This millionaire baker is the country's most generous sports fan. During the past 14 years, Mr. Helms has donated more than \$450,000 to an athletic foundation bearing his name. In addition to his duties as a top-notch executive, Helms still found time to foster and contribute to the construction of an athletic hall of fame. At Helms Hall, as it is called, he has helped perpetuate the ideals of good sportmanship for which America is famous.

His ambition has always been to establish a permanent home for sports and he has succeeded in doing just that. For in this "House that Helms built" is one of the most interesting and famous sporting displays ever assembled. Sports mementos, equipment and trophies adorn the spacious rooms of this monument to sports.

Helms' interest in sports is not recent, for as an undergraduate at Syracuse University he was a member of the crew. Now in his sixties he is still an active sportsman. He participates in golf,

skeet shooting and fishing. He conscientiously attends all major athletic events and has awarded more than 750 trophies, 5000 medals and 15,000 scrolls to outstanding athletes.

Mr. Helms is an active member of many civic organizations and finds time among his numerous executive responsibilities to manage the Greater Los Angeles Plans, Inc., to president the Southern California Committee for the Olympic Games and to further the activities of many more.

The participation of Mr. Helms in the U. of R. tournament is not new either, for he has graciously furnished the trophies and medals for the past four years. This again demonstrates his profound interest in the furthering of amateur athletics.

The University of Redlands wishes to add its small token of appreciation to this man who has done so much for the sports world. They take great pride in dedicating the fifth annual "R" Club tournament to this man who has unselfishly given of his time and efforts to perpetuate sportsmanship and promote athletics.

The five beauties, selected from twelve contestants pickd by the "R" Club, will hand out

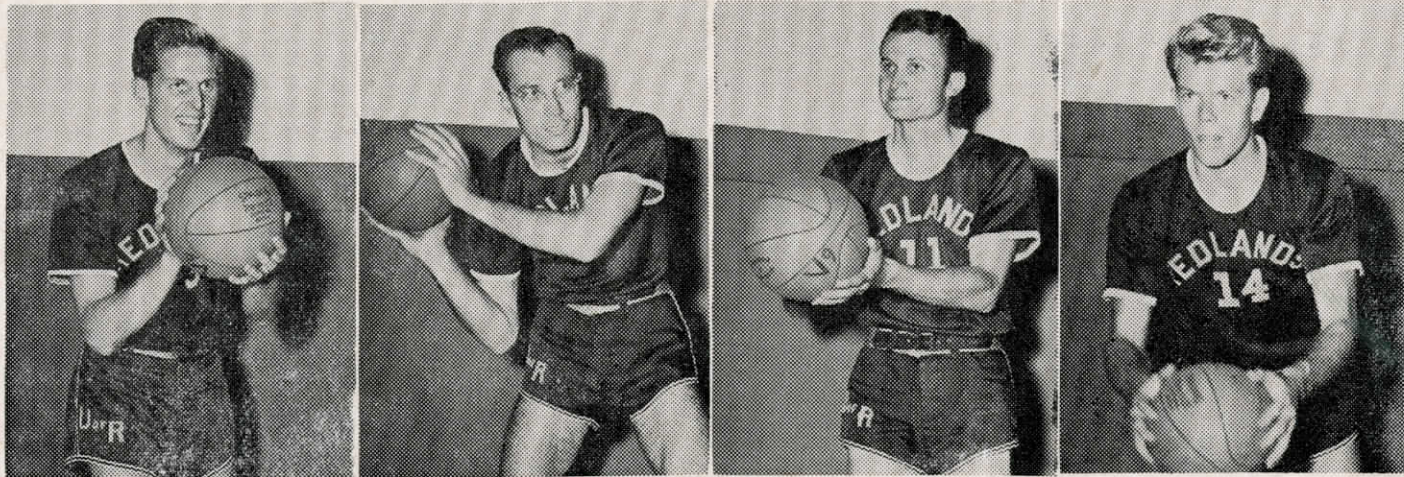
the trophies and present the awards after the final game of the tournament Saturday night.

