The Stevens Point City Band has been making music in Stevens Point for a long time. In 1890 two bands, under the direction of Max Neseman and L. D. Fisher, were consolidated into a band named the Union Band. In 1905 under the direction of Ernest Weber, the name was changed to Weber's Band. With the exception of two intervals when Weber was away from Stevens Point, the band remained under his direction until a year and a half before his death in 1953.

During Weber's first absence, Ray Jacobs, a member of the band, took over the leadership and the band's name was changed to Stevens Point City Band. The group became inactive for a short period before Weber's return. Jacobs again took over when Weber was absent from the city a second time and continued until the depression days when the Common Council discontinued appropriations. When Weber returned, in about 1941, the musicians were reorganized into what was known as the Eagle Band. A short time later it was renamed the Stevens Point City Band. Jacobs resumed leadership following Weber's death.




### SPECIAL ACTIVITIES:

The Optimist Club were in charge of the dedication ceremonies and the day of activities entitled "Band Shell Festival" held on Father's Day, June 19, 1977. This was the official date of the Band Shell opening. Five cent refreshments were sold as a touch of "yesteryear." Nine different musical groups donated their talents and time with the City Band as the featured group. Junior Woman's Club members were co-sponsors of the day's activities.

In addition to the special events listed, band shell containers in the shape of gazebos were placed in local stores for individual contributions and a Band Shell Phon-a-thon was held during the week of April 25-30, 1976. Thirteen business people and interested residents phoned corporations and businesses for pledges. Citizens National Bank offered their facilities for the Phon-a-thon.

Sentry Classic Basketball Tournament, held in December 1975, gave part of their profits to the Band Shell Committee.



**WSPT RADIO STATION** — They sponsored the Portage County Queen Contest in conjunction with the Bicentennial Celebration with Miss Barbara Thurmaier crowned as queen.

**STEVENS POINT BREWERY** — They donated 50 "dummy" Bicentennial cans having the city flag as a symbol on it. These were sold by junior high students during the Independence Day Parade.

**JAYCEES** — During their annual "Freedom Days" celebration, they obtained donated items from six local businesses and sold raffle tickets for these. Proceeds were given to the Band Shell project.

**GOERKE PARK DRUM AND MARCHING BAND COMPETITION**—
The Bicentennial Festivities Committee was in charge of field events for the evening. WSPT provided coverage of the events and trophies were awarded to the participants.



For many years the band played weekly outdoor concerts and participated in parades, various civic functions, and state fairs. It took part in a welcome home salute for Spanish-American war veterans. In 1923 the band played at the Wisconsin State Fair with the Mexican National Police Band in a ceremony to recognize Mexico as a sister nation.

In early years concerts were given on Main Street and at the site of the old library. On July 31, 1903, the Union Band used a new bandstand at the courthouse for the first time. For many years concerts were performed at the Southside Memorial Park. In 1964, under the direction of James Whelihan, weekly summer concerts were moved to Mead Park. At this time members of the band began a band shell campaign but did not meet with success. Under the direction of new director Robert Van Nuys, concerts were moved to the terrace of the University Center in 1968, but were returned to South Side Park in 1973.

### PORAGE COUNTY BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION

Since 1966 there was some form of planning organization for observance of the nation's bicentennial in 1976, but detailed objectives and plans were not set forth until the year immediately preceding the nation's 200th birthday. In Wisconsin, the State Bicentennial Agency had been providing assistance to county and local bicentennial organizations, helping organized observance under three themes. These themes, with the addition of a fourth, guided the Portage County Bicentennial Commission's planning for commemoration of this great event.

- Heritage '76 encourages a historic perspective through study and preservation of the past. Projects in this area might include: restoration of an historic structure, a written town/county history, a traveling museum/exhibit and sponsorship of bicentennial lectures, seminars and discussion groups.
- 2. **Festival U.S.A.** celebrates the bicentennial and encourages understanding among people through travel and the arts. Suggested projects include: folk festivals featuring traditional foods, dances, costumes and music; art or photographic exhibits, and bicentennial essay, drawing or photographic competition.
- 3. **Horizons '76** calls for the implementation of the ideals of the Revolution for a better future. Suggested projects include: community beautification, clean-up, and planning projects, establishment of day care, senior citizens or youth centers, development of parks, playgrounds or wildlife sanctuaries.
- 4. **Environment** encourages an awareness of the ecological balance and beauty of Portage County's natural resources and of the relationship each citizen has with his environment.

The Portage County Bicentennial Commission, appointed early in 1975, was guided in its activities by two main goals: first, to increase awareness of the Bicentennial in Portage County; and second, to assist and encourage recognition of the event by organizations, communities and individual citizens of Portage County. Plans were made to center the bicentennial observance around activities scheduled for the Bicentennial Summer (June, July and August, 1976). It was also considered important to advocate adoption and completion of projects of permanence and importance as lasting reminders of the bicentennial event in Portage County. The objective was to involve as many people and organizations as possible in a "grass roots" celebration of the nation's birthday instead of merely relying upon the hardworking volunteers who made up the commission. Sponsorship, encouragement, technical assistance, and advice were seen as those indispensable elements of any project's success that the commission had to offer and most of its activities, as a commission, consisted of providing that kind of help to ideas of the **People**.

