Orientation gave new and transfer students a glimpse of what awaited them.

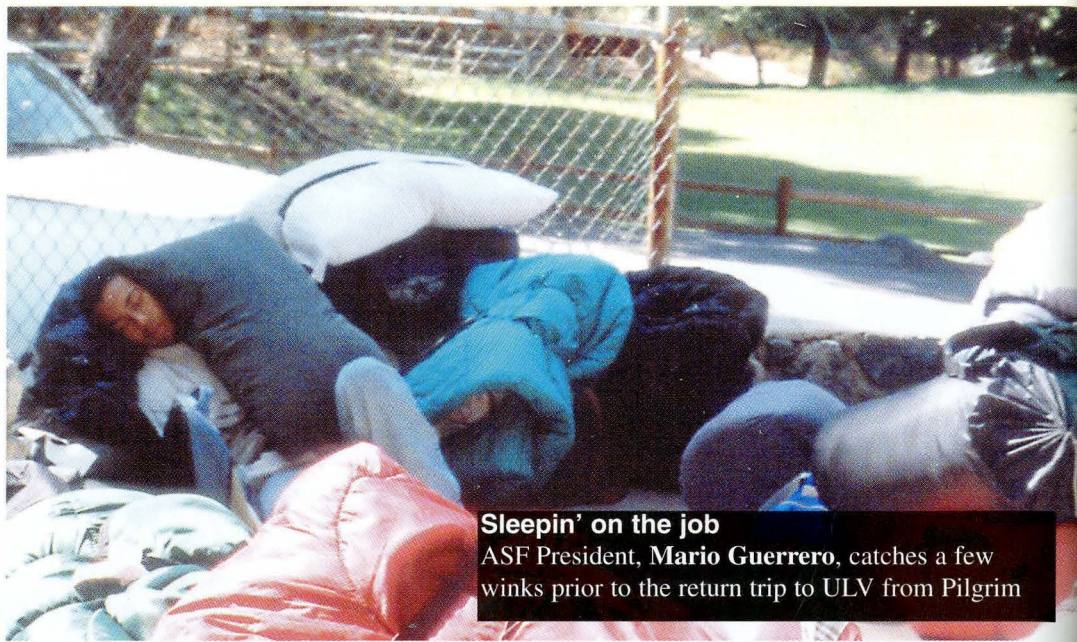
To many, the excitement of college is not recognized until orientation; this year's orientation did exactly that for new and transfer students to University of La Verne.

orientation allowed students to make new friends, get to know faculty and enjoy themselves in their new home at University of La Verne.

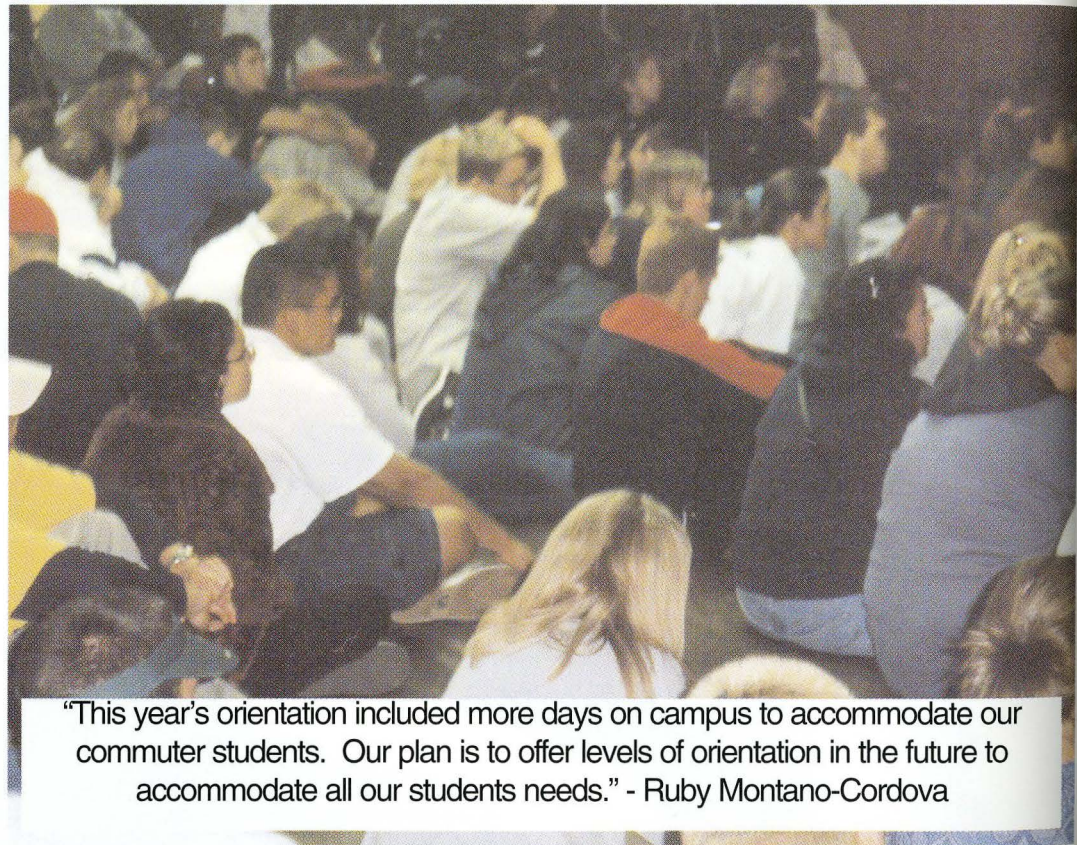
With activities for commuters and residents, each group discovered a unique college experience awaiting them.

