Although Margaret harbored gymnastics dreams, those were cut short when she grew from 5' to 5'10" during the summer after 8th grade. Turning her focus to soccer during high school, she started every game under coach Sue Radmer from freshman to senior year. She excelled as a left defender and was selected All-State defender.

Continuing her career at UWSP under Coach Sheila Meich, she played stopper with fellow SPASH alumni Sarah Menzel and Marie Muhvic. In 2000, the team advanced to the NCAA DIII Final Four, the first time in school history.

While Margaret was a talented soccer player, it was her referee skills that took her to the highest levels of her sport. She refereed her first soccer game at age 13 to earn some extra money and at age 19, she was selected to referee the Midwest Region Youth Championships. By age 25, she became the first female to officiate a Milwaukee Wave professional indoor soccer game, and in 2015 she was the only American selected to referee in the FIFA Women's World Cup Canada.

According to former UWSP assistant soccer coach Larry Leton, "You could tell her personal qualities, strengths and attributes she possessed as a talented and skilled college soccer player would carry her forward to becoming a FIFA official at the highest levels." Margaret was the 5th female referee in the history of the United States to be reach a FIFA World Cup.

Making it to the World Cup as an athlete or official is a long road with year-round work. In addition to understanding the rules inside and out, it requires intense physical conditioning. And Margaret did all this while she was a Spanish teacher at Union Grove High School.

She retired from refereeing at the FIFA level in 2016 to pursue a PhD in Parks, Recreation & Tourism Management at Clemson University with a focus on the mental health aspect of sports. She formed the non-profit, U.S. Center for Mental Health & Sport, which offers mental health awareness training for coaches, athletes, parents and family members, officials, and sport administrators.

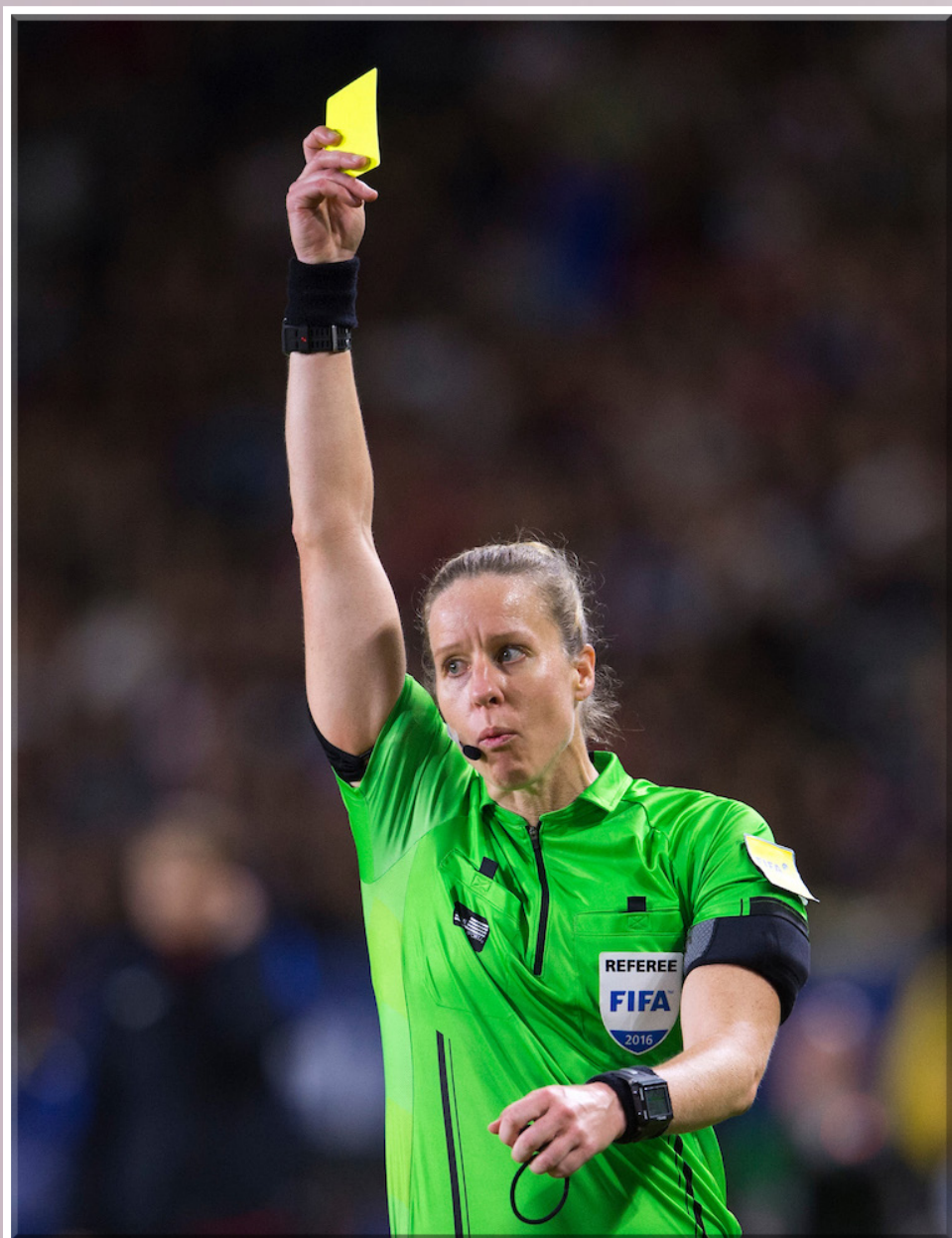
In 2022, she refereed the men's and women's World Cups for the International Federation of Cerebral Palsy Football (IFCPF) in Spain. Margaret also referees blind soccer and has supported the development of the sport around the country in preparation for the 2028 Paralympic Games in Los Angeles. She referees for Special Olympics and in 2022 refereed at the USA Games in Florida.

