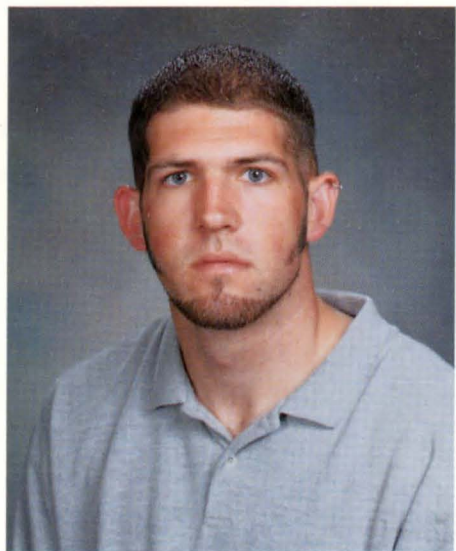
John Christian Keller

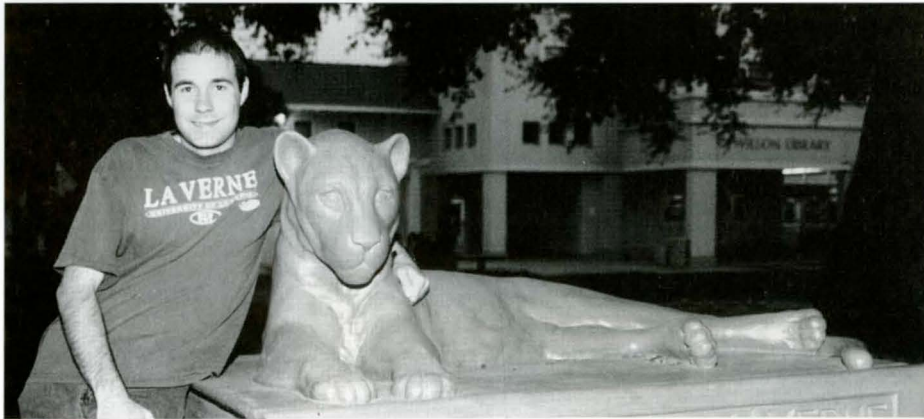

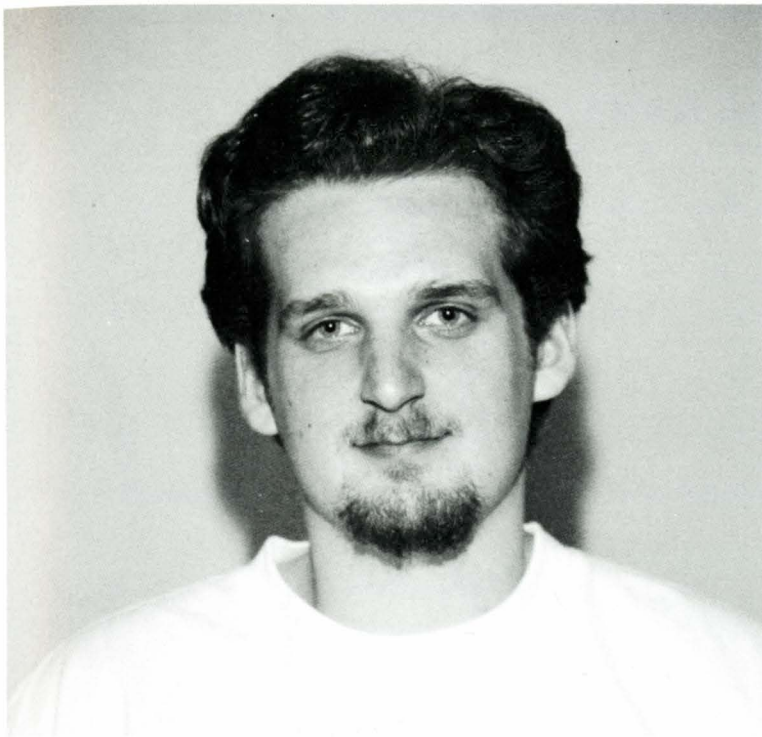

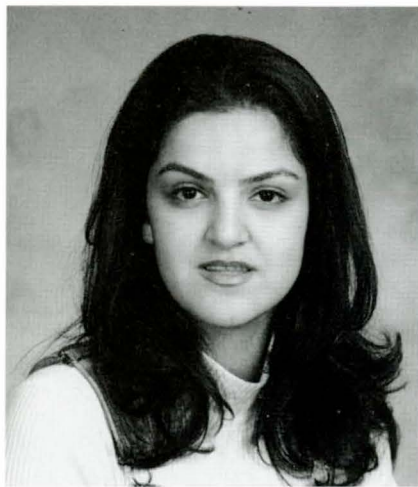
Waiting To Make Our Mark

CF affects the respiratory system of young adults and children primarily, and the life expectancy of its victims is not very long. To date, there is no cure for the disease, although research is being done to prolong the life of its victims through medicine.

Iota Delta supports the National CF Foundation by sponsoring a Bowl-a-Thon fundraiser to fund further research for the disease.

The organization also advocates women's and children's rights through its Clothesline Project every spring. Through this philanthropy, Iota Delta encourages others to "air out society's dirty laundry." The products of the project are sent to Washington D.C. to be displayed on the White House lawn.