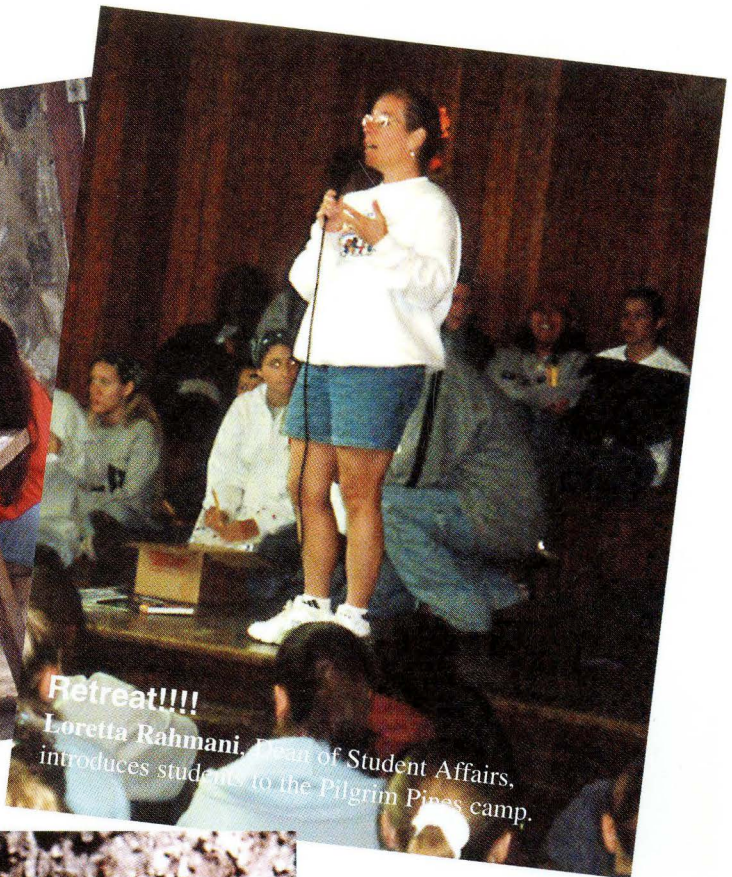

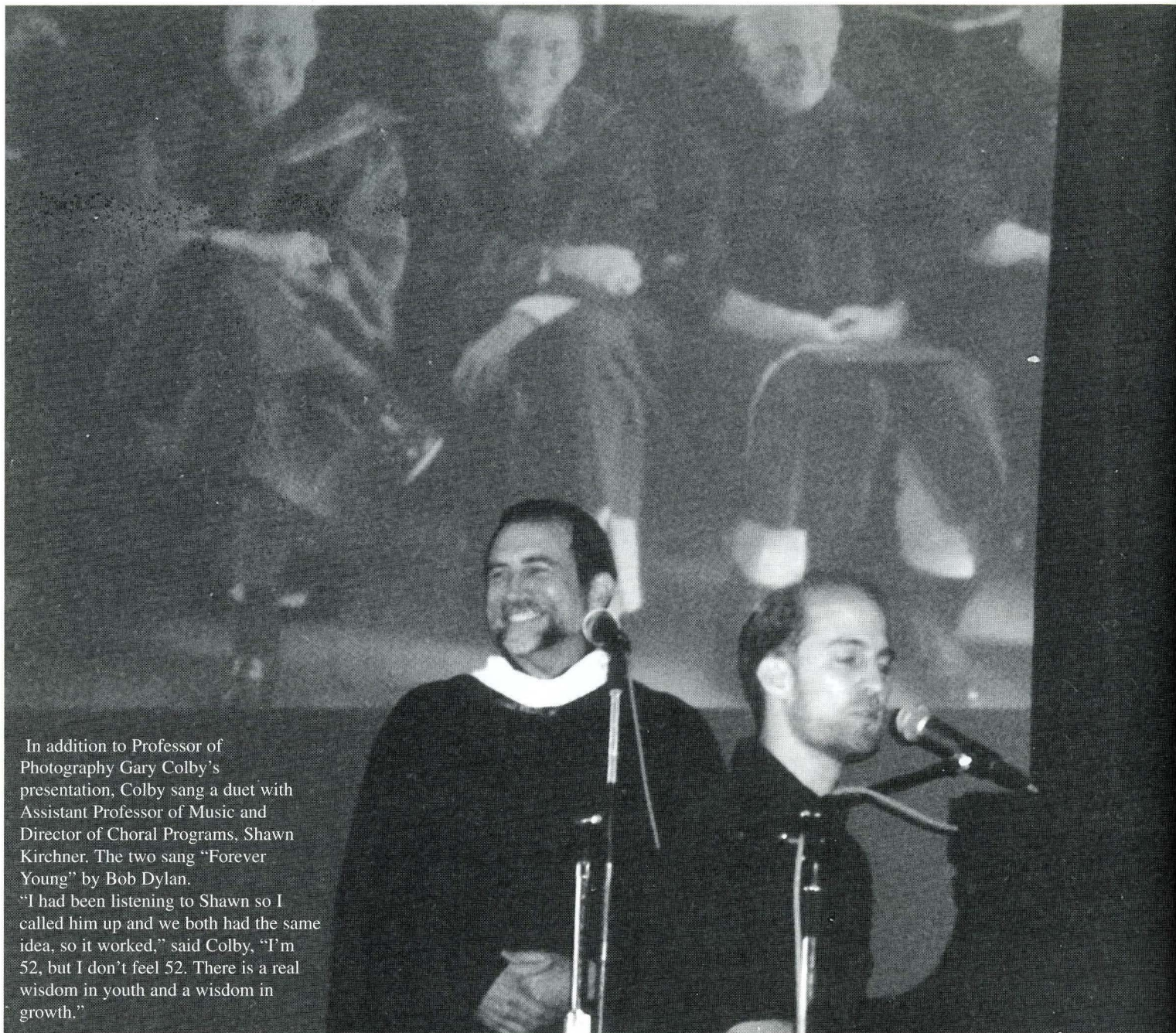

Convocation 2000

Convocation is a consistent tradition here at ULV and to those that take part in this tradition, it is a living breathing event that needs to be taken care of early on. A collaboration of Student Affairs and Academic Affairs is what makes convocation a success. A committee made up of the Deans comes together at the end of April every year to decide on a speaker. The elements to consider in choosing a speaker are gender balances, equity, departmental balances and very importantly, who will be a good speaker. For this fall, Gary Colby, Professor of Photography, was asked to be the convocation speaker. It is then up to the speaker to choose a theme and make it their own. The theme that was set forth by Colby, along with a slide show of pictures, was "May you stay forever young" "They had asked me to do it another time, but i didn't and it was a profound regret. I promised that I would do it if asked again. I asked the Dean what he had on his mind with respect to programs on campus and philosophically. La Verne might become a center of conflict and resolution. We enter conflict all the time. Everyone's trying to do their best. What followed was something to write," said Colby. Colby strived for a presentation that offered new students encouragement for the beginning of school at ULV.

"I tried to think of ways to convey meaning without giving a speech. It had the potential to be fragmented so it was a struggle to make it right. The words had no meaning without the picture. What I was saying needed pictures," said Colby.

What is convocation about really? "Convocations in all Universities is typically having academic speakers to kick off the academic year. They spread a theme to carry throughout the year, and share academic wisdom.", said Loretta Rahmani, Dean of Student Affairs.

Convocation is traditionally held on the first friday of the first week of school, and is followed by an all school picnic. This is a time for the whole ULV community to come together. It is a time to share and feel empowered about the new year. Have you held true to the theme this year?

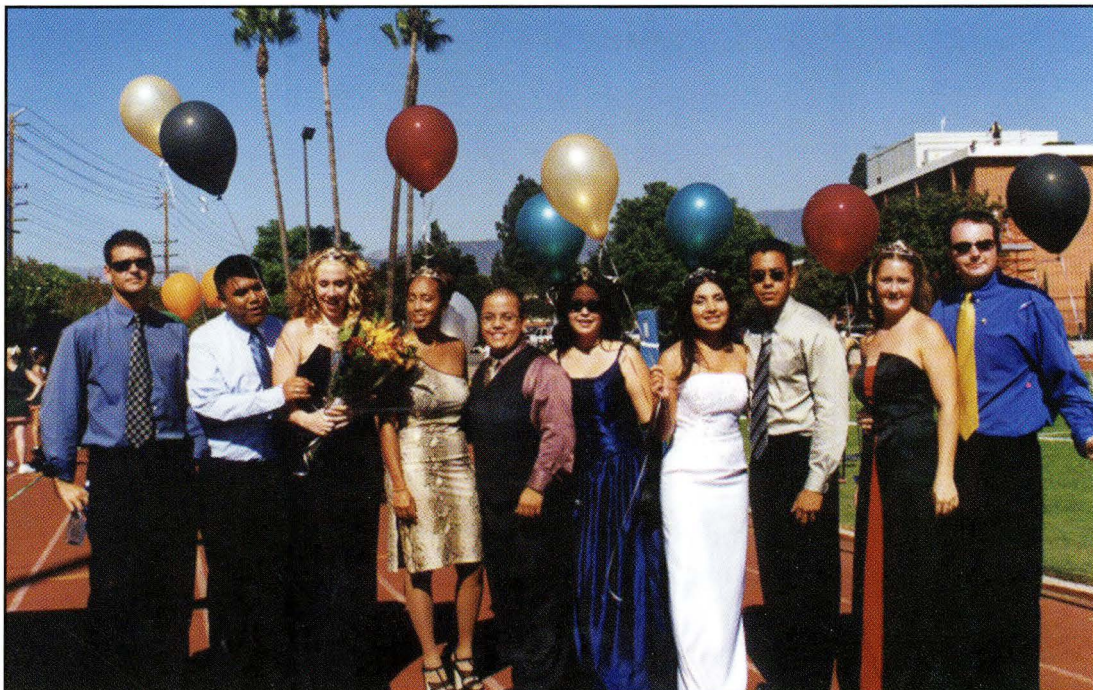

Spirit Week 2000

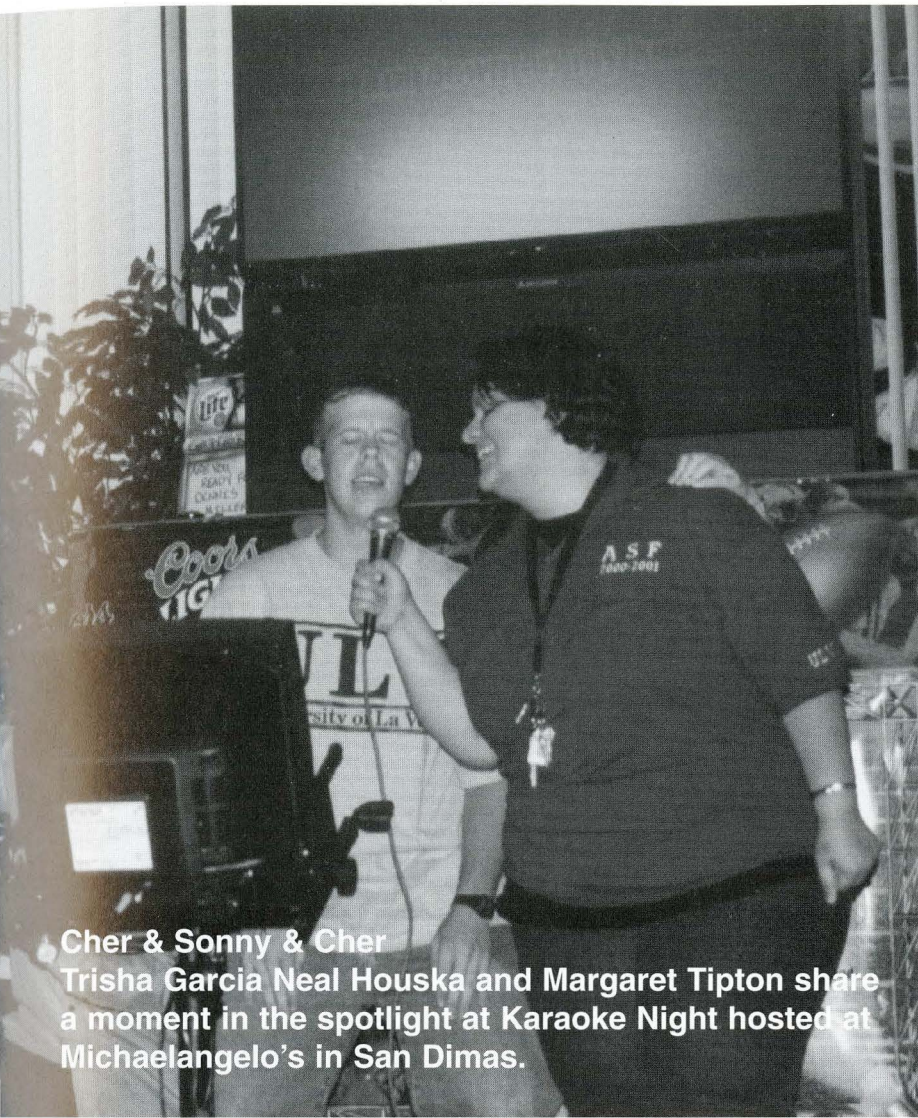
ULV Staff and Students gathered to celebrate and show our spirit during Homecoming Week.