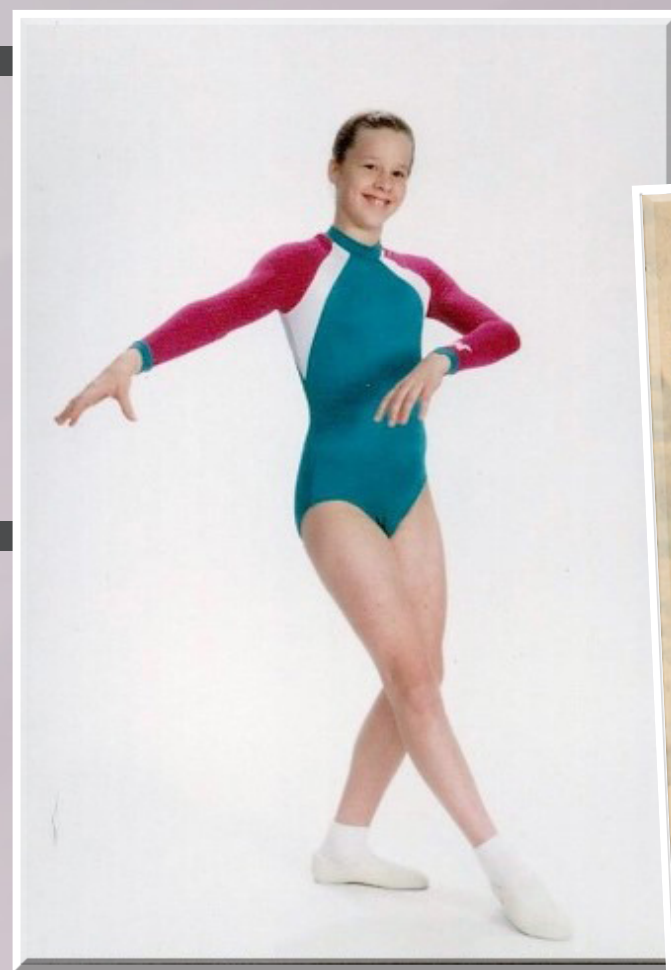

Stevens Point YMCA Team IV gymnasts remained undefeated by posting a 130.3-128.9 win over Appleton on Saturday, boosting their record to 6-0.