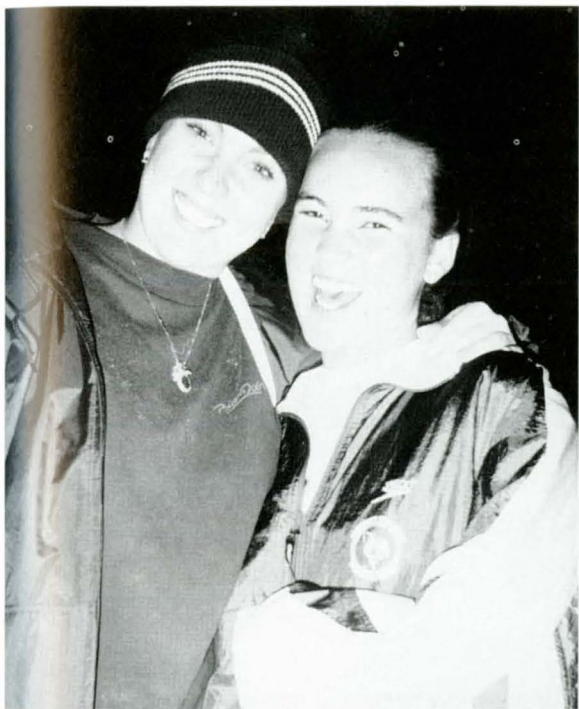

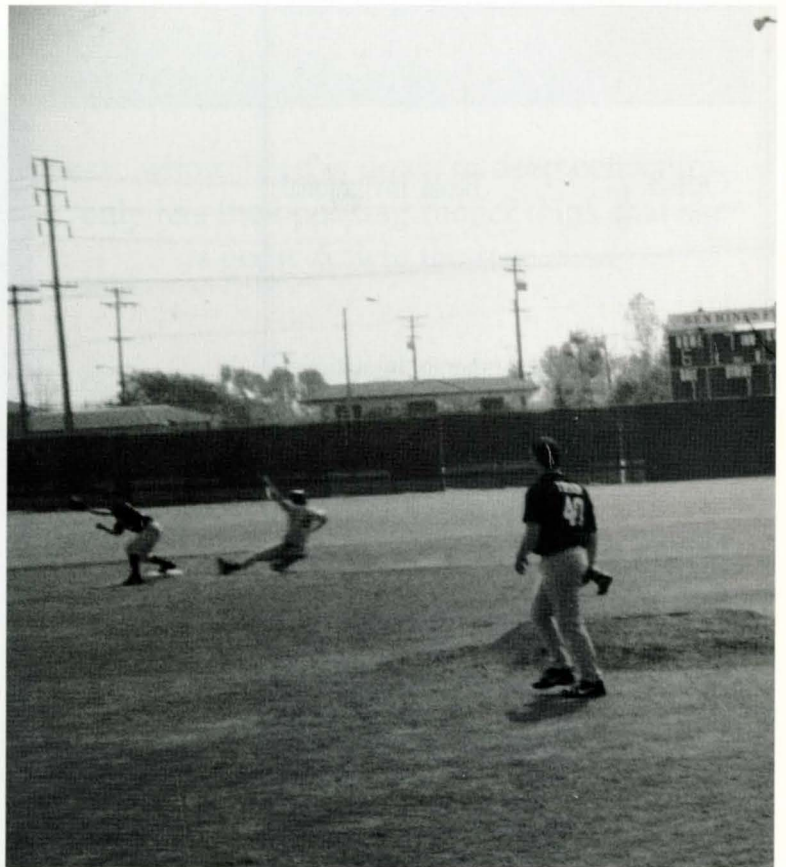

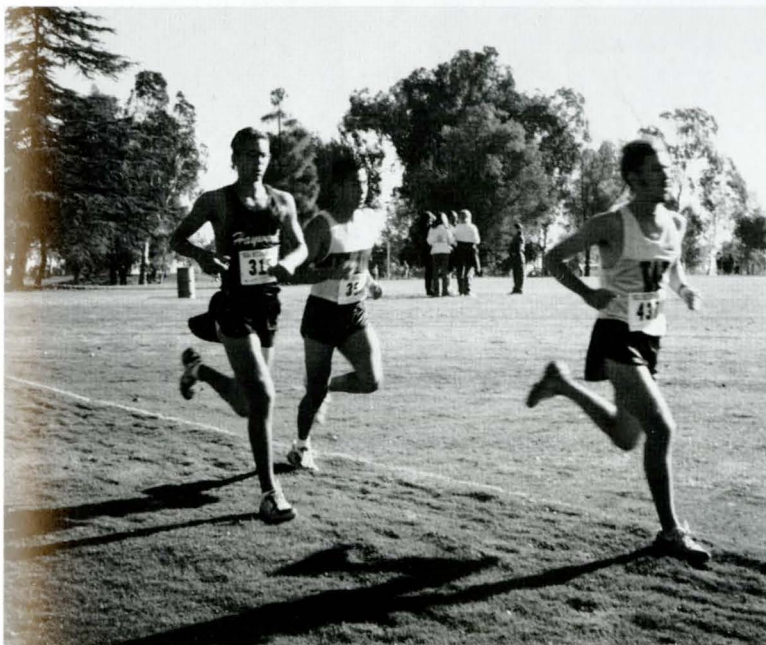

