

Lisbon Farm Dec 3 1842

Dear Uncle

We arrived here safely on Monday last. after a pleassent visit to old Tackconey. Sunday was a very windy day and although the ground was frozen I found some of my fences blown down. The roads have been very good thus far this winter. and I keep my horses so much amoung the marl & lime that the girls say they have not been visiting this some time past. It is my hope that we may have an open frozen winter so that we may obtain a goodly quantity of lime & marl. for both last winter and the winter before where very bad for hauling.

On Wednesday I made a purchase of ten steers such as will weigh five hundred next fall. for which I payed ninty eight dollars and a half. also fifteen ewes for twenty dollars and sixty two cents. and also a brood mare for which I payed seventy dollars. all of which are at prices to sute the times. If you can send they money to pay for these on Tuesday mail it amounts \$189.12 $\frac{1}{2}$ you will make me much obliged to you.