Time is spent studying in the Wilson Library, where many sit and read by one of

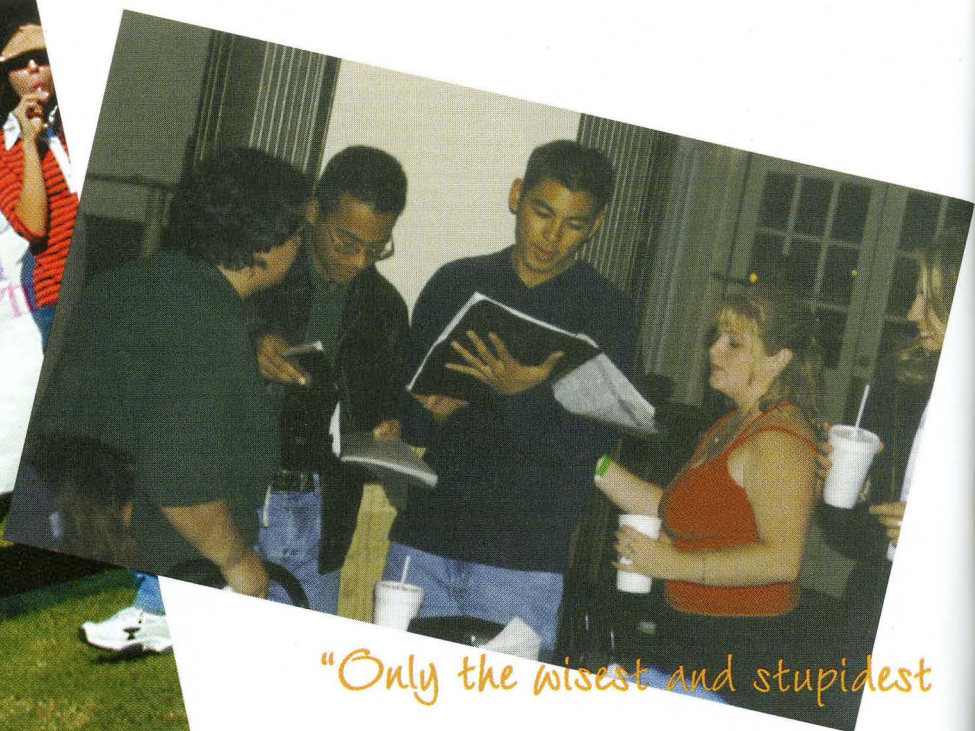

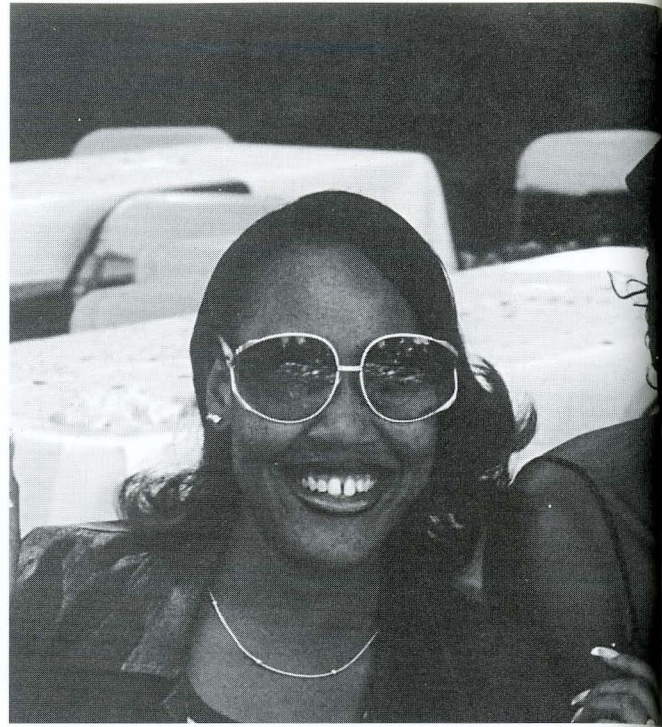
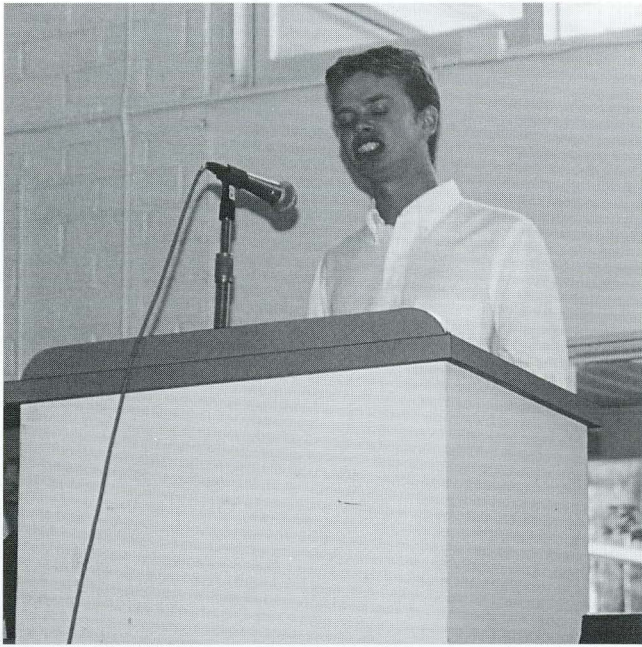
“You know, everyday is an adventure at ‘The Port’, some days your satisfied, some days not at all,” said sophomore Chris Folden.

A trademark here at the University of La Verne is a rock that sits in front of Founders Hall and serves as a

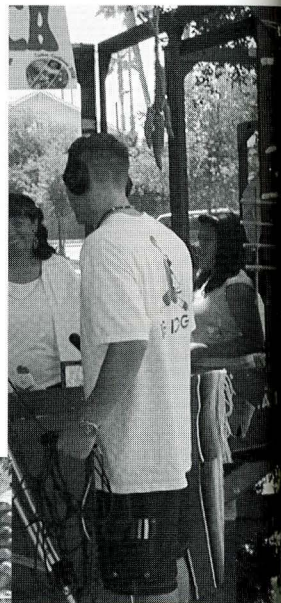

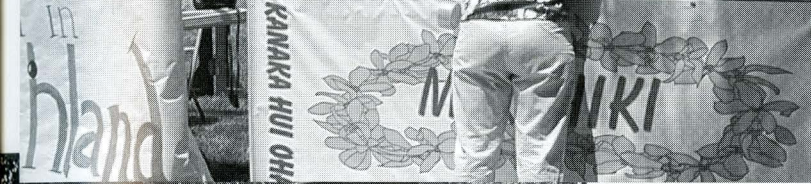
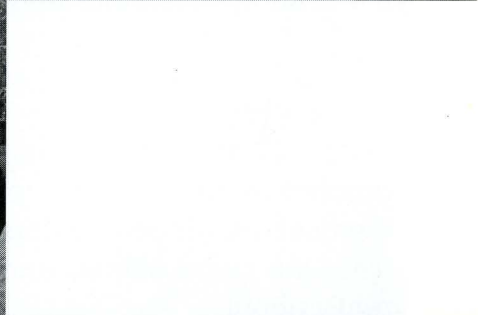
The cement base that surrounds “The Rock” is just a year old and was placed there to protect the surrounding grass from the paint that is used to decorate it.

Approximately 16 University of La Verne Clubs and Organizations gathered in the Student Center on a rainy February day to promote and make known their existence.

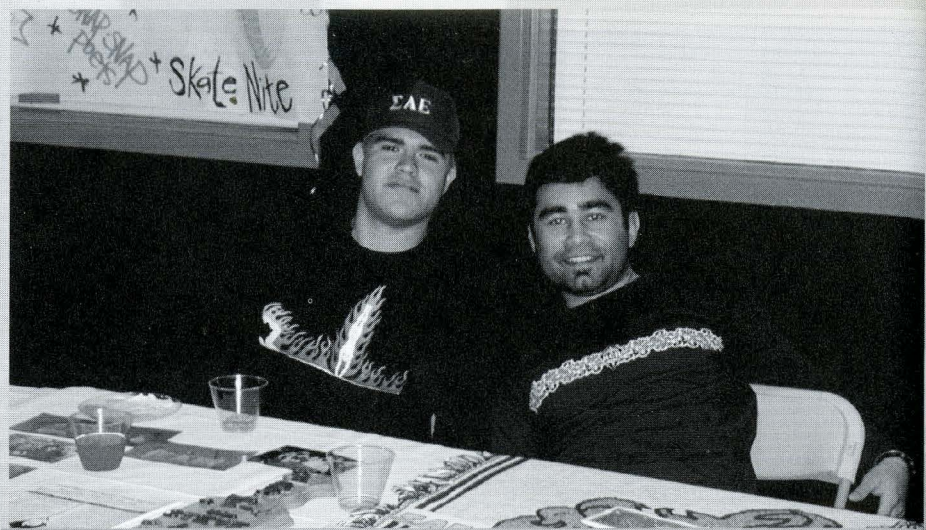

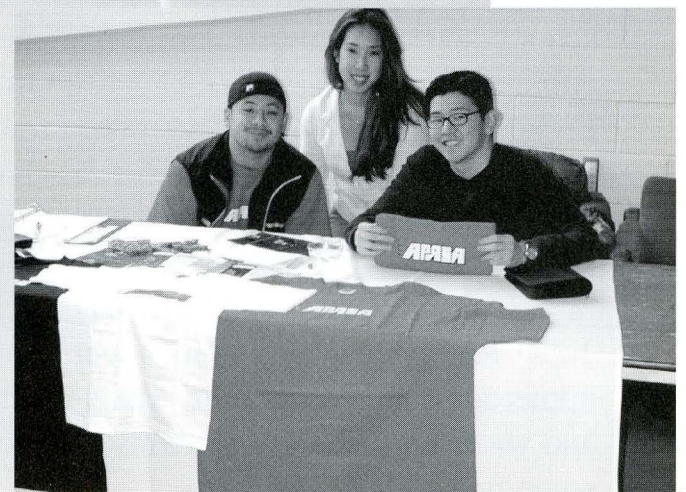
For Sororities and Fraternities, this was a chance to inform and show students their main mission on the campus.

The Club Fair allowed the organizations on the ULV campus to shine and continue their success on the campus and the community.