What were the achievements of the Bicentennial Celebration in Portage County? Although a list of the projects is printed in this booklet, one of the most gratifying, and perhaps most significant achievements was the widespread recognition as America entered its third century, that despite the difficulties and problems still facing our nation, there had been an unbroken

**DELTA OMICRON MUSIC FRATERNITY** — During the summers of 1975 and 1976 these members made and sold popcorn during the City Band concerts at South Side Park. All proceeds were given to the Band Shell Project.

**PORTAGE COUNTY BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION** — A special musical production entitled "Yankee Doodle Fashion Show" was held at SPASH. Fashions, singers and dancers were featured in a salute to great events of America's history. Nine different groups helped and many more donated materials.

AMERICAN FEDERATION OF MUSICIANS — They held a Polka Fest in which 85 musicians donated their time and talents with six polka bands performing throughout the day. Advertising was donated by local businesses and Skipps donated their facilities. The Musicians Union paid all expenses not donated and the Stevens Point Woman's Club was in charge of publicity.

**ST. MICHAEL'S HOSPITAL AUXILIARY** — They helped sell the city flags at their gift store.



**PORTAGE COUNTY BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION** — They compiled a commemorative calendar of bicentennial events held in Portage County. It was silk screened on heavy paper and sold in area stores.



#### **SUMMER AND FALL 1976**

BARBERSHOPPERS — A spring variety show was held at P.J. Jacobs. Also involved in the production were the City Band, Sweet Adelines, SPASH Jazz Band and Swing Chorus, Barbershoppers and the Sentrymen Quartet. The Portage County Medical Association contributed funds for persons from the Hi-Rise Manor Apartments, the Portage County Home and River Pines Nursing Home to attend. Transporation was donated by the Stevens Point Bus Co-op. Cosponsors of the event were the Junior Woman's Club.

**J.C. PENNEY PARKING LOT SALE** — Several groups baked food and provided craft items for sale: Sisterhood Beth Israel, Eastern Star, Secretaries Association, the American Legion, and the Junior Woman's Club.

**PACELLI HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT COUNCIL** — They held a sockhop to raise funds for their float and for the Band Shell.

line of progress since the Declaration of Independence was signed and further, that the Declaration was a life force of America through its citizens. There was a reawakened sense of importance of individual rights as well as a new acknowledgement of individual responsibilities; there was a sense of pleasure in the fellowship of working for a common goal; there was the exhilaration of learning once again, that our society still presents great opportunities for **each person** to be of influence as an American. There was, in short, a true reawakening of the Spirit of '76.



### THE 1976 BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION IN PORTAGE COUNTY

Gained national recognition as an official Bicentennial Community by the National American Revolution Bicentennial Administration. Official status assists in getting help on projects and in publicity through permission to use the official bicentennial materials and symbols.

Conducted a survey of bicentennial plans among 285 government units, organizations and individuals in Portage County to assist the Commission's own planning.

A matching grant prepared by the Stevens Point school District bicentennial group was awarded for a project to create an oral history of the Polish in Central Wisconsin.

Assisted the judging of the City of Stevens Point Flag design contest.

Conducted Flag Day ceremonies in the County Seat on June 14, 1975, using the occasion to declare the start of the Bicentennial Year in Portage County and presenting the County with a Bicentennial banner and a national flag.

Established a newsletter and calendar of bicentennial events. First issue of 2000 copies was distributed July 3, 1975.

Participated with a Bicentennial float in the Honor America Parade, July 3, 1975. The float won 3rd place trophy among 80 parade units.

### Heritage '76

Supported for the campaign to establish an historical museum in Amherst, Wisconsin for the benefit of citizens of that community.

Advocated an oral history project, through the Charles White Library, in the communities of Portage County, utulizing high school student interviews with senior citizens about life in Portage County in earlier years.

Urged ethnic and social group presentations of their particular contributions to the development of community, county, state and nation — such as Polish, church contributions, service club works and the like.

Supported the establishment of a "walking tour" of Stevens Point, Wisconsin historic sites and homes, in cooperation with the Portage county Historical Society.


A Bicentennial Fashion Show "Yankee Doodle Fashions" an historical look at American fashion since revolutionary days.

Issued a Portage County Bicentennial Commemorative Calendar of Events.

Supported the July 4, 1976, Riverfront Commemorative Evening Ceremonies, based on the Centennial Ceremony.



STEVENS POINT AREA EDUCATION ASSOCIATION AND FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA — They co-sponsored a Donkey Basketball game at SPASH. Teams were made up of junior and high school teachers and members of the local media.



**POLISH WOMEN'S ALLIANCE** — They helped sell the city flag and held a group rummage sale in the Spring at the home of Mrs. Adam Bartosz.