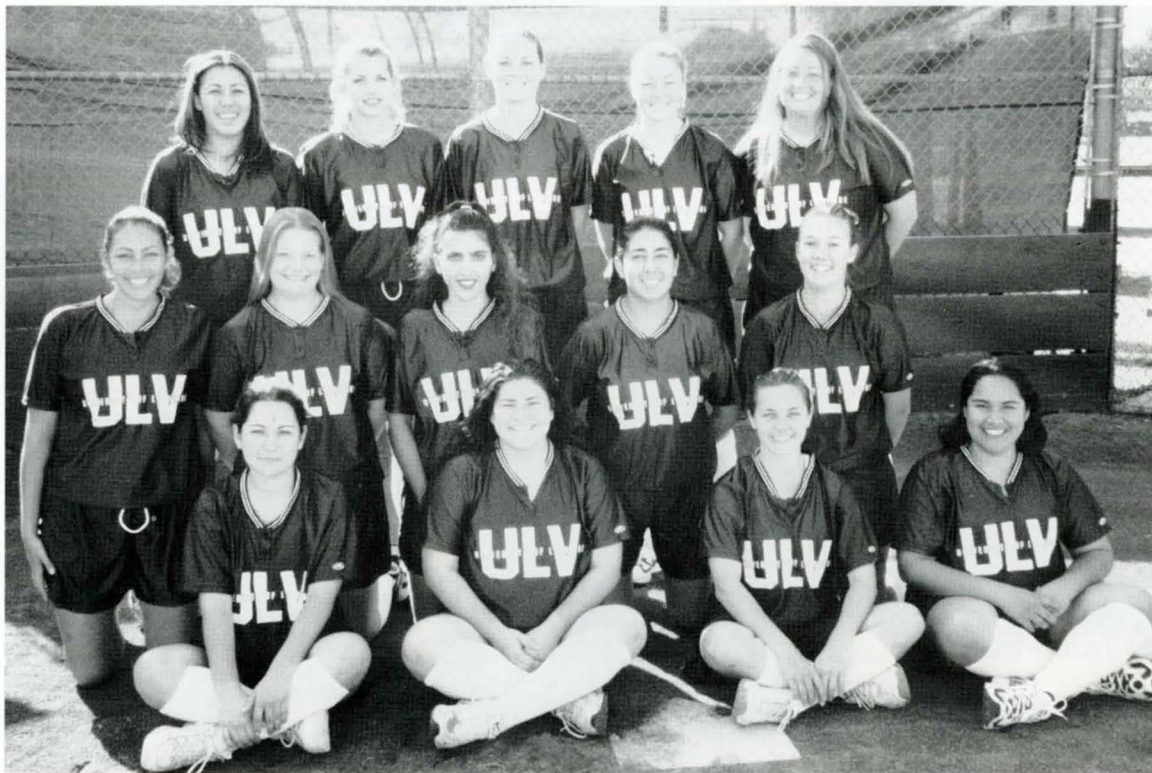

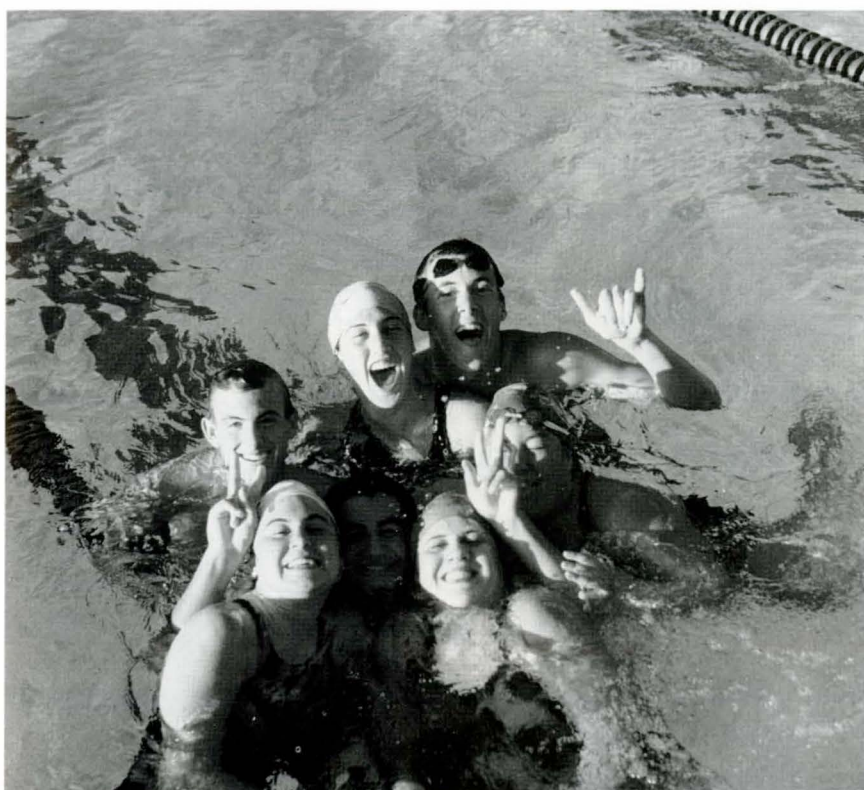

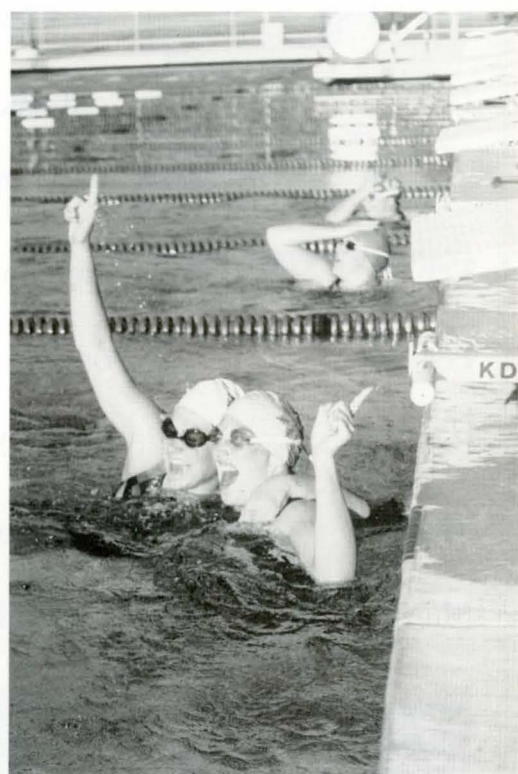

The team dominated their division this season, making it to playoffs and having a shot at the NCAA Final Four.

