Dear Paul:

This letter is in reply to your request for identification of the trout you captured in Georgian Bay. From the clip (right pelvic) and the fishes appearance, I believe this to be a lake trout backcross planted in 1979 at 15 months of age.

The lake trout backcross is a cross between a lake trout female and a splake male hybrid. This cross falls into the general category of hybrids between brook trout and lake trout that is usually referred to as splake hybrids. We have reserved the name lake trout backcross for this particular hybrid to differentiate it from the splake hybrids we were planting in Georgian Bay until 1978. I have discussed your fish with Dr. Crossman of the Royal Ontario Museum, and we are in agreement on its identification.

Thank you for sending me the pictures of your fish. We are very interested to know that these hybrids can survive for at least eight years in the wild, as evidenced by the fish you caught.

If I can be of any further help, please contact me again.

# 35-inch splake's a world record

## Resources ministry should get up to date on other angling marks

If happiness is a lunker, there's only one man happier than Wasaga Beach taxidermist Walter Bush. That's 37-year-old Paul Thompson of Eglinton Ave. in Toronto, the first customer to cross the threshold of Bush's newly opened taxidermy shop. He launched Bush's business with a bang by bringing in the biggest splake ever caught anywhere.

His huge hybrid (laker/brook trout) was 35 inches long, measured 23 1/4 inches around the waist and tipped the scales at 22.5 pounds. According to the International Game Fish Association, official custodian of the world record book, the heaviest splake previously recorded was a 16 1/4-pounder caught in Colorado in 1973.

### Records poorly kept

Since splake don't reproduce, this was stocked "probably in 1979, judging by the clipped right pelvic fin" according to Ontario fisheries director George Whitney.

Thompson took his trophy on Sunday, trolling a fluorescent Rapala at a depth of 17 feet, east of the Nottawasaga River in the vicinity of Stall Strait, which you'll not find listed in any gazetteer. It's a local label for the favorite rainbow beat of CFRB broadcaster John Stall, who pounds it whenever he isn't hitting the airwaves.

Besides having his achievement preserved for posterity in the record book, Thompson stands to

receive \$1,000 from Berkley and Co., which has a standing offer of a G note to anyone who establishes a world mark on Trilene line. Thompson was fishing with eight pound Trilene monofilament at the time.

Unfortunately, in Ontario, an angler could be a record wrecker and never know it. The Ministry of Natural Resources, which should be on top of the situation, is behind the door and in the dark.

Take the colorful Fishes Of Ontario poster the ministry printed and distributed.

For starters, it's confusing, if not misleading, since some fish descriptions are beside the pictures, while others are above or below them. Moreover, it lists incorrect record weights for both smallmouth and largemouth. In the case of the latter, the ministry still accepts as gospel, and as this province's best ever, a 14-pound, two-ounce bigmouth bass the late Leonard Noonan claimed to have caught in Stoney Lake 39 years ago.

It was a hoax, or Noonan's idea

of a joke, if you will. Nevertheless, it went unchallenged for 36 years until, quite by accident, irrefutable evidence was unearthed which proved the bucketmouth was actually hauled from the waters near Florida's Mount Dora, not Ontario's McCracken's Landing. It's obvious that whoever is supposed to keep tabs on finned titans for the ministry is asleep at the switch.

Due to that discovery, the Ontario largemouth bass record reverts to Mario Chrysanthou, who resided in Willowdale when he winched a 10-pound, seven-ounce giant out of tiny Preston Lake back in 1976.

### Heavyweight champs

To the best of my knowledge, the Ontario heavyweight champs are as follows. If you have any information indicating otherwise, I'd like to hear from you so we can get our provincial record book in order.

**Brook Trout:** No arguments here. The 32-inch, 14 1/2-pound squaretail Dr. J. W. Cook of Fort William took in the Nipigon River has led the world brookie parade for 72 years.

**Rainbow Trout:** The 29-pound, two-ounce 'bow that Russell Kenwell of Wasaga Beach hooked in the Nottawasaga River in 1975 is still the rainbow to beat.

**Lake Trout:** Ontario's largest laker is the 63-pound, two-ounce leviathan taken from Lake Superior in 1952 by M. Hamner of Thun-

der Bay.

**Northern Pike:** The provincial and Canadian mark is a 42-pound, two-ounce monster bested by Kentucky fisherman Harry Bed who bagged his prize in Delaney Lake almost 40 years ago.

**Muskellunge:** Unfortunately, the ones that get away don't count, so the top Ontario muskie in the book is the 61-pound, nine-ounce behemoth pulled from Eagle Lake in 1940 by Edward Walden.

**Walleye:** The rod and reel record is a Niagara River 22 1/4-pounder taken in 1943 by Patrick Noon, Fort Erie.

**Smallmouth Bass:** The 11.5-pound bronzeback that Svend Olesen of Thornhill landed in eastern Lake Ontario in 1964 established a Canadian record and came within seven ounces of the world mark.

**Chinook Salmon:** Though there's no doubt the 51-incher Jason Anthony of Mississauga released in 1986 led the all-time list, the heaviest to hit the scales was a 45.37 pounder that R. Polidoro of Etobicoke nailed in the Credit River in 1980.

**Brown Trout:** London's Klaus Mueller leads the brownie pack by virtue of a 24 1/2-pounder taken off Douglas Point, Lake Huron, in 1983.

This is just a partial look at Ontario's winners' circle. Hoping the angling fraternity will point out any errors and help fill the blanks.