**P.J. JACOBS JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL** — A "Country Store" in which members of the student council and bicentennial committee baked banana breads, sold pickles and a variety of other foods to students netted funds for the band shell.

**PLOVER-WHITING ELEMENTARY SCHOOL** — They donated a quilt that they had made during their bicentennial week. Parents helped sew the quilt together. The McDill Homemakers brought their frame and helped the children. The Plover Village Board Bicentennial Committee helped purchase materials. The school voted to donate it for silent bids with the proceeds going to the Band Shell project.

**SPASH** — Their Bicentennial group promoted the Band Shell and donated from various events held. The music department helped to sell city flags.

### **SPRING 1975**

**JUNIOR WOMAN'S CLUB** — A spring fashion show — "Fashion in Concert" was held to initiate the project and to inform the public.



**STEVENS POINT CITY FLAG** — The flags were sold by eight businesses during the bicentennial year. They were designed by Dennis Kolinski and silk screened on felt by Frank Gorski.

#### WINTER-SPRING 1975-1976

**JAYCETTES** — Pizza labels from Portesi, Crazy Jack and Ericksons pizzas were collected in six participating grocery stores. Posters, containers and advertising were made by this group to encourage public participation.

**AMERICAN LEGION** — Bumper stickers that said "Freedom is the Point" were sold at the American Legion club house and in the community.

#### Horizons '76

Worked to establish the adoption of the metric system in Portage County by converting public highway and road signs to include metric as well as "regular" distance measurement figures; provided assistance and materials in setting up instruction in the metric system for school children, businessmen, consumers, and other organized groups; worked for legislation to require that all measurements be listed in metric terms on all official county bids, documents, and correspondence; and sponsored special events (e.g. Junior Olympics) which utilize the metric system of measurement in an entertainment situation.

Supported a project through the Park and Recreations Commission of a construction of an outdoor performance structure usable as a band shell and for other public performances in an appropriate natural setting.

Sponsored "Town Meeting '76" an all-day County-wide participation by citizens in a discussion of challenges facing our community and of ways in which to meet those challenges.



### **Environment**

Sponsored and assisted in the construction of the Portage County portion of an "Ice Age Trail" as an improvement of the environment for hikers, campers and nature lovers.

Assisted and supported a project in refurnishing and restoring the old Stevens Point Square area, including restoration of the Square as a market area during the Bicentennial Summer.

Supported and worked for the development of the river front area of Stevens Point including:

a. The connecting of Pioneer Park and Bukolt Park.

b. Recreational and aesthetic development of Mead Park on the West bank of the river.

c. The establishment, through appropriate agencies (County Historical Society, Parks and Recreations Department) of a Portage County Historical Museum in the area.

d. The development of a system of scenic walkways and arboretum areas

with a separate system of bicycle paths.

e. The installation of appropriate lighting systems and a program of tree and shrubbery plantings, picnic areas, recreation locales and placement of a generous number of benches in the river front park area.

f. The establishment of an area-wide recreation and social center to serve the special needs of senior citizens, youth, and disadvantaged groups, including the recreational needs of both urban and rural residents of the county.

Over two years of actual planning, fund-raising and work will be a reality when the Community Band Shell is officially dedicated on Sunday, June 19, 1977.

A committee of interested area citizens was organized in February 1975 by several members of the Stevens Point Junior Woman's Club. This committee and agencies of the local city government worked together for a successful completion of the Band Shell.

Funding arrangements committed the Community Band Shell Committee to \$15,000 raised locally, \$15,000 from Community Development Funds and the remainder to be paid with city monies. The Ellis Stone Company was in charge of construction.

The main objective of the project was to build an outdoor entertainment center that was multipurpose, centrally located and available to any recognized group free of charge for a variety of events: city band concerts, dedication ceremonies, Memorial Day activities, outdoor ethnic dances, festivals, flag ceremonies and other events of this nature.


Another objective was to strive for a sense of community in the area by working together for a common goal during the Bicentennial year.

In the planning process all groups were considered: the young, the elderly, organizations, governmental agencies, City Band members and other musicians.

With the theme of cooperative endeavor in mind, people were not just asked to give money, but they were asked to be involved in the decision-making and in the actual money-making projects.

### **CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS**

Efforts were made to involve many organizations in helping raise funds for the Band Shell. One hundred and twenty-nine groups were personally contacted to inform them of the purpose and future possibilities of their group utilizing the facilities. Many of these groups worked together and collectively worked to raise funds. In all, forty-nine organizations had projects that raised money for construction.



"Handsome in design" was the description of the band shell noted in the Stevens Point Daily Journal of June 1903. Donations totaling \$300 were collected to pay for the construction. This gazebo-type band shell was razed for construction of the existing County-City Building.

The new Community Band Shell is located in Pfiffner Pioneer Park, north of the Chamber of Commerce Building, along the Wisconsin River. Any Band Shell business will be administered by the City Council. Maintenance and operations will be the responsibility of the Parks and Recreation Commission. Reservations for use of the Band Shell may be made in advance with the city Recreation Department.