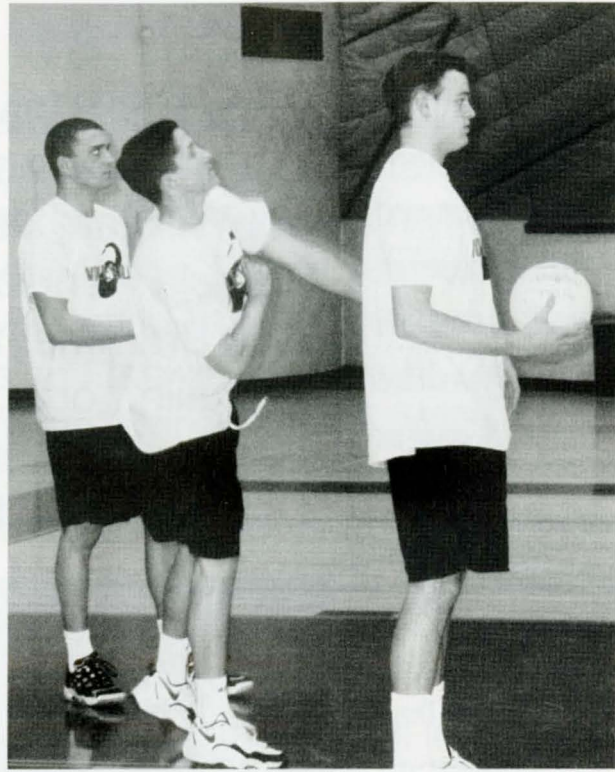

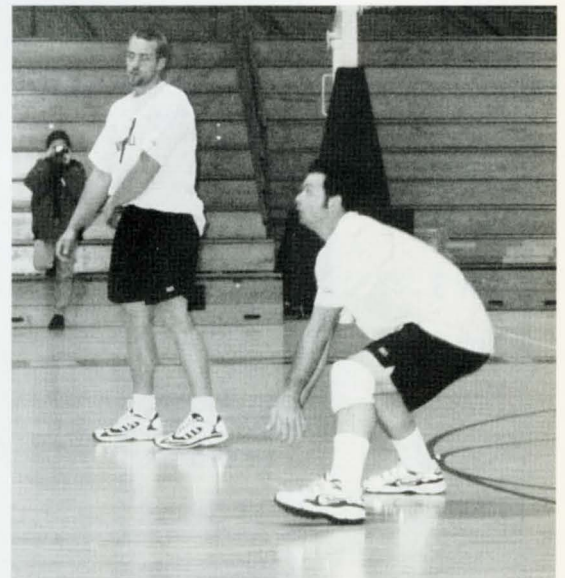

For many years, this platform and bench in the center of Sneaky Park stood bare, seeming that it was missing something important.