Jackie Viertel led the age nine-and-under girls with first place in all-around (22.1), first on the floor exercise (8.4), first on the uneven parallel bars (8.0), second in beam (7.4) and second in vault (8.3).

Other winners for Team IV were Julianne Osborne in beam (7.6) and Margaret Mary Domka in vault (8.4).

In fact, while most prep soccer teams are currently enjoying their summer vacation, SPASH will be taking aim at a WIAA state championship.

The road to the title begins to light when the Panthers face Verona in a quarterfinal matchup at Stevens Stevens Field in Madison starting at 7 p.m.

Earning a trip to the state tournament is just the second year of a program they have spent some time in the girls prep soccer.

"Judging by the way they're coming out going to state our first year," said SPASH coach Sue Radmer.

"We don't think about this only being our second year of varsity soccer. Most of these kids have been playing this sport most of their lives and the life are very excited about going to state."

As has been the case most of the season, the Panthers (20-2) aren't even going to worry about who they are playing.

If someone had to pick a strong suit for the Panthers, it would probably be an offense that features plenty of scoring depth, and several outstanding talents.

Morgan led the Panthers in scoring with 10 goals and six assists for 36 points. Muhvic ranked second in the scoring race with 18 points on nine goals.

The success of the Stevens Point Area Senior High girls soccer team this season is reflected on the all-Wisconsin Valley Conference team recently announced.

The Panthers, who captured their third straight Valley title with a 9-1 mark, had six players named to the first team.

Earning first team honors for SPASH were seniors Erin Morgan, Sabine Schabel and Rachel Lavin, along with juniors Kelly Wright, Marie Muhvic and Kyra Johnson.

Morgan led the Valley in scoring with 10 goals and six assists for 36 points. Muhvic ranked second in the scoring race with 18 points on nine goals.

Schabel, who finished with three goals and a pair of assists for eight points in conference play, and Johnson were named on defense. Wright and Morgan were picked in the midfield, while Muhvic was a forward.

Lavin was selected the first-team goalkeeper after allowing just three goals in 10 games for a sparkling .917 save percentage.

Pointers coach Sheila Misch understands just how fortunate the program is to have a wealth of riches when it comes to soccer talent returning to the school's backyard.

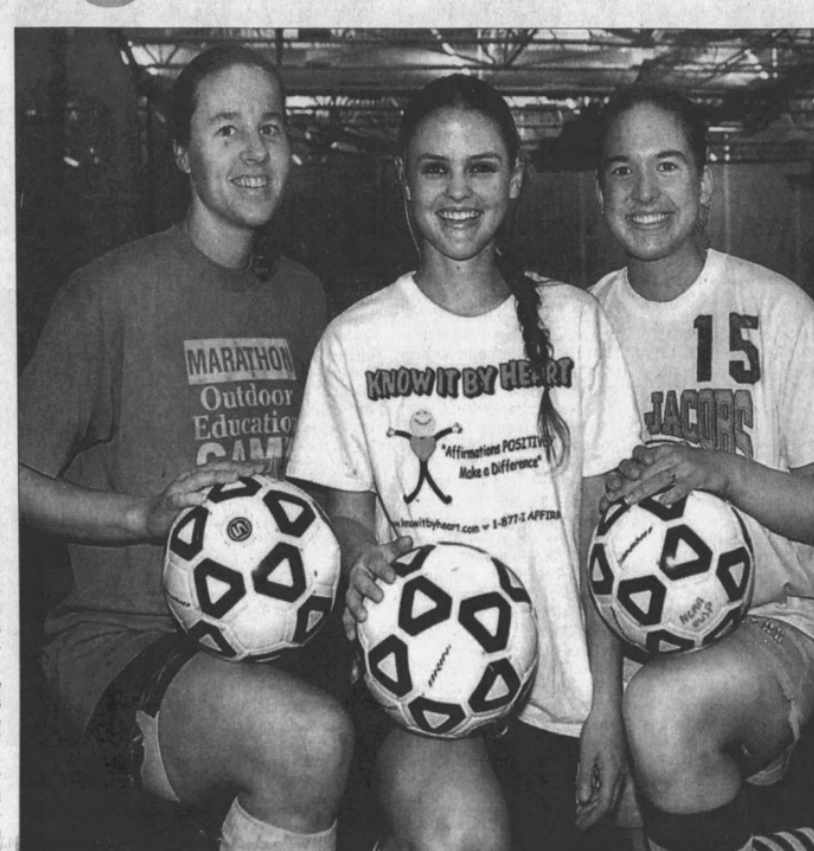
In the last 4 to 5 years, the growth of soccer in this area has gotten to the point where it's comparable to other areas of the state, she said.

