

JOHN LUTZ

John Lutz, an old resident of this city, died at his home on Elk Street at 2:10 this morning. He had been ill with dropsy for the past seven months, during four of which he was confined to his bed. Mr. Lutz was one of this citys' oldest residents. Coming here in 1874, he opened a boarding house at the corner of Water & Park streets, which has borne his name, The Lutz House ever since. He also ran a hotel under the same name at McDill for nearly 15 years.

John Lutz was born in Baden, Germany on Sept. 8, 1833 and at the time of his death was in his 74th year. When 26 years of age, he came to America and located at Williamsburg, N.Y. where on April 24, 1860 he was married to Miss Elizabeth Bass, the family coming to this city the year above mentioned.

He is survived by his aged wife, and six children, all of whom were with him at the time of his death. The children are Charles Lutz, a policeman in Milwaukee, Mrs. Robert Dauber and Albert Lutz of Oshkosh, Mrs. William Mathe, Mrs. George D. Oertel and Robert Lutz of this city. He also leaves a brother David of Grand Rapids.

A funeral service will be held at his late residence at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon and from the Freidens Evangelical Church at 2:30 Rev. Katerndahl officiating, interment following in Forest Cemetary.

Deceased was a member of Stumpf Lodge I.O.O.F., which society will have charge of the funeral.

JOHN LUTZ

John Lutz, a resident of Stevens Point for 33 years, most of which time he was numbered among our business men, died at his home, 809 Elk Street, at 2:10 o'clock this morning (7 Aug 1907). Some few years ago Mr. Lutz was accidentally shot in the eye, destroying the sight of this optic, and since that time his general health has failed. Dropsy and other complications were the direct cause of death, with which ailments he had been confined to the house since early in January and to his bed for nearly four months. He was conscious until the last, and a few moments before passing away he requested that his wife lie down for a rest.

Mr. Lutz's birthplace was Baden, Germany, and the date Sept. 8, 1833, making him 74 years of age. He came to this country in 1859, locating at Williamsburg, N.Y. where the following year he married Miss Elizabeth Baass. They made their home for brief spaces of time at Almond, Grand Rapids, Berlin and Ripon, this state and then came to Stevens Point. Six months later the family moved to Missouri, where they lived eight years. Returning to this city in 1874, Mr. Lutz engaged in the hotel and saloon business on Water street, which he conducted for 20 years or more. He then rented the property and was engaged in the same line at McDill for a few years. On account of poor health and impaired sight he had to relinquish active pursuits about nine years ago.

The surviving members of the family are the widow and six children, Chas. Lutz of Milwaukee, Mrs. Robt. Dauber and Albert Lutz of Oshkosh, Mrs. George D. Oertel, Mrs. Wm. Manthey and Robt. J. Lutz of this city. He also leaves a brother, David Lutz of Grand Rapids, and three grand-children.

Mr. Lutz was a large hearted, companionable man, one who made and retained many good friends. He was also a good, kind husband and father. The announcment of his death will be received with regret not only by scores of people in this city, but at other places throughout the county and this portion of the state.

Rev. R. Katerndahl of the Friedens congregation will offer prayers at the Lutz home on Elk Street at 2 o'clock naxt SAturday afternoon, after which the remains will be conveyed to the Friedens church, corner Dixon Street and Center Avenue, where funeral services will be held. Mr. Lutz was one of the oldest members of Strumpf Lodge, I.O.O.F. which order will attend the funeral in a body. Relatives and friends are expected from Grand Rapids, Almond, Amherst, Thorp and other places.

MRS. JOHN LUTZ CALLED

Passes Away at Home of Her Son at 77 Years...

Mrs. John Lutz, Aged 77, passed away at the home of her son, Robert Lutz, 811 Elk Street at 6:25 o'clock Wednesday evening.

Mrs. Lutz had been sick only seven days, succombing to bronchial pneumonia. She was born in Baden, Germany, April 23, 1839. She came to this country with her parents when 18 years of age and located at Williamsburg, N.Y. where she was married in 1860 to John Lutz. Her maiden name was Miss Elizabeth Bass.

In 1874 the family moved from Missouri to this city where they have lived ever since. Mr. Lutz passed away in this city Aug. 7, 1907.

Mrs. Lutz is survived by six children who are as follows: Charles, Wausau; Albert and Mrs. Robert Dauber, Oshkosh; Mrs. Wlm. Manthey; Mrs. Geo. D. Oertel and Robert Lutz, city. She is also survived by five grandchildren, one great grandchild in Oshkosh, two sisters in Brooklyn, N.Y. and a brother in Florida.

The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 O'clock from the house and at 2:30 from Friedens Evangelical Church. Interment will be in Forest Cemetary.

All of the children were at the bedside of their mother at the time of her death and will remain here for the funeral.

OLD RESIDENT DIES

MRS. JOHN LUTZ SUCCUMBS TO WEEK'S ILLNESS WITH PNEUMONIA

FUNERAL HELD SATURDAY

Mrs. John Lutz, aged 77, one of Stevens Point's old and esteemed residents, died at the home of her son, Robert Lutz, NOV 15, 1911 last Wednesday evening at 6:25 o'clock. Her death came as a result of an attack of bronchial pneumonia of only seven days duration. Elizabeth Bass was born in Baden Germany, on April 23, 1839, and came to the United States with her parents when she was 18 years of age. Williamsburg, N. Y., was the family home for a number of years and it was there that she was married to John Lutz in 1860. Fourteen years later Mr. and Mrs. Lutz moved to Stevens Point and for many years conducted the old Lutz House on Water street. They also conducted a hotel at McDill for a time, but this city was their home practically all of the time following their Mr. Lutz died on August 7, 1907. arrival.