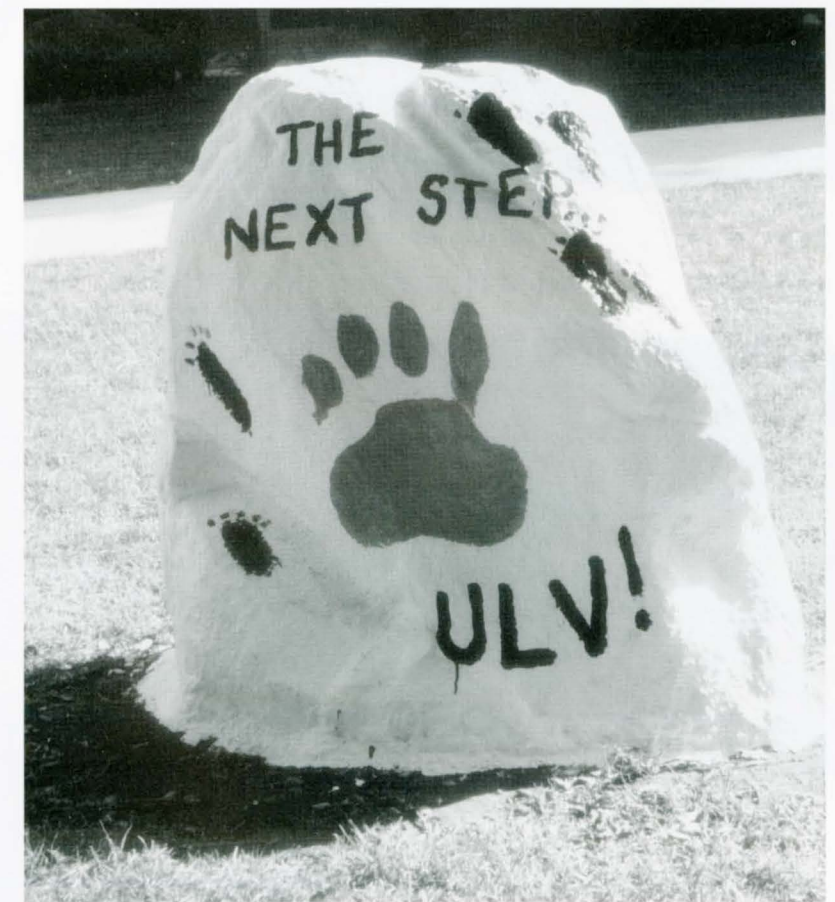
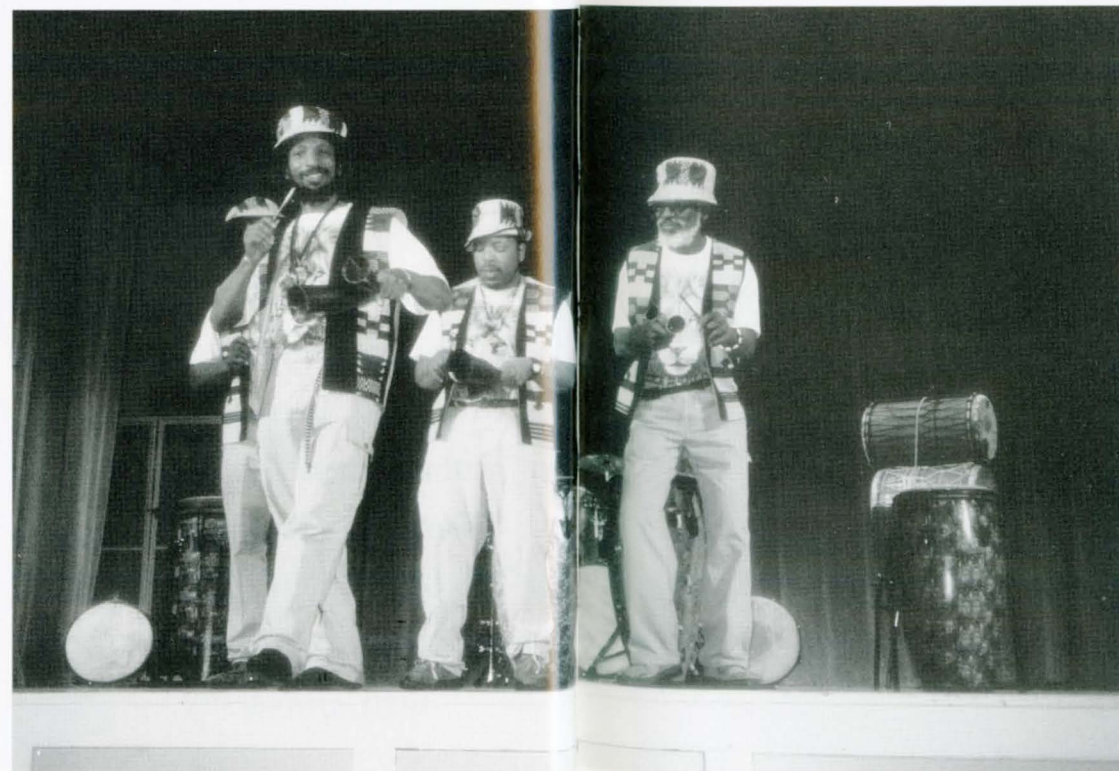

Now the ULV statue guards and protects Sneaky Park and its inhabitants. The statue is an everyday reminder to the students, faculty, and staff to take pride in their University.