Former Pointer, SPASH star excels as an official

Margaret Domka is used to coming under scrutiny on a soccer field.

As a senior defender at Stevens Point Area Senior High, Domka had Division I college recruiters checking her out. She settled on Marquette University.

Things didn't work out with the Golden Eagles and she eventually transferred to UW-Stevens Point, where she was an Division III All-American defender for the Pointers.

While her college playing days are over, Domka still finds herself under a microscope, albeit from a different angle.

Early reviews suggest she has a bright future.

"According to one of the assessors from the Milwaukee area, Margaret is already the best female referee in Wisconsin," said Randy Davis, who was the recipient of the Wisconsin Assessor of the Year Award in 2000.

Davis, who has been a referee since 1994 and serves as a referee assessor throughout Wisconsin, brought Domka to the attention of state soccer officials.

When the Wisconsin Soccer Association asked for recommendations for the Wisconsin State Cup Championships, Davis immediately thought of Domka.

Domka, 25, spent part of her summer as one of 29 referees from around the world chosen to work the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup, held June 6 through July 5 in Canada. The Stevens Point native was the only ref to represent the United States.

"Obviously, it was a fantastic experience and huge honor," Domka said. "To be selected as the only American official was fantastic and to be considered one of the best in the world."

There she was, standing in the middle of the field in charge of a match with the most elite women's soccer players on the planet, making split-second decisions.

The University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point women's soccer team is living a fairy tale during the NCAA Division III Tournament.

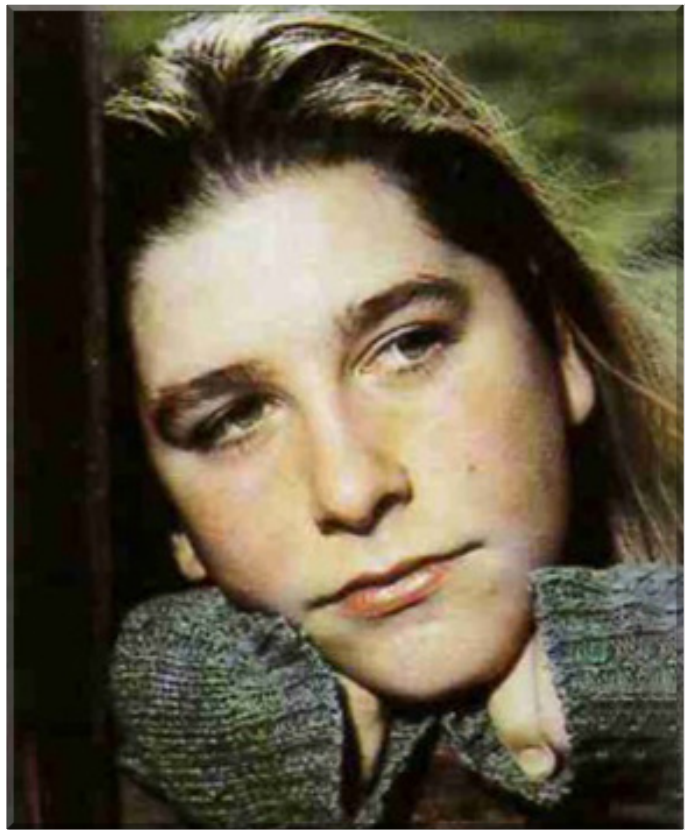
Stevens Point hopes to avoid the same fate as Cinderella and make sure the clock doesn't strike midnight Saturday.