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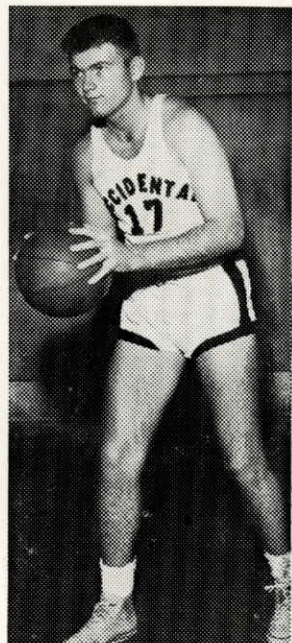

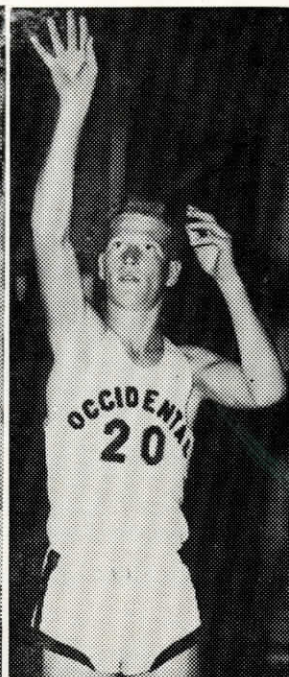

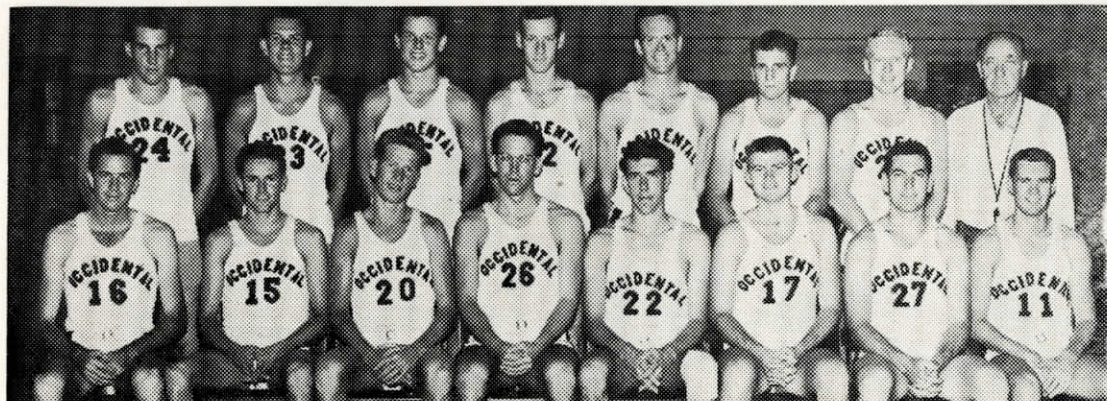

With six returning lettermen, Coach Bill Anderson feels that he has a promising squad which should hold its own in tournament play.

The 1951-52 team has more depth and speed than last season's quintet, making it possible to play a man to man, fast break style of basketball which makes points and also is pleasing to the crowd.

Anderson's fourteen man squad boasts of good material, high enthusiasm, sufficient depth, and plentiful experience. The Tigers, when they get used to working together, are certain to play some colorful, aggressive basketball which should excite high interest from tournament fans.

Rounding out the team are Jim Wakeman, Dan Oredson, Bob Dorn, Don Russell; newcomers *Bruce Gilliland*, an outstanding ball-handler and point maker, Ray Taylor, Baxter Golden, and Jim Ryan.

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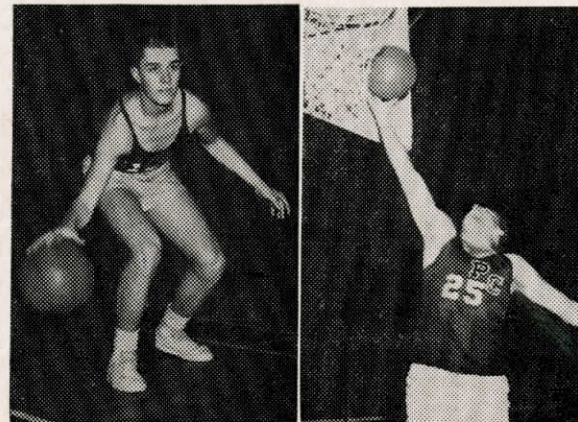