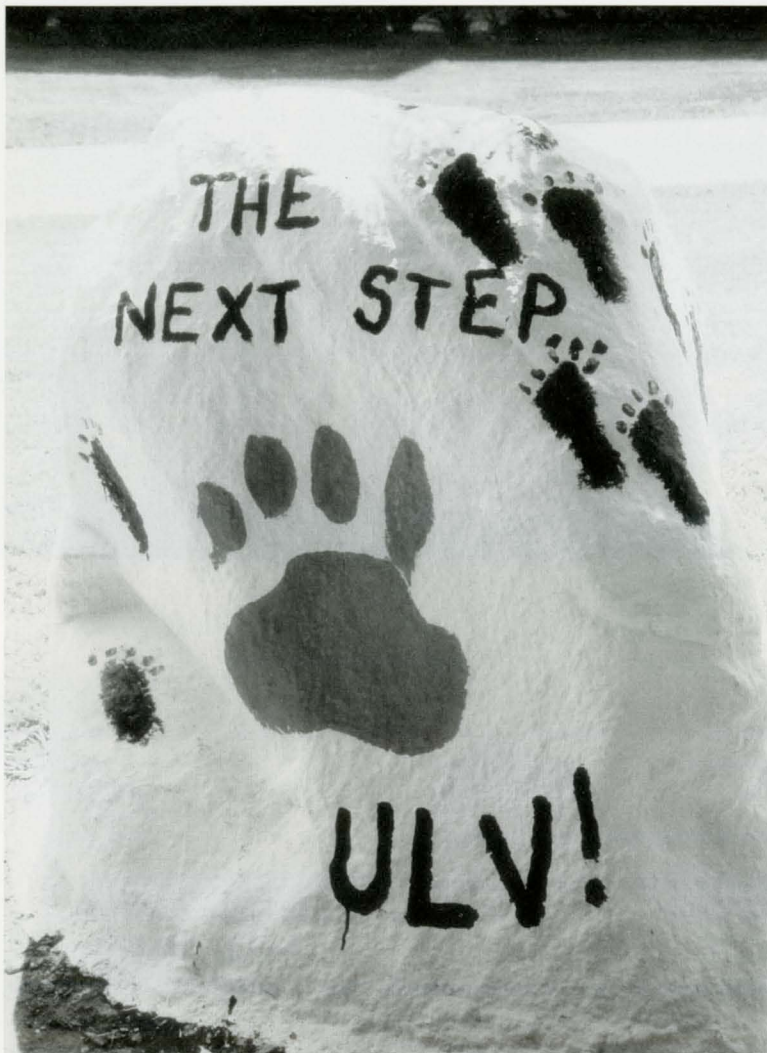




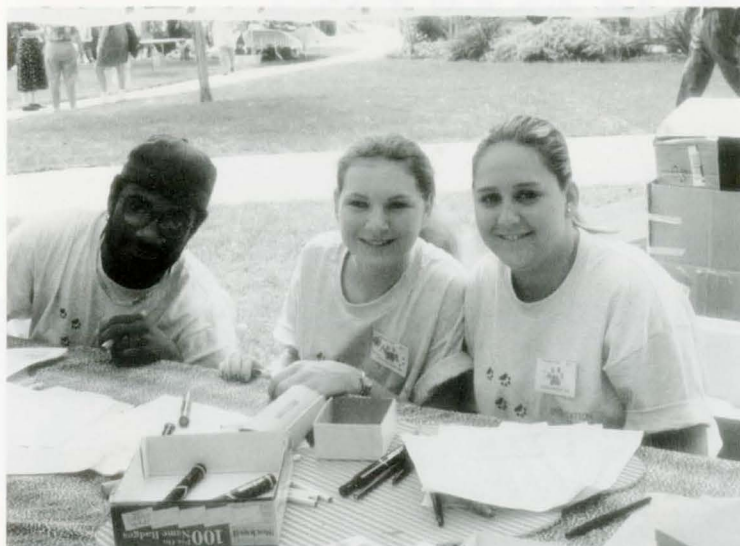