# One fish nets him two world records



## Outdoors Bill Thompson

The May long weekend was quiet around the old homestead, except for a Monday night phone call from local angler and Wasaga Beach cottage owner Bob Walker.

Walker reported that Toronto angler Paul Thompson (no relation) had caught a possible world record splake (laker/brook trout hybrid).

Like any outdoor writer, I was ecstatic. But not without some misgivings — fishermen being fishermen, exaggerations aren't unknown.

Following up on Walker's tip proved to be fruitful.

Thompson was trolling a jointed fluorescent rapala in Georgian Bay, east of the Nottawasaga River at Wasaga Beach, when the angling gods smiled on him.

After the initial "holy crapes, I've got something here," there was a one-hour battle, including five long runs from the boat.

With the aid of the other members of his motley crew, Jamie Durnin and Mike Yates, the lunker was netted and tucked safely under wraps.

Noting the size of the fish, they immediately headed back to the Wasaga Beach Marina. On the initial weigh-in, the fish bottomed out the marina's 20-pound scale.

Thompson, unknown to him, now was holding a

possible record fish — but how much did it weigh?

The next stop was at the newly opened Bush Taxidermy Studio. It was here, under the careful scrutiny of Wasaga Beach taxidermist Walt Boesch, that the weight was verified.

The scales rested at 22 lbs., 8 oz. The trophy was one inch shy of three feet long and had a girth of 23¼ inches.

Verification was confirmed upon contacting the International Game Fish Association and the National Fishing Hall of Fame.

Thompson had shattered the record set in Colorado in 1973 of 16 lb., 12 oz. by almost six pounds.

Along with the new all-tackle record, Thompson had set a world "line class" record for 8 lb. test line. This "line class" record, besides bringing Thompson instant angling fame, will make him the owner of a \$1,000 cheque from Berkley. This tackle company awards anglers \$1,000 if they establish a world record on their Trilene line. Thompson was using such a line when his dream came true.

It was great seeing an angler like Thompson reap the rewards of his labor. He is not only an avid angler, but is smart also when it comes time to finding a babysitter for his trophy. He left the record fish in the capable hands of Boesch, one of the most skilled and creative taxidermists in Ontario.

Slowly the buzz caused by this record fish among the fishing fraternity will subside and anglers will be back on the waters of Ontario giving the cat a kick themselves. Let's hope

## World-Record Splake

GEORGIAN BAY appears to have grown a world-record splake. Toronto angler, Paul Thompson, nailed the 20.5-pound lake trout/brook trout cross while trolling near Wasaga Beach, Ontario.

Island Lake, Colorado, produced the standing world-record splake of 16 pounds, 12 ounces, in 1973.

Natural Resources has stocked hybrids into Georgian Bay since the 1950s. The original cross was 50/50 brook and lake trout, and was called a Wendigo or splake. Through the years, more and more lake trout was bred into the fish, and, technically, they are no longer splake, although anglers still refer to any cross between brook and lake trout as such. Fisheries scientists call the present Georgian Bay fish lake trout backcrosses.

The technicalities have caused Thompson and Walter Bush, the taxidermist he took the fish to, some real headaches, as far as getting the actual strain of fish identified, so that Thompson can register the fish in the record books.

Bush sent the pyloric caeca, small finger-like protrusions on the fish's intestines, to Dr. Ed Crossman of the Royal Ontario Museum, a nationally known fisheries scientist, to help identify the fish. Splake usually have a pyloric caeca count that falls between the high number in lake trout and the lower amount in brook trout.

However, the fish had Dr. Crossman and Natural Resources fisheries technician



Wasaga Beach taxidermist, Walter Bush, holds Paul Thompson's big splake. It has several lamprey wounds on one side. The fish has a lake trout-like head, and the tail is only slightly forked—more evidence that it is a splake, since a laker has a deeply forked tail, and a brookie's is square.

Peter Ihasshen, of Maple, stumped. The pyloric caeca count fell within the range of brook trout! And, the present 14-pound, 8-ounce world-record brookie has led the pack for 71 years. With further physical descriptions from Bush, they concluded it was either a brookie or a natural brookie cross with a splake (the original splake).

Photos followed, and the puzzle started to come to-

gether. The two fisheries scientists now feel the fish is, indeed, one of the backcrosses stocked by Natural Resources, although unusually large and with an atypical pyloric caeca count. But they say the only way to be sure would be to have run tests on some of the fish's flesh, to examine the gene structure. By that time, Bush had skinned and mounted the fish, disposing of the flesh. At any rate, they

have precluded it being a giant brook trout, and say it is some sort of cross with a laker.

So where does that leave Thompson?

Dr. Crossman only considers the original 50/50 blend to be splake.

"If you cross that splake with either parent species again, you have to call it something else," said Crossman.

In reality, the possible number of crosses between hybrids is endless. Hence, anglers call all of them splake.

The two major fish-record keepers concur, and consider any cross between lake and brook trout as splake.

Bob Kutz, of the National Fresh Water Fishing Hall of Fame, in Hayward, Wisconsin, said they would recognize Thompson's hybrid as a splake.

Mike Leech, of the International Game Fish Association, in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, agreed that they would do the same.

"To start breaking down all the hybrid possibilities, for record keeping, would be an impossible task," said Leech. "We have to consider any brook/lake trout cross as a splake."

All that remains for Thompson's giant hybrid to be recognized as the world-record splake by these two institutions is for him to submit photos, witnessed documents to the weigh-in, and samples of the line he caught it on, if he wants to claim it as a line-class record, as well as the all-tackle record splake.