Six children survive as follows: Mrs. William Manthey, Mrs. George D. Oertel and Robert Lutz, city; Charles Lutz, Wausau; Albert Lutz and Mrs. Robert Dauber, Oshkosh. There are also five grandchildren, one great grand child, two sisters and one brother. The sisters live in Brooklyn, N.Y. and the brother in Florida.

The funeral was held Saturday afternoon, and the floral remembrances which were among the most numerous and beautiful ever seen in the city, were silent tributes of love and respect. The services were conducted by Rev. Karl Freytag at the Lutz home at 2 o'clock and at Friedens Evangelical church at 2:30, interment following in Forest cemetery. The pall bearers were George Urban, William Rosenkranz, Fred Stieler, Adolph Roesick, Louis Port and August Mellentine.

CHARLES GEORGE LUTZ

Charles George Lutz, age 79, known to many for his sausage making, died this morning at six o'clock at his home at 526 Dixon street. Mr. Lutz suffered a light stroke in August from which he was slowly recovering and he was able to be up and about. He complained of not feeling well last week and was again stricken Friday. He lapsed into a coma Tuesday.

Mr. Lutz was born on April 29, 1863, at Berlin, Wisconsin. During his infancy he came to Stevens Point with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Lutz, and the family later moved to Independence, Mo. After residing for a time in Missouri they returned to Stevens Point. He attended school here and then was employed in a meat market at Wausau where he met his wife. His marriage to Miss Tillie Egler of Wausau took place in Stevens Point on November 12, 1885. Following their marriage the couple lived in Stevens Point where Mr. Lutz was employed in the meat market of his father. They continued to live her most of their married life with the exception of short periods when they resided at Wausau and Milwaukee. About nine years ago Mr. Lutz began making sausages at his home and he was known throughout the city for his excellent homemade sausages and home cured meats. He retired two years ago.

Surviving are his wife, three sisters; Mrs. William Manthey, 201 Madison street, Mrs. George Oertel, 209 Madison street, and Mrs. Elizabeth Dauber of Oshkosh, and two brothers, Albert Lutz of Adrian, Michigan, and Robert Lutz, 402 East avenue.

Funeral services will be held Saturday (March 20) afternoon. Detailed arrangements have not been made. The body is at the Rosenaow funeral home where it may be viewed after 11 o'clock Thursday morning.

WILLIAM MANTHEY

William Manthey, 73, 201 Madison street, died suddenly of a heart attack at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon at his home. He had spent the afternoon in the down town business district and was stricken shortly after he had returned home. His wife called a doctor who pronounced him dead on arrival.

William Manthey was born April 22, 1875 at Seymour, Wis., a son of the later Mr. and Mrs. Gustave Manthey of Aurbundale. He had been a resident of Stevens Point since his boyhood. He was married to Miss Ida Lutz of Stevens Point August 25, 1898, he and his wife would have celebrated their golden wedding anniversary next month.

Until his retirement a number of years ago, Mr. Manthey was employed by the former Wisconsin Central railroad and its sucessor, the Soo Line. He was a section foreman part of the time.

Mr. Manthey is survived by his wife and by one brother, Otto Manthey of Port Edwards. Several brothers and one sister preceded him in death.

An active member of the Odd Fellows he was a past Grand of the Odd Fellow lodge No. 92 and a past chief patriarch of Monadnoch encampment No. 59. He also belonged to the brotherhood of railway employees. Mr. Manthey was a member of Peace Evangelical church and was president of its brotherhood at the time of his death.

The funeral will be held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Peace church and burial will take place in Forest cemetery. The body is at the Rosenow and Dzikowski funeral home. It will be there until 11 o'clock Monday morning and will be at the church from that hour until the time of the services.

The Odd Fellows will hold a ritualistic service at the funeral home at 7:45 o'clock Sunday evening.

GEORGE D. OERTEL

A Stevens Point resident for more than 50 years, George D. Oertel, 80, died at St. Michael's hospital Tuesday night at 9 o'clock.

Mr. Oertel was employed in the Soo Line shops here until his retirement a number of years ago.

Funeral services will be held at Peace Evangelical and Reformed Church Friday at 2 p.m. with Rev. Calvin Helming officiating, and burial will take place in the spring in Forest cemetery.

Friends may call at the Rosenow-Moore funeral home from 6 o'clock tonight until 11 am Friday. The body will be at the church after noon on Friday.

Born in Baden, Germany, Feb. 13, 1874, Mr. Oertel came to this country at the age of 13. He lived in Wisconsin Rapids before coming to Stevens Point more than half a century ago.

Mr. Oertel was married here Dec. 17, 1902 to the former Lena Lutz, and had lived at 209 Madison street since that time.

He was employed here in the early days of the century in the woodworking trade in connection with the T. C. Voight blacksmith shop on the south side. The shop was later owned by Henry Frank.

Mr. Oertel was then employed by the Soo Line until his retirement.