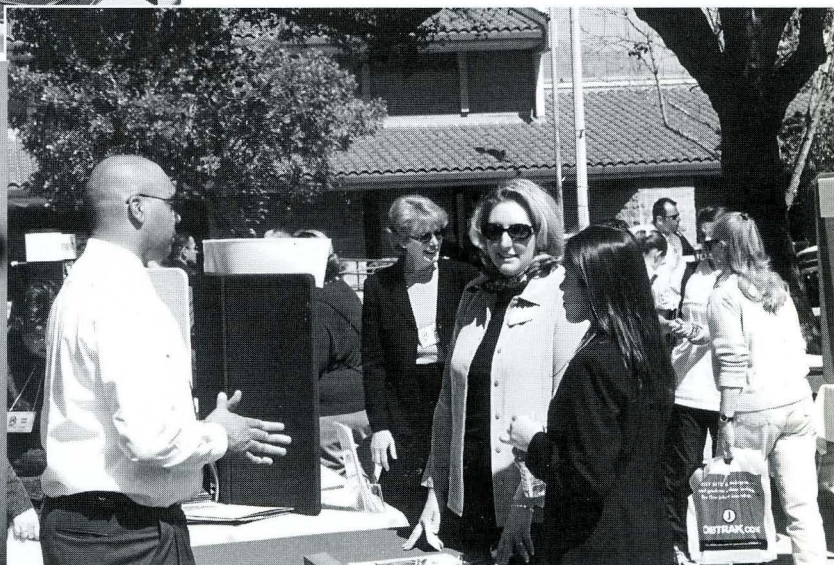
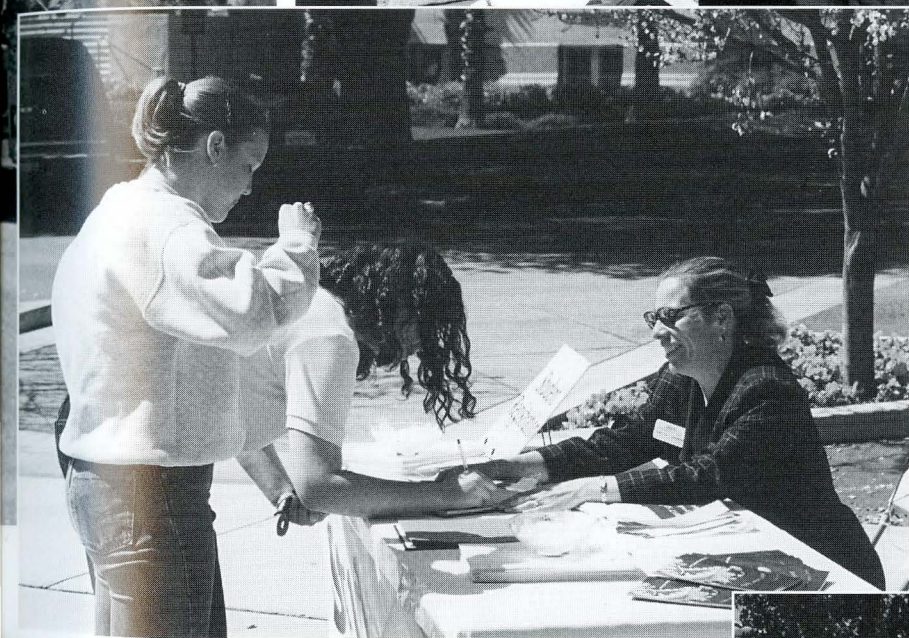


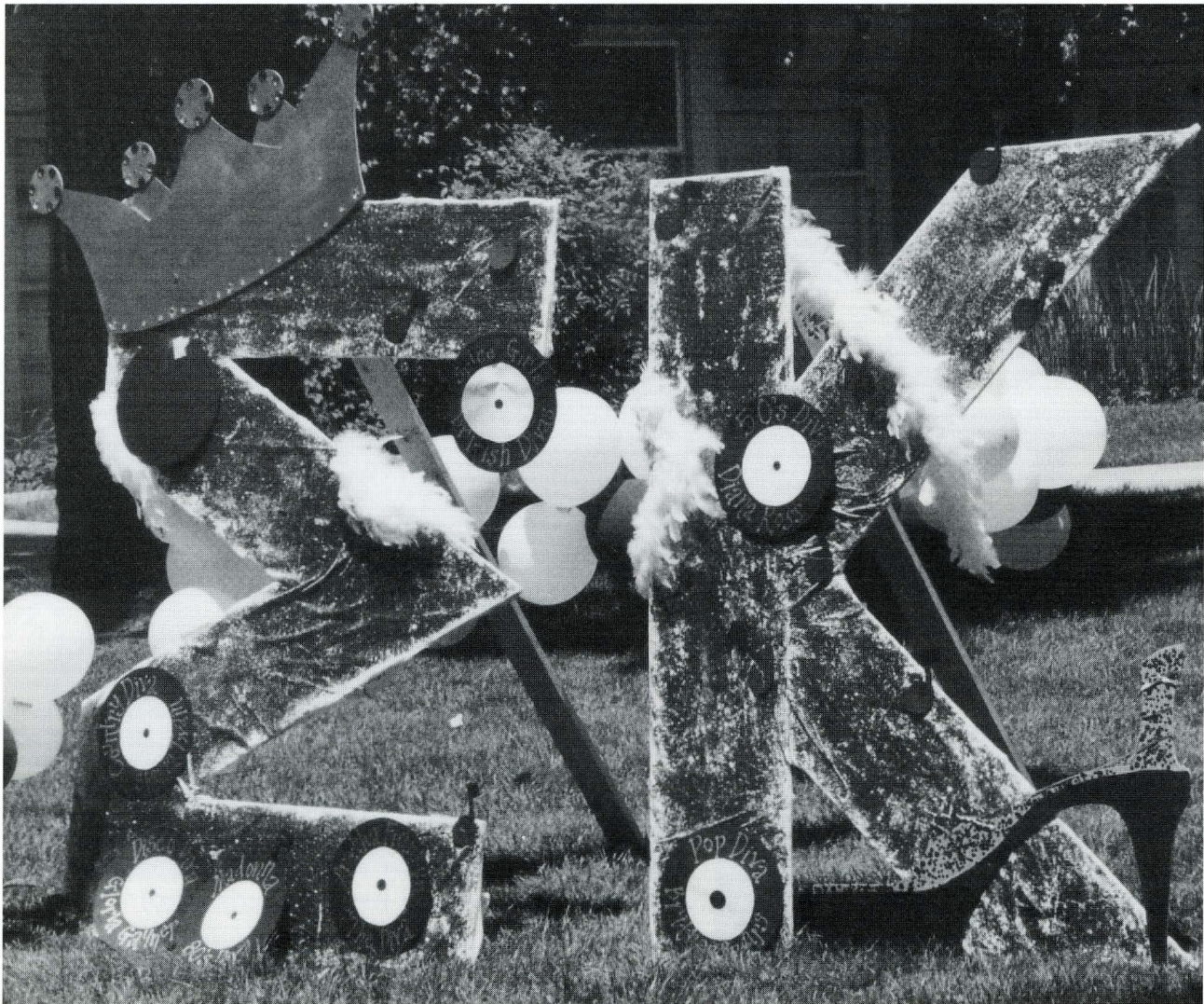
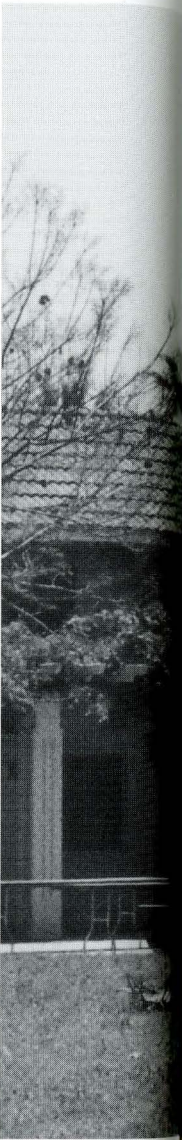
Got Goals?

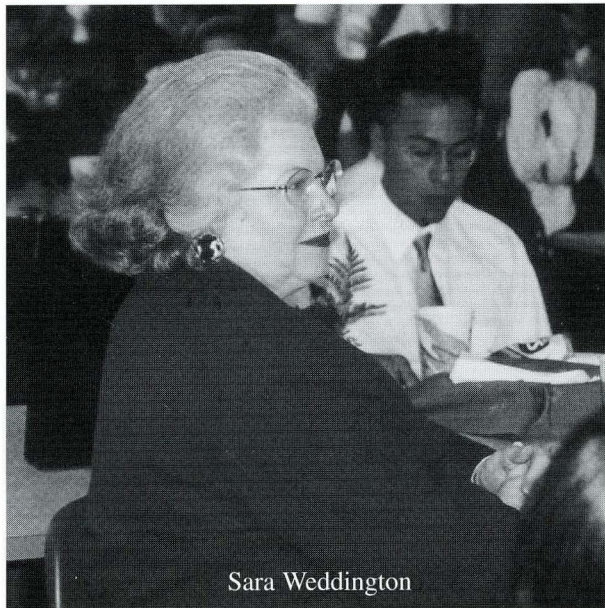
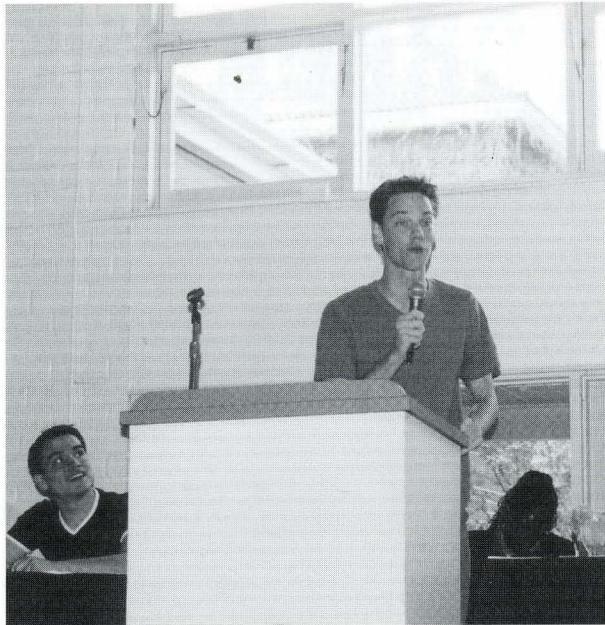
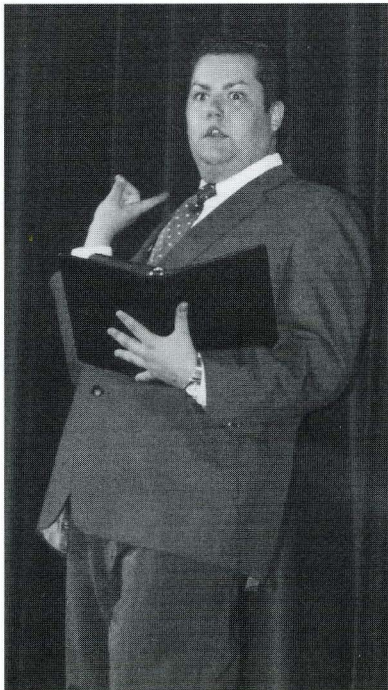
The University of La Verne's Forensics team started a new tradition this year, an event entitled "From This