Learning to play basketball on the side of her family’s barn at in Custer, Janel McCarville says, “I was basically self-taught. I never thought it would really take me anywhere, playing in a few summer leagues.” But basketball has taken Janel on quite a journey, taking her from SPASH to a professional basketball career.

During her years at SPASH, Janel compiled an impressive set of statistics, on offense and defense. In 70 games spanning three seasons, she led the Panthers to a 60-10 record and to the WIAA State Basketball Tournament in 2001. Coming into the tournament with a perfect 26-0 season, they lost in the final game 51-44 to Janesville Parker led by another Wisconsin basketball superstar, Mistie Bass. 22 years after her state tournament performance, her statistics still stand near the top of the WIAA state tournament records.

In her freshman year at the University of Minnesota, she helped the Gophers reach the NCAA tournament. During her junior year, she led the team to the Final Four for the first time in Gopher basketball history. She became the first player in Gopher history to play in the NCAA Tournament during each of her four years and is in the all-time top 5 in every major statistical category for the Golden Gophers. Janel’s number 4 jersey was retired on December 15, 2019 at the Williams Arena at the University of Minnesota in recognition of her achievements.

Janel was drafted in the first round of the 2005 WNBA draft, first pick overall, by the Charlotte Sting. After playing for other league teams, she returned to Minnesota in 2013 to lead the Lynx to the WNBA Championship, scoring 10 points in the decisive third game of the WNBA tournament.

During the WNBA off-season, like many of her fellow WNBA players, she played with teams in the Euro League to supplement their WNBA earnings, playing on teams from Slovakia, Russia, Poland, Turkey, China, Italy and Sweden. While living in Sweden, she began her coaching career, first as player and assistant coach and in 2021, head coach for the Alviks BK women’s team. In addition, she was assistant coach for the men’s Alviks BK team. In the fall of 2022, Janel moved back to Custer, coming full circle to return to her alma mater SPASH as the new girls basketball coach, taking over from her high school coach, Kraig Terpstra.