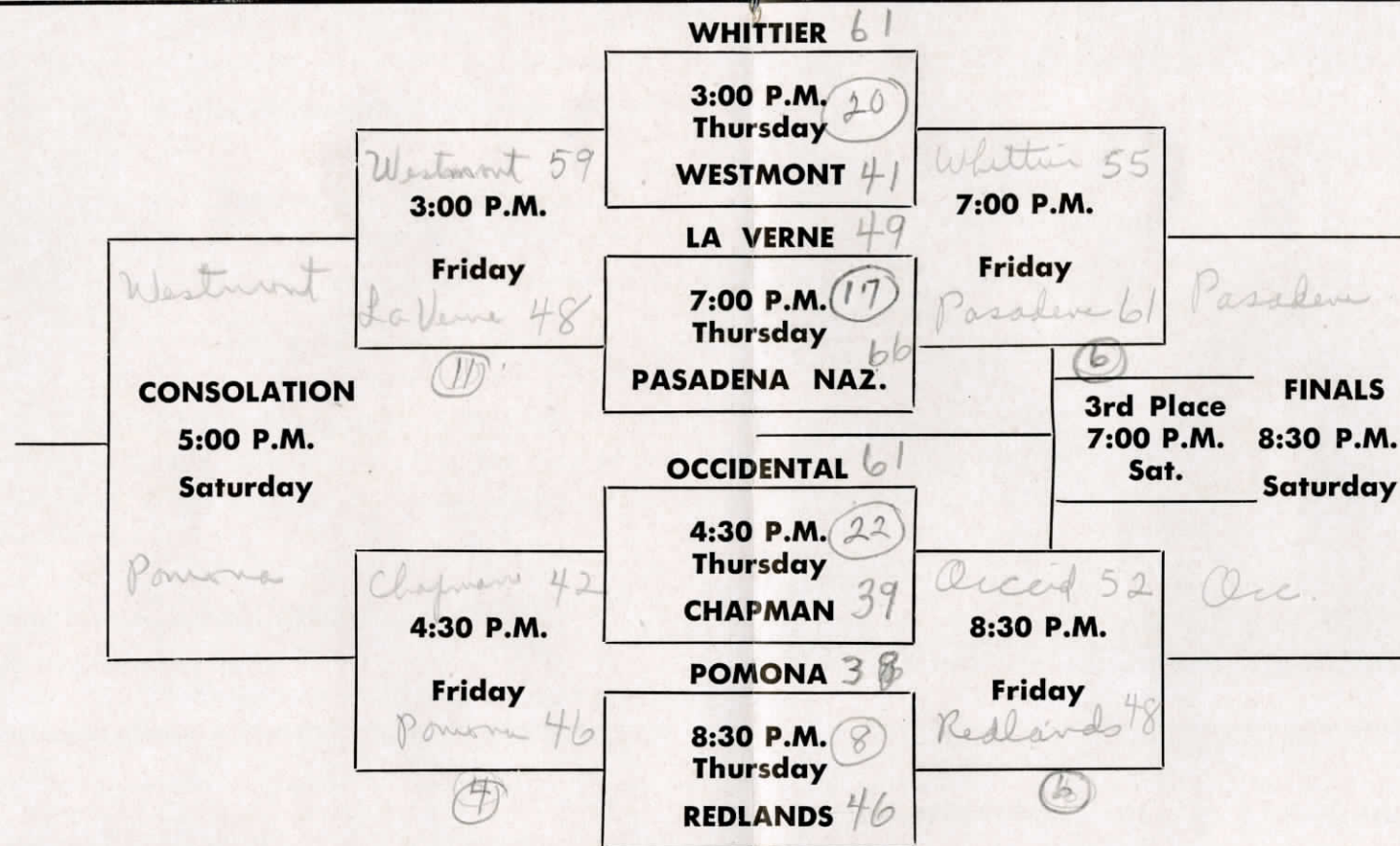

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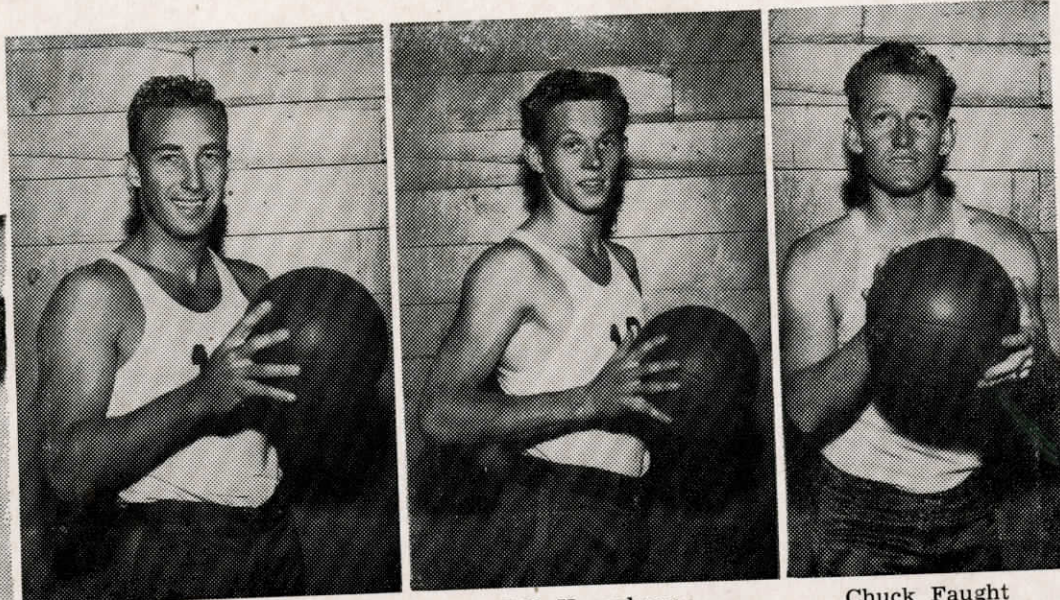

Losing only two men from the 1950-51 squad, Coach Aubrey Bonham sends to Redlands a team which has a very likely chance to cop the tournament title this year.

The Poets have a fast-breaking style of ball-handling, and, gaining the height lacking last year, are equally strong on both the offense and defense.

Bonham retains players who were first, second, third, fourth, sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth in individual scoring last year, and adds depth to the squad with promising material from the 50-51 freshmen outfit and well-versed basketball transfers.

Taking the SCIC league championship last year with nine wins and one loss, Whittier is out to do it again. In the tournament, the Quakers won their first two games, but fell to Cal Poly in the finals.

Bonham will probably stick to his contingent of lettermen: agile *Bob Eck* at center, who mastered the know-how of good ball-handling last year; "dead-shot" forward, *Chuck Faught*, whose 409 tallies were the Poets best and good enough to put him second on the conference scoring list; top rebounder *Len Craven*, at the other forward spot, who intelligently and coolly works the floor duties; and guards, *Archie Haskins*, noted for his team spirit and who never stops playing ball; *Bill Konzelman*, one of the team's fastest men, key player on offense; and *Warren Winchester*, top defensive man; all of whom should see a fair amount of action.

For Whittier's defensive backbone, Bonham will use Bill Story, John Springer, Hal Conley, up from the frosh squad, and Don Turner, who saw a lot of action under the basket last year.

