Demonstration At Connor Farm

A demonstration of improved soil conservation and other farming practices will be staged for farmers of the Hunter's Chapel section of Mecklenburg County Friday.

The demonstration will begin at 1 P. M. at the farm of John D. Connor, one of the county's outstanding Negro farmers.

Negro Farm Agent W. B. Harrison will be in charge of the demonstration.

He will explain Connor's method of strip planting, show the successful raising of Arlington oats, and explain the success the farmer has had with dairy cattle.

Mr. Harrison will also explain Mr. Connor's farming plan for the coming year, which includes a big crop of cotton, a crop of peas which will be turned under and the field sowed in alfalfa this Fall as feed for his cattle, and increasing of his improved pasture land from seven to twelve acres.

Mr. Connor has purchased his land, tractor, truck, and other equipment within the past ten years, principally with cash derived from his milk and cotton.

All farmers of that area are invited to the demonstration.