McCarville set to compete in Pan American Games

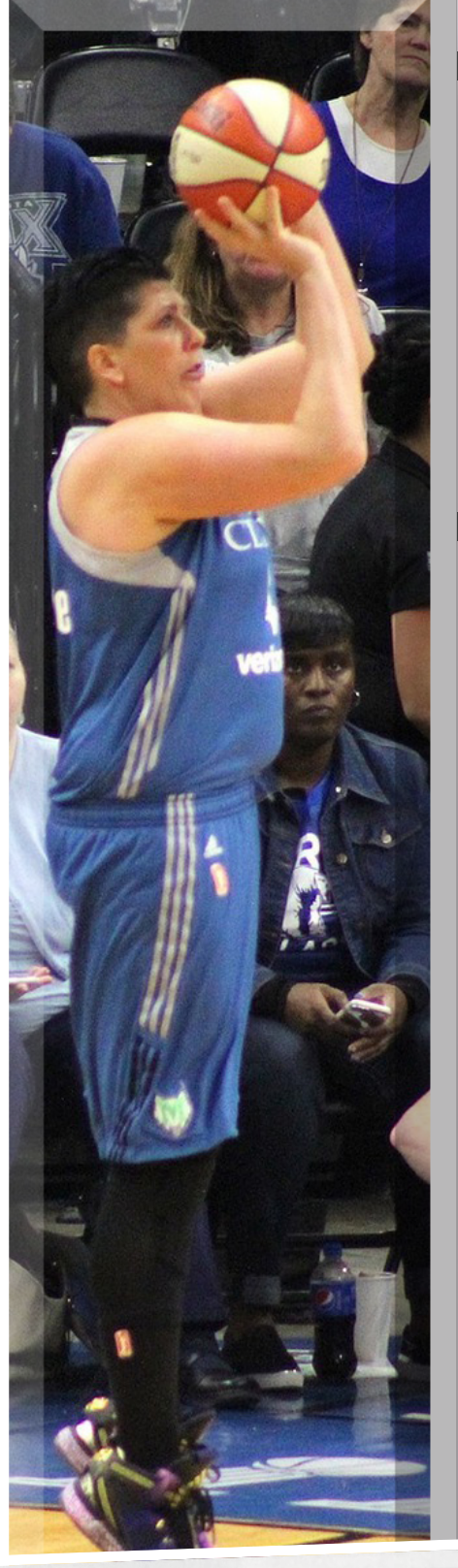
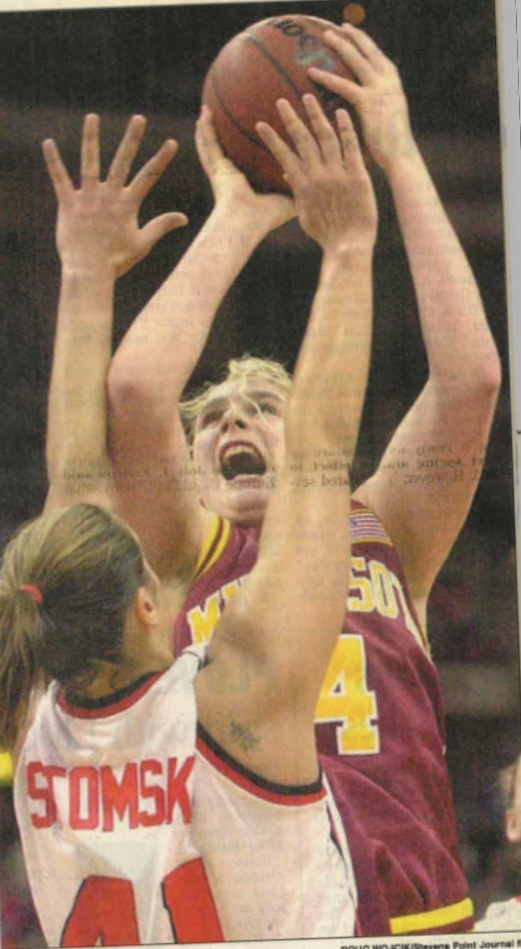

Professional basketball takes SPASH grad McCarville to international outposts — but now she's home again

Running up and down the court in the European professional women's basketball leagues, pushing and shoving bodies around in the paint for a couple hours every night, Janel McCarville is home again.

That is where things would get a little complicated for the former Stevens Point Area Senior High School basketball player. She is now a professional basketball player in Europe.

McCarville is a forward for the University of Minnesota. She has been named to the All-American team and is a member of the U.S. national basketball team. She is also a member of the U.S. national basketball team.

After SPASH, she moved on to the University of Minnesota to continue her basketball career for the Gophers.

As a member of the Gopher women's basketball team, she became the first player in Gopher's history to play in the NCAA Tournament during each of her four years.

McCarville was in the

top five of every major statistical category for the Golden Gophers women's team, including points, rebounds, assists, steals, and blocks. McCarville holds the NCAA record for most rebounds in the tournament, with 75 rebounds in five games. She also has the NCAA record for tournament rebound average, with 15 per game.