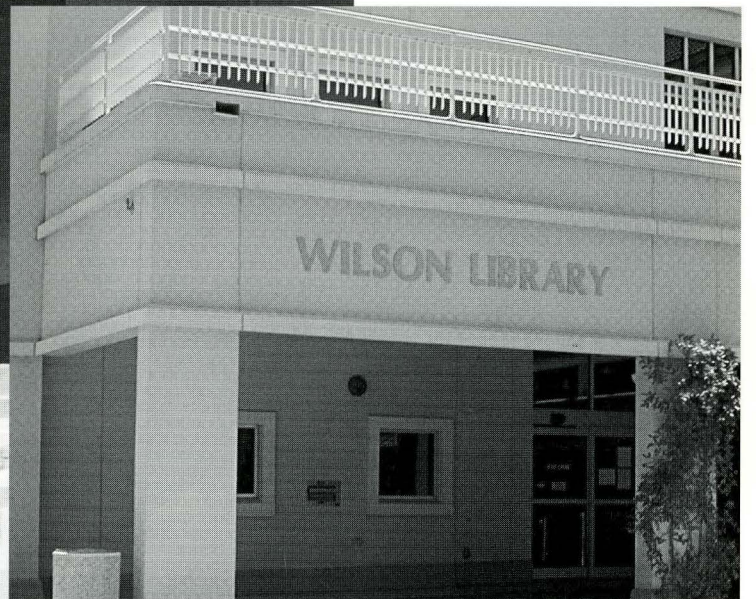




Fifth Anniversary

This year the Wilson Library had it's fifth anniversary since it was remodeled from and old Alphabeta Supermarket building into the library we know today. The Wilson Library occupied the Alphabeta building for fifteen years but the growing number of students required more volumes to be held on the shelves. The one story building that used to have it's front entrance on what now is the back corner, could not handel the amount of books that were at about 150,000 volumes at the time when renovations started. During the renovation the library move to the Roger Barkley building, and the books were held in a warehouse on First St. The library worked from the Barkley building for two years.

When the renovations were complete the building had a whole new look. It went from brown to white, a second story and tower were added, and each story was equipped with several levels. The Wilson Library looked as brand new, no one today can tell that it once used to be a one story supermarket building. Many people made the dramatic change possible. The University raised a lot of the money with community help. The names of those who donated their time and money to the renovation are displayed inside the library, all the study carrels have plaques with names on them. On the front walkway to the library bricks have been engraved with names of contributors as well. Today the it holds over 200,000 volumes and it keeps adding volumes each year.

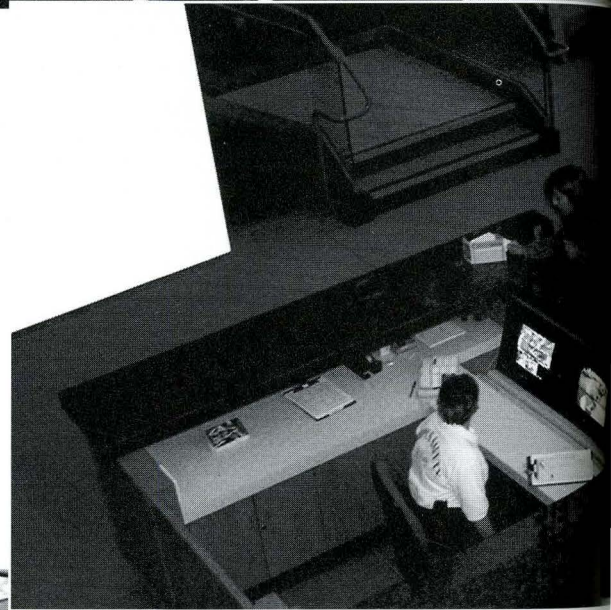
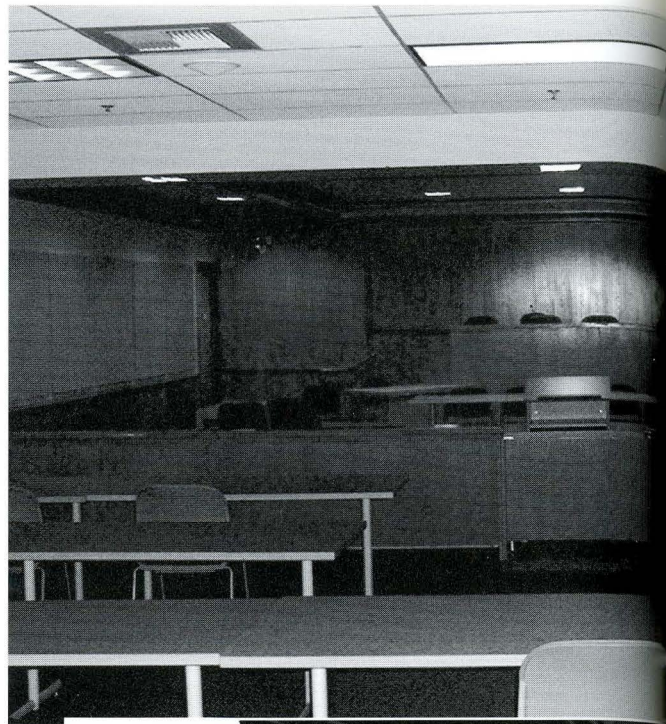


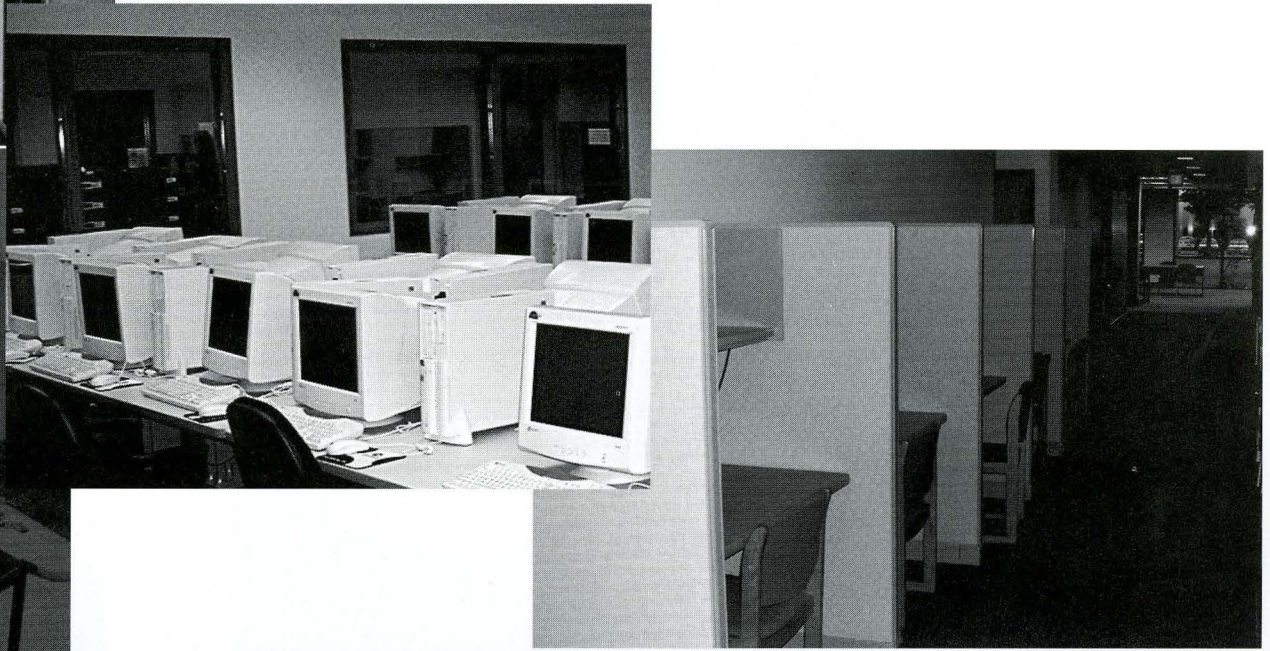
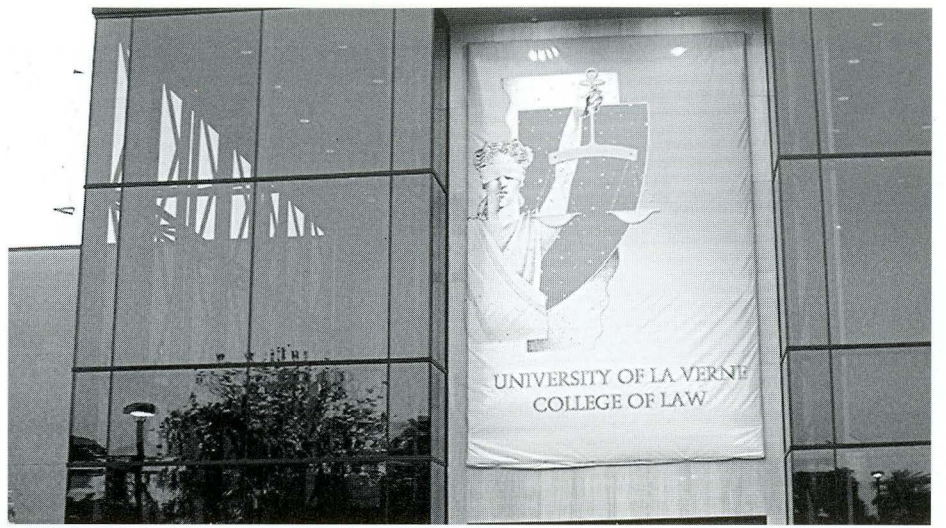