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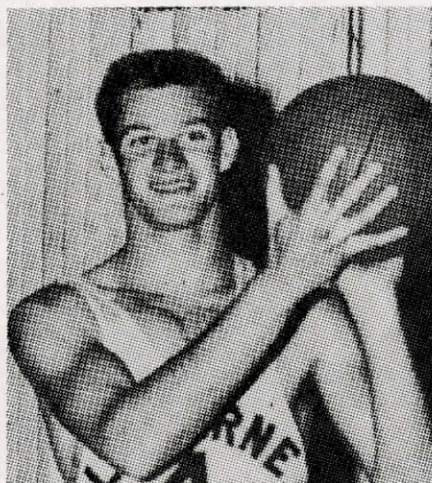
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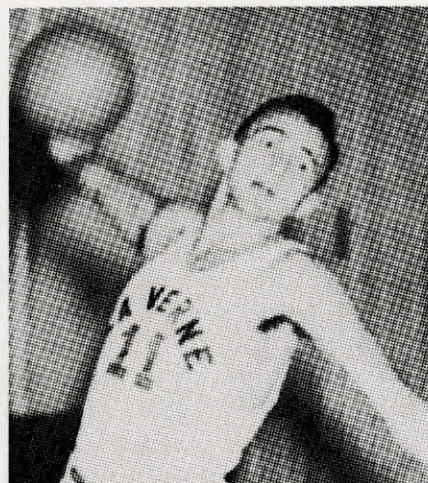
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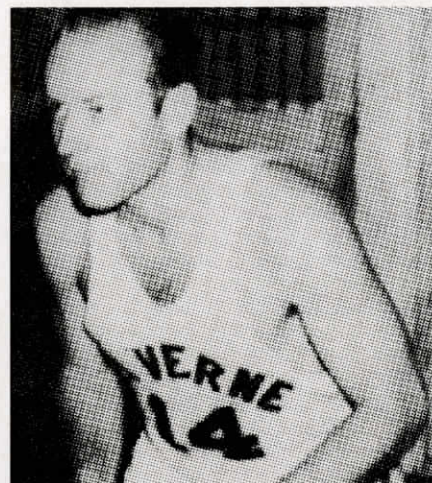
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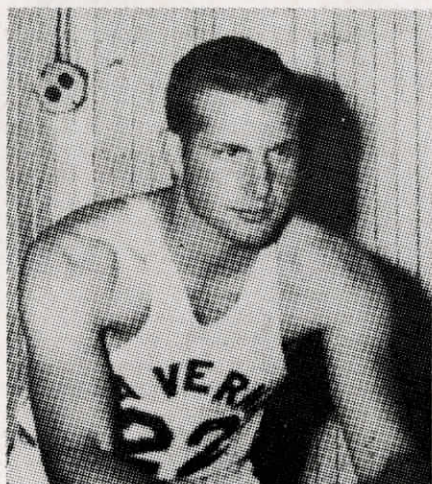

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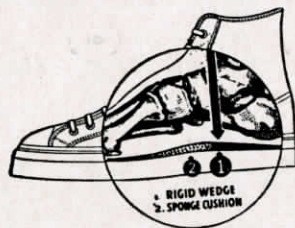
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LA VERNE COLLEGE

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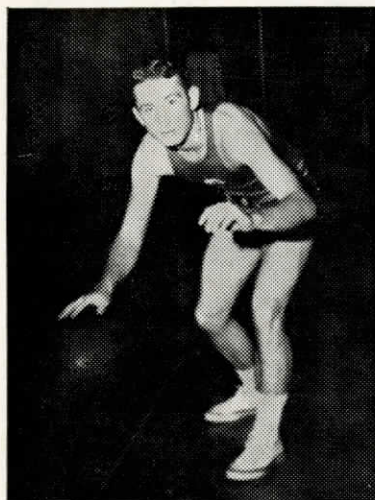

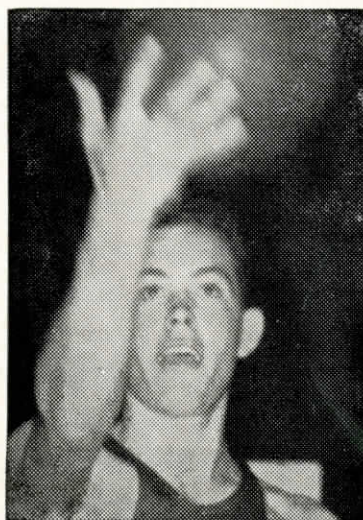

If he can weld last year's highscoring frosh outfit and the returning lettermen into a smooth working unit, Coach Ken Keoppel has high hopes of coming through in tournament play.

Although having lost all-tournament players, Herb Bonner who got married, and Bill Bogdanoff, who graduated, Keoppel still feels that he can build up a point-getting offense.

The Crusaders drive hard, like to steal the ball, and play for points. Their aggressiveness makes up for the lack of a good defense.

Last year the frosh squad won the Whittier tournament, scoring over 100 points in five games and of all games played averaged 72 points per game. The varsity didn't do as well, because,

though having good material, it couldn't hold out the whole game and lost the needed coordinated teamwork to bring it through.

