Tradition has it that back in the 1880's an enterprising young Captain in San Francisco was endeavoring to raise money to buy Christmas Dinner for a large number of unemployed sailors. He secured a large old ship's kettle and hung it from a tripod which he located on a busy downtown sidewalk. He and his helpers took turns standing near the kettle and encouraging passersby to throw in their coins and thus "Keep the pot boiling!" Since that time, untold thousands have been provided Christmas Dinner through the efforts of hundreds of such kettles around the world.
