A DEMONSTRATION OF LOYALTY

Classes were forgotten Friday, the 16th, from chapel time till noon, for the Student Body was demonstrating that it wants to support La Verne College to the extent of over \$2100 financially and to the extent of 200 devoted lives.

The Student Commission took charge of the regular chapel period with an expectant enthusiasm. After the usual devotional exercises Dr. Miller arose immediately to the occasion and presented the Southern and Northern Boards' decision to wait for lower prices for a Men's Hall, but to respond to the imperative need of the school for a gymnasium by starting a campaign.

Total costs, according to the architect will be approximately \$11,000 for the gymnasium building and \$2,870 for the building for showers, lockers and dressing rooms. The plan is to organize the students as they return home for their holiday vacation and to send out literature simultaneously.

E. T. Keiser Speaks

Following this Mr. E. T. Keiser, president of the Board of Education of the City of Pomona, spoke of the value of athletics as a moral discipline and a valuable source of publicity for the school. The state and the standard of proficiency demand a healthy, robust physique. He insisted that the personal, individual interest of the students is worth more than any monied consideration. Our students come from High Schools where athletic spirit runs high, and this makes it imperative that we have a rousing enthusiasm here for athletics.

He says it's up to the student body, and you can leave it to them.

Prof. Dickey Gives Hearty Support

According to Professor Dickey, who spoke next, Mr. Keiser uncovered the fountain of youth in the rejuvenating power of clean, true athletics. Dr. Dickey presented himself, since Mr. Keiser told of Theodore Roosevelt, as a living example of what physical training will do in making a man of 170 pounds from a 68 pounder in four years. He finished by saying that the body must be made strong so that it may respond to the inner life.

Prof. Funderburgh contributed to the growing interest by reading a challenge by the men of the Faculty to the student ministers to an indoor baseball game to be played January 26th. The rules to govern the game were especially interesting.

Student's Response

The Commissioner of Finance then took charge, and pledge cards were issued. An enthusiastic recital of pledges ensued, being started by a generous pledge of \$100, followed by \$25's and so on down the line. It resembled an old time auction sale, with Harper at the whip.

The wave of gathering enthusiasm was simply immense, and broke in one grand tumult of rapture, when after repeated cries from the auctioneer of "Ye all done? Down goes the whip," we found that we had gone over the top with a tentative total of \$2,045.00.

DOES LA VERNE NEED A GYM?

A GYMNASIUM FOR LA VERNE COLLEGE

Two imperative needs confront La Verne College, namely: a new Men's Dormitory and a Gymnasium.

About \$50,000 has been pledged, part of it left over from the campaign of 1917 and part new pledges for a Men's Hall. The Board has authorized a \$60,000 subscription before beginning the building. The different members of the Board are inclined not to begin building until the price of construction will be lower, since the estimated cost six months ago was \$88,000.

At a recent meeting the Board au-

thorized a campaign for \$8,000 of new funds to be used in building a gymnasium. Mr. Robert H. Orr, the architect, has submitted plans for a building 65 x 85 feet at an estimated cost of \$11,050, and a building 32 x 36 feet for showers, lockers and dressing rooms at a cost of 2,870.

At the present rate of lowering of the cost of construction, we believe that these buildings can be constructed for much less than the estimated cost.

BOOST FOR THE GYM.

Shall La Verne College have an adequate gymnasium? This question has been giving to the Faculty, the students, as well as the Trustees of this college a good degree of concern. It is gratifying to us all to know that steps are being taken to supply this much-needed building.

Anyone familiar with the structure of the physical body and the functions of its various organs, knows the importance of proper physical training in order to develop the mind, as well as the body.

The United States Government found so many inefficient men when it was organizing its army recently, that our public schools are now making a physical examination of scholars especially the High School students, so as to determine the physical defects of the body, with a view of remedying the same. Some very remarkable conditions were found in some of the students, more than 50 per cent of some schools failed to meet the standard set up by the examining board.

GIVE FOR THE GYM

Altho La Verne College needs a Men's Dormitory and an administration building, its most immediate need is a place to provide physical training for its students. The college department cannot enter the athletic league without a gymnasium. Without exercise a student cannot do good work in school. The student who is not in athletics neglects his exercise. A gymnasium would give an opportunity to all to keep in good health.

In order to keep up with the college standard La Verne must have a gymnasium in the near future.

The town of La Verne as well as the college was well represented on the side lines. Quite a few of the business men were seen at the game rooting for the home team. This certainly shows a fine spirit of support for the college. Dave's and Fundy's Monday night Y. M. C. A. group were much in evidence before and after the game. They came to yell for their leaders and for La Verne. No doubt Pomona mistook them for some of our college freshmen. Of course most of the student body turned out for the game. Taking them all together, La Verne had a fine rooting section if spirit rather than organization is considered. To get anything near like effective cheering from such a conglomerate group strung out in a long line is almost impossible. Our cheer leader, Dutch Brubaker, deserves a great deal of credit for the way in which he put himself into the yells.

The first half of the game was a nip and tuck battle with the advantage on neither side. One thing was very evident, however, the La Verne team was unable to shoot. CHAPEL PERIOD FOR STUDENT BODY AFFAIRS

With the hearty co-operation of Faculty and students, La Verne College has advanced one more step in the path of progress. The Commissioners have long felt the need of a stronger point of contact between Commission, Students and Faculty—in other words, a truer democracy for the government of the Student Body. It seemed as if there was a wide gap between each of the three groups which could not be eliminated.

The Commissioners had so much trouble getting a quorum at the Student Body meetings that they disposed of business as they saw fit, seldom consulting the students. Consequently the students believed, and they believed rightly, that they were not enjoying the rights of true member of the Student Body.

Likewise the Faculty seldom attended the meetings, probably because they did not have time and possibly because they did not feel welcome.

Out of this series of misunderstandings, the Student-Faculty Cabinet formulated a plan whereby the students would be given one regular period a week in which they might conduct affairs as they saw fit. After due consideration by the Faculty, this privilege was granted and one period each Friday is turned over for the students, under the supervision of the Commission.

At the first meeting, Dec. 3rd, the Commissioners took charge, presenting the situation to the students, asking their approval or disapproval. Judging from the short discussion given, it seemed to be unanimously supported. Each Commissioner then gave a short talk on the privileges, aims, and the responsibilities connected with this opportunity.

On Dec. 10, a Rally for the College Basketball team was held. Our College yell leader, Dutch Brubaker, led several rousing yells for the team. Then the boys marched in on the stage and Truman Funderburgh, the captain of the team, gave the main points in their plan of attack at the next game with Pomona. Then Prof. Dickey, Mr. Blickenstaff and Prof. Frantz were called to the platform and each delivered an extemporaneous talk. They suggested that we give