Following her playing career at Minnesota, Janel was drafted in the

first round of the 2005 WNBA (Women's National Basketball Association) draft, the first overall pick, by the Charlotte Sting and started her professional playing career.

In the fall of 2002, Janel moved back to Stevens Point and joined the SPASH basketball coaching staff as the JV girls' basketball coach.

SUZY FAVOR

From her days with the Stevens Point Area Running Club (SPARC) known by the nickname “Bug” for the glasses she wore to her days on the Olympic stage, Suzy has exceeded expectations on the track and on cross country courses. SPARC coach Kent Hall used the word “unforgettable” to describe seeing Suzy run. Shortly after joining SPARC, she qualified for the National Track & Field Meet as an 11-year-old in the 400 M run.

During her high school career, she dominated the Wisconsin state cross country and track scene, winning 4 state cross country championships and 6 individual state track championships. In 1985, the Wausau Daily Herald noted that Suzy Favor was the area’s top sports story, eclipsing even UWSP’s Terry Porter who had just been selected by the Portland Trailblazers in the 1st round of the NBA draft. According to her SPASH coach, Mike Olson, “She was just another teenage girl when she was off the track, but when she stepped on the track she became a different person, totally focused on the job at hand. As soon as she crossed the finish line, she would be all smiles again.”

At UW-Madison, Suzy continued to compete as a cross country and track athlete. Over her collegiate career, she won 9 NCAA championships and 23 Big10 Championships. In recognition of her exceptional performance, she was named by the Big10 Conference as the Top Female Athlete in Conference History.

After college, she continued her running career, competing in 3 Olympic Games and winning 7 U.S. National Championships. When Suzy was inducted into the SPASH Hall of Fame in 2004, Marty Liquori, long-time NBC Olympic Commentator wrote, “What cannot be conveyed in her list of accomplishments is the impact that Suzy has had on the sport of track and field for her deportment off the track. No other athlete has been more humble in winning or more gracious in defeat”.

In a WIAA interview for the 1996 State Track and Field Championship program, Suzy says, “I know I was born with this gift to run. I’ve always used it, never taken it for granted. I always want to see what I can do. Ever since high school, I’ve always been thinking about being the best I can be.”

Continuing the great tradition of 800 M runners from Portage County, Roisin Willis is at the start of her running career. In 2013 when Roisin was 9, her parents, Lee and Breeda Willis, along with SPASH coaches Mike and Nate Olson, restarted the Stevens Point Area Running Club. From a young age, her mother Breeda, a former Olympian, “knew she was exceptional. She’s relentless and when she wants something she has the ability to push her body beyond what it is capable of.”

As an 8th grader in 2018, she won the 800 M event at the Wisco Mile at the Wisconsin Lutheran Track in Milwaukee, running the fastest 800 M in Wisconsin high school history. As a freshman, she won the 800 M event in state record time and anchored the championship 4x400 M relay. Covid cancelled her sophomore year track season. During her junior year, she was 1 of 3 prep girls to qualify for the 2020 Olympic trials in Eugene, Oregon where she made it to the semi-finals and finished in the top half of all of the qualifiers. During her senior year, Roisin won the 800 M, setting not only a Wisconsin state record but a National Federation of High Schools record. She also ran the anchor leg on the 4x400 M relay which placed 2nd.

To illustrate Roisin’s dominance of the 800 M event, she lowered the state 800 M record by an incredible 9.19 seconds and the National High School Federation 800 M record by 2.01 seconds. Over her high school career, she beat the previous Wisconsin high school 800 M record set in 2015 an astonishing 28 times.

After a stellar high school career, she committed to running at Stanford University in Palo Alto, California where she is completing her freshman year of competition. Rosin has established herself as an elite 800 M athlete on the world stage and we are excited to follow her achievements.