ULV Ontario Law School

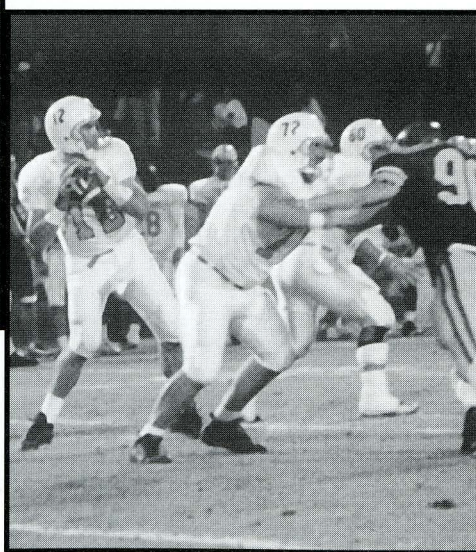

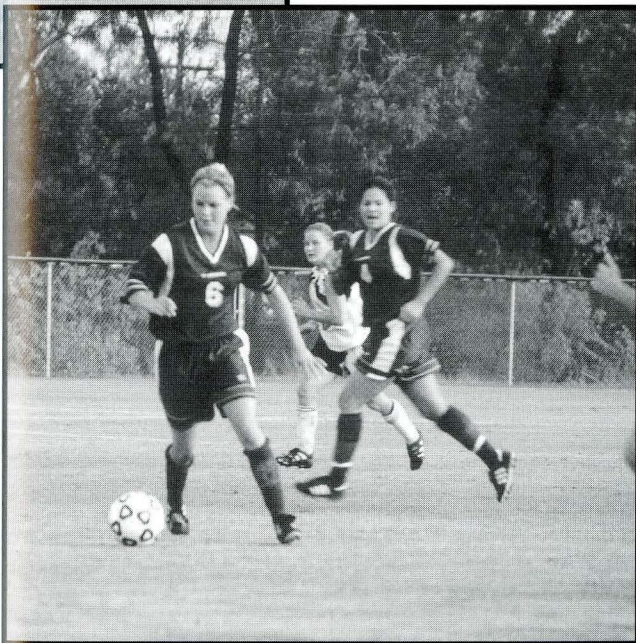
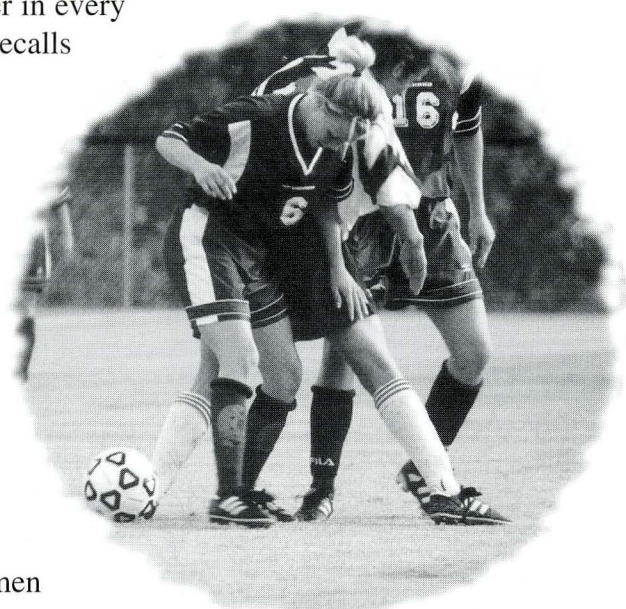
Women's Soccer

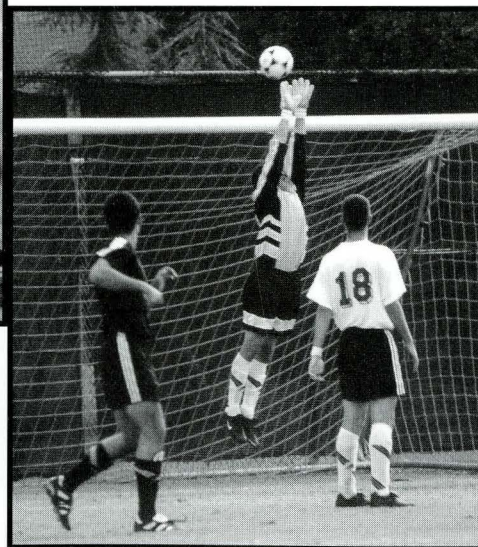

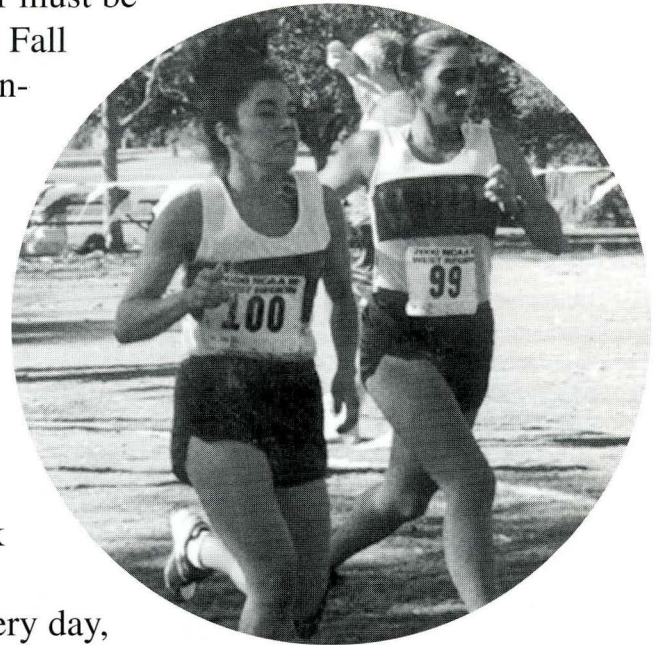
Cross Country

When training starts in August, the runners are training and running six days a week.

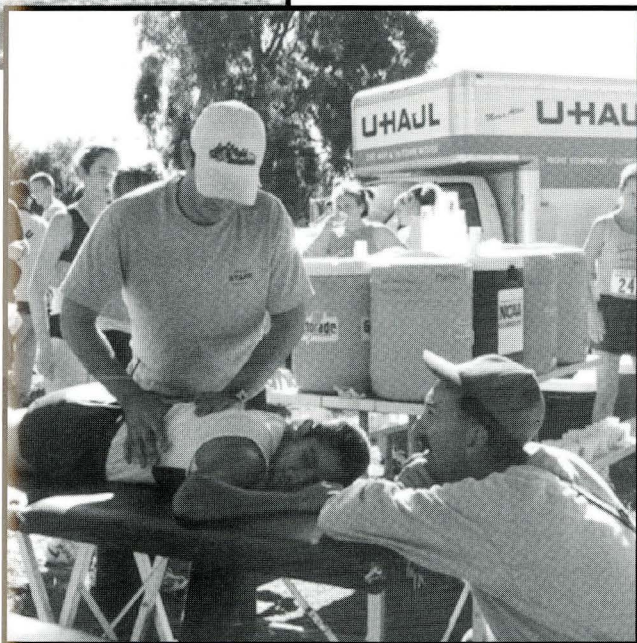
"NCAA requires that we only practice as a team 6 days a week as opposed to 7," said Cross Country/Track coach Pat Widolff.

The men run 10 miles every day, and the women run 8 miles a day.

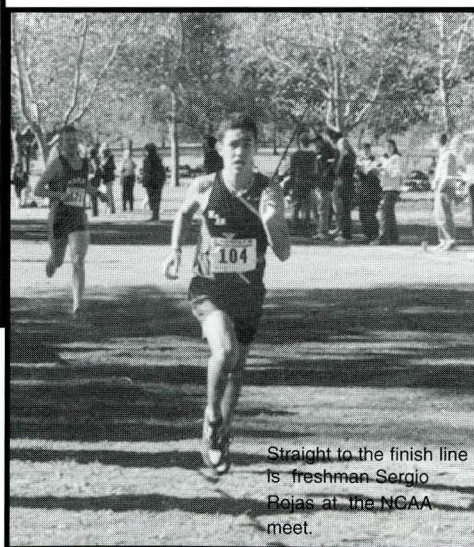

The all-conference runners for this season were junior Lucas Neubauer for the men and junior Leti Arroyo for the women.



