptional collection of Quaker clothing as well as artifacts and furnishings from the 1800s. **A** haven for injured and orphaned wild animals, Woodford Cedar Run Wildlife Refuge also offers a variety of educational and nature programs. Visitors may also hike the one-mile trail around Cedar Run Lake and observe the animals in the rehabilitation compound.