Keoppel's key men, who will lead the Crusaders in their contests, include: *Roland Dean*, pivot man, who drives hard and is a consistent point maker; forward *Vestal Armstrong*, lay-in-artist, whose aggressiveness in stealing the ball puts him down court; all-around player, *John Davis*, best frosh athlete last year, who scores best under the basket; and *Bob Hopkins*, all-CIF high school player, who can basket the ball from any position on the court.

WESTMONT COLLEGE

Westmont should further establish itself as a definite threat against small college ranks as Coach Bill Fisher returns with five lettermen from last year's squad, a team that averaged 70 points a game.

Fisher has been concentrating mostly on bringing the ball down court but also is trying to develop a strong defense, the Warrior weak point last year.

Having height, which adds much to their defense, and being exceptionally aggressive and consistent in offensive play, the 1951-52 squad should be very difficult to overcome.

Last year Westmont did better than ever before in its history, but it wasn't enough. Despite the fast breaking mesh manglers' 70 point a game average, the Warriors couldn't keep the opposition down and therefore, because of an obvious weak defense, lost games which they should have won.

To start the season rolling, Fisher will depend on the returning lettermen: captain elect, *Dick Gibbs*, steady, rugged, smooth guard, who returns as the only senior on the squad; *Dwight Anderson*, top floor man, who will probably shift back and forth from his familiar center position to team up with Gibbs at guard; last year's most valuable player, *Johnnie Crew*, who scored 321 points for a 14.5 game average; set shot artist, *Bill Willard*, who vies for his second season at guard position; cool *Russ Woodward*, reservist forward from last year; and two outstanding newcomers, aggressive *Tine Hardeman*, a natural for basketball, who will probably see a lot of action at the senter spot; and left-handed sharpshooter, *Gordon Miller*, who begins the year with Crew at forward.

Others who should spend some time on the court include Ray Fukuchi, Ted Groshong, Joe Shively, and Tom Fisher.

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Verdieck's Tennis Team Hosts Nine Colleges at U of R Tourney

Nine colleges and junior colleges of Southern California have entered their top men in the first University of Redlands Collegiate Tennis Tournament being held simultaneously with the basketball tourney, November 29, 30 and December 1.

Colleges entering net men into the tourney includ UCLA, Cal Poly, Whittier, Pepperdine and Redlands. Junior colleges slated for competition include San Bernardino, El Camino, Santa Ana and Los Angeles City College.

University of Redlands raquet coach, Jim Verdieck, who is initiating the Tennis Tournament this year, expects to make the net classic an annual event at the same time as the Redlands cage tourney.

Thirty-two players will enter into competition from the schools entered, with elimination based on individual competition rather than teams.

In originating the new raquet festival, Verdieck invited 24 colleges and 30 JC's to the tournament. He feels that the response is gratifying, and expects the entry list to grow considerably each year.

In the past history of the Southern California Conference Redlands has won 14 out of 16 championships in tennis, while the freshman teams have nabbed 13 out of 14 crowns.



THREE TO REF GAMES

Three officials will referee the basketball tournament games this year as a part of the National Association of Basketball Coaches project to accumulate data to further basketball's status in the United States.

Because some games had become so fast that two referees could not cover the court adequately and many people were dissatisfied with the way fouls were called (also true of this tournament), the NABC has been conducting these experiments.

Redlands joins whole-heartedly in supporting this program, and, as NABC results show, knows it will better the tournament.

Occidental College defeated Redlands 63 to 57 for third place and Santa Barbara, the defending champion, won the consolation round by nosing out Pomona 45 to 43 in a thriller which kept the crowds yelling.

Named to the 1950 all tournament team were *Ed Nichols*, Cal Poly's fast driving forward, who also won the high honor of being the most valuable player of the tournament; *Lee Fulmer*, Redlands, *Jim Tunney*, Occidental, both excellent, aggressive floor men, as guards; *Archie Palma*, speedy "go-getter" forward from Occidental; and *Doug Strabearn* of Cal Poly, consistant scorer, as center. *Chuck Faught*, scrappy forward from Whittier, was given sixth berth on the team. *Tom Moss*, center for the Santa Barbara team, was chosen as player showing the best sportsmanship during the tournament.