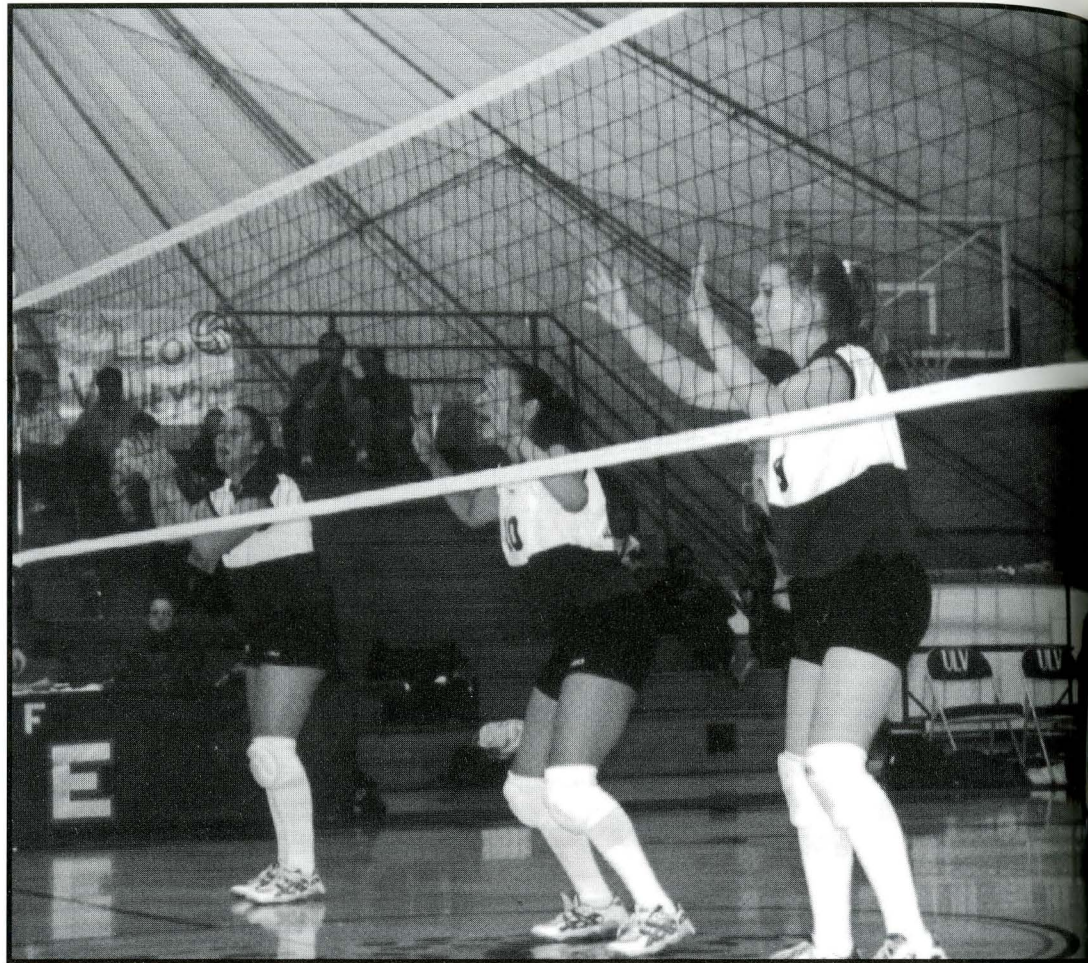

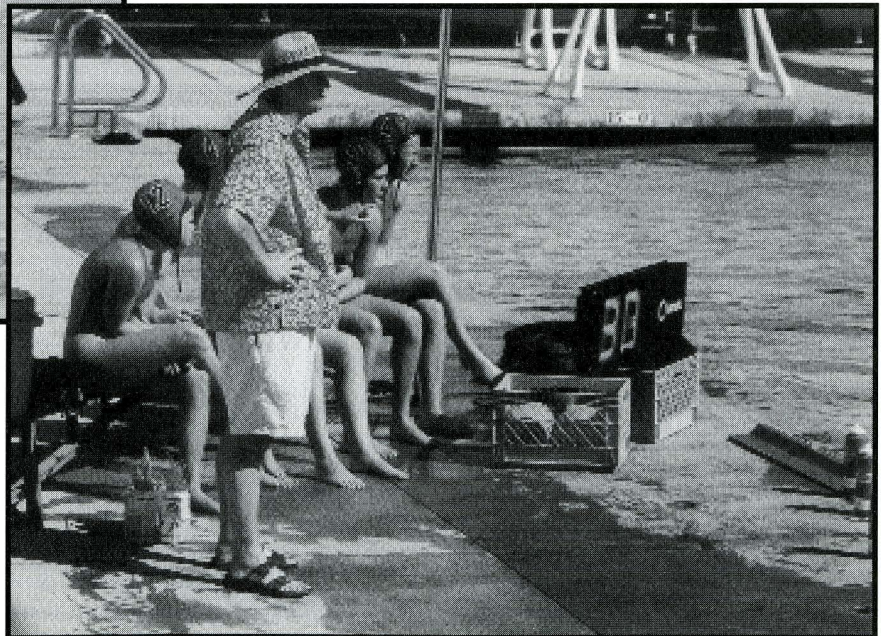
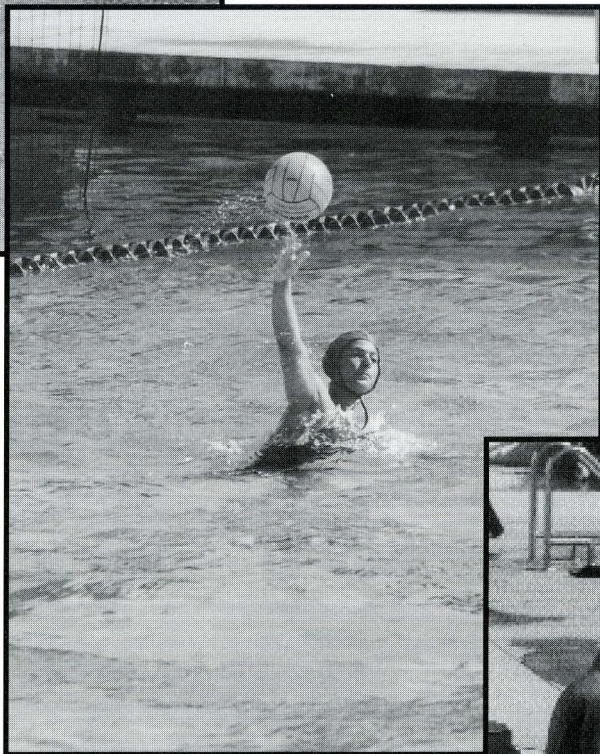
Women's Waterpolo

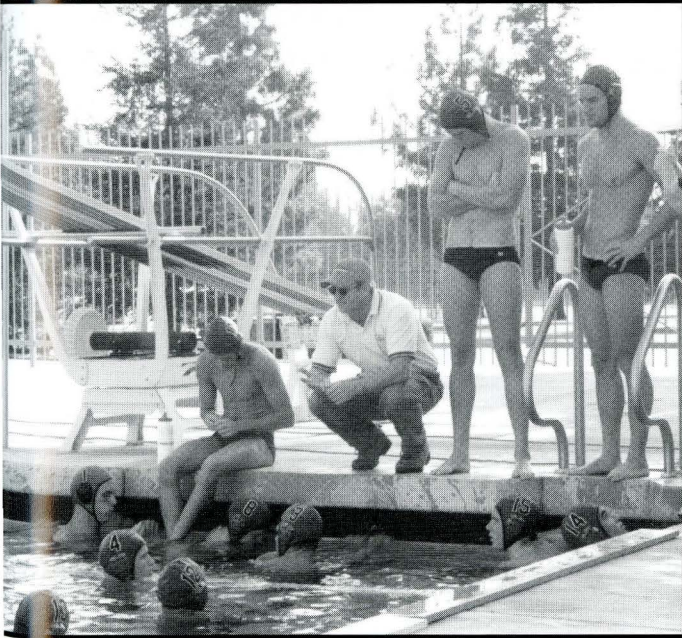
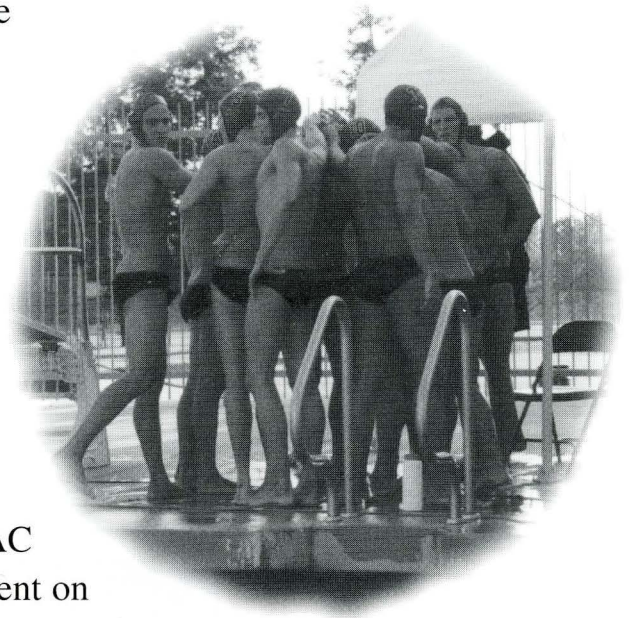
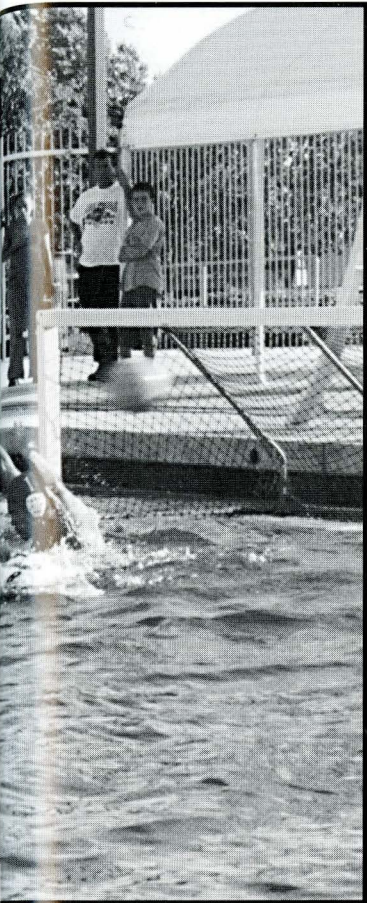
Men's Water Polo

"I could tell we were going to have a good team from the start, I had good team mates," said Jr. **Alan Shumway**.

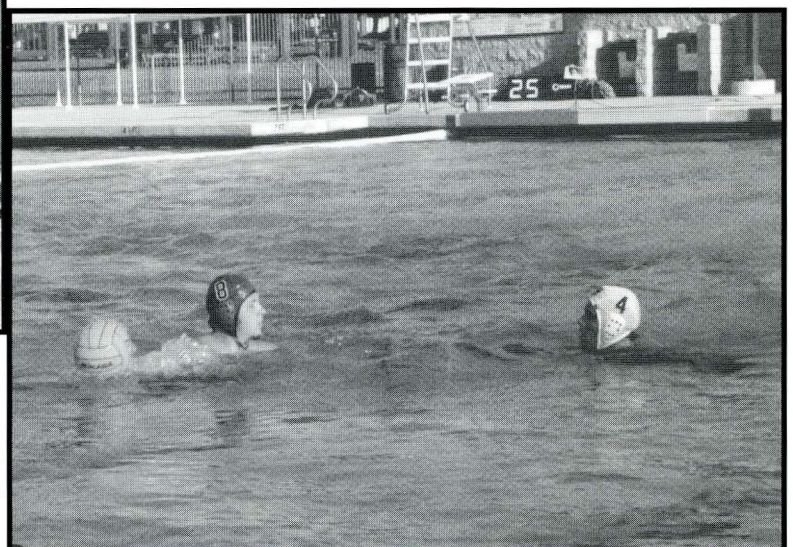
In November they beat Redlands to become the SCIAC champions. Then then they went on to compete in the Western Water Polo

"Some days we had double practice and land training. It took up a lot of time but it helped out in the end," said freshman and Nationals qualifier, **Jason Walters**.

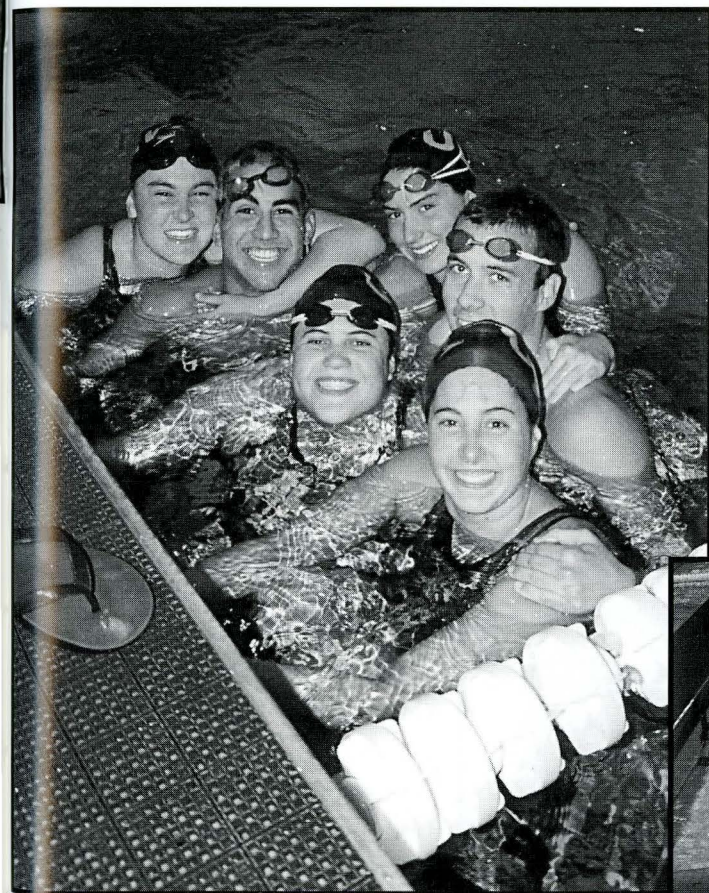

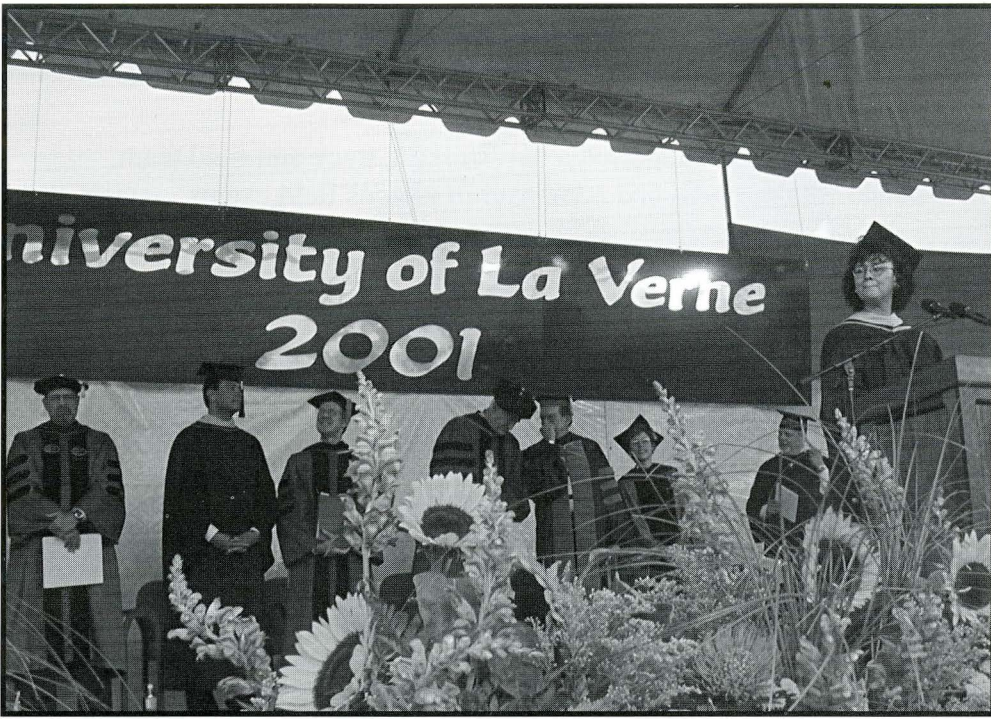
Men & Women's Track & Field

The track and field team traveled around the southland to Fullerton, Eagle Rock, Irvine

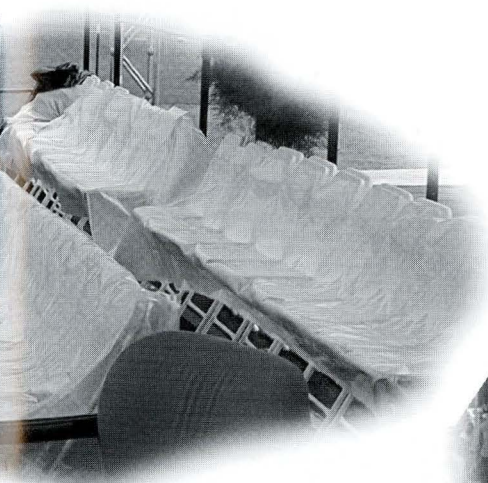
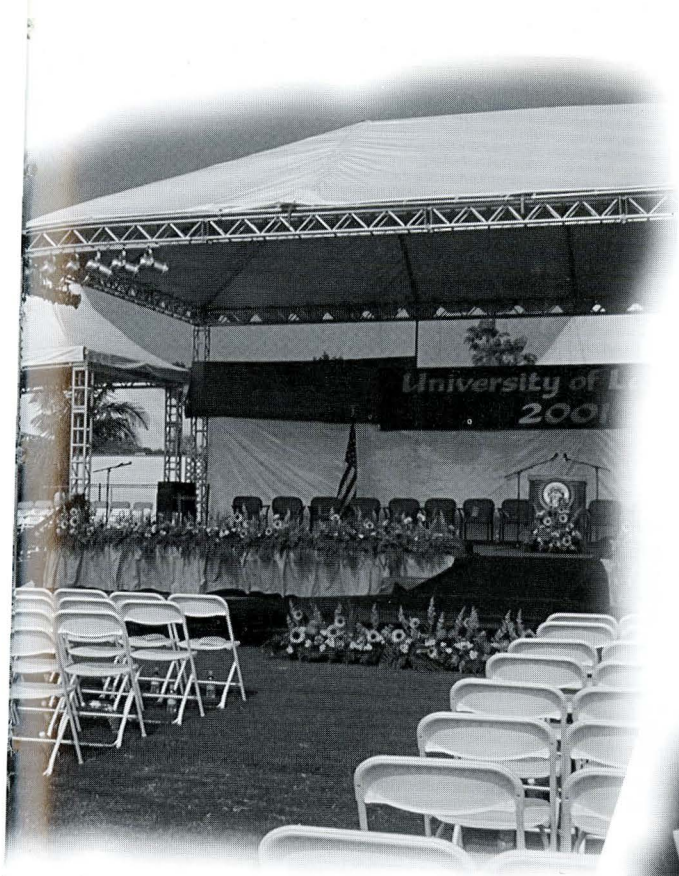
