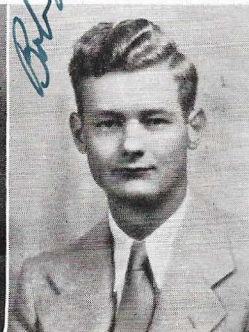
SENIORS •

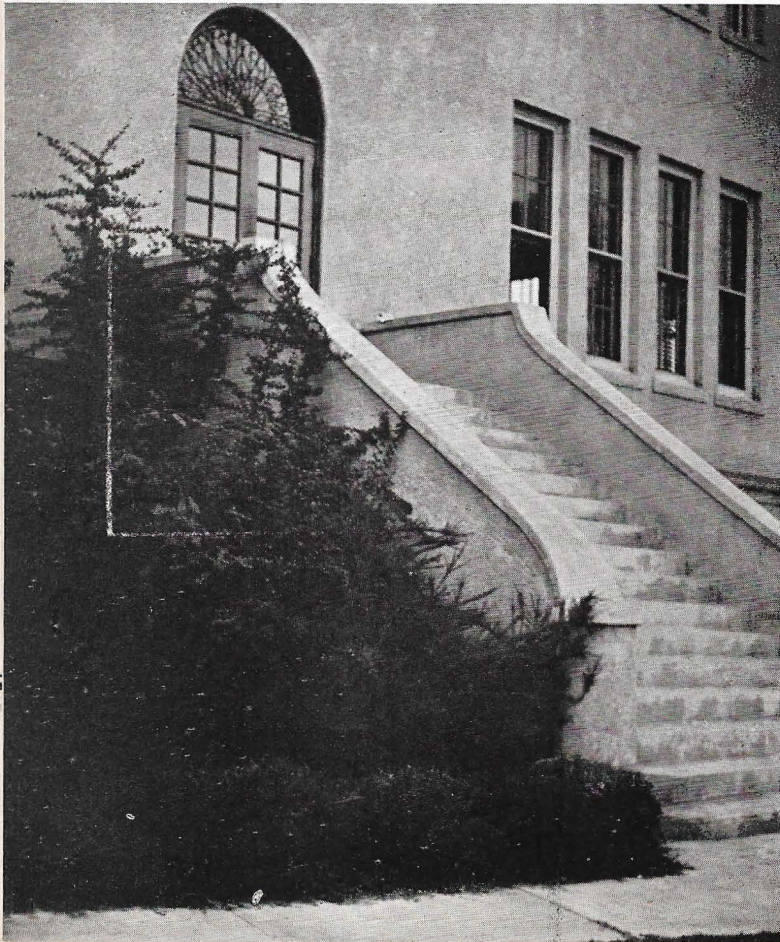


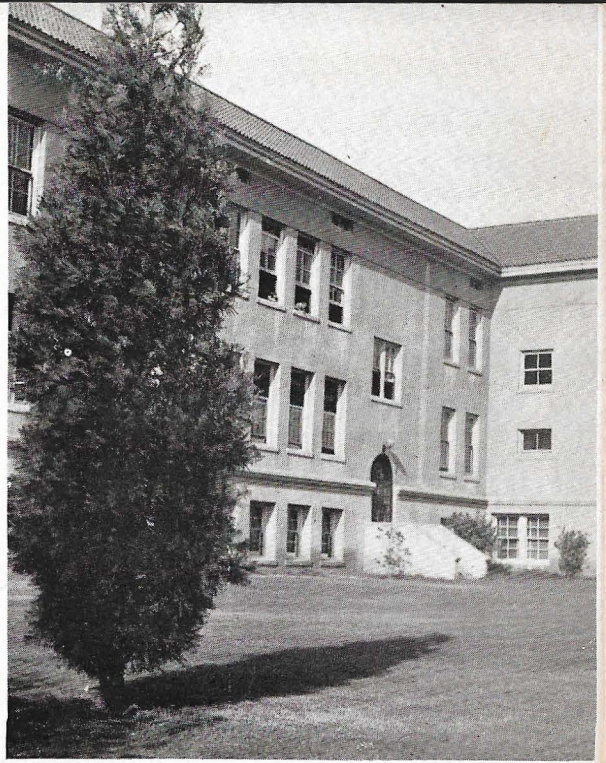
FRESHMEN

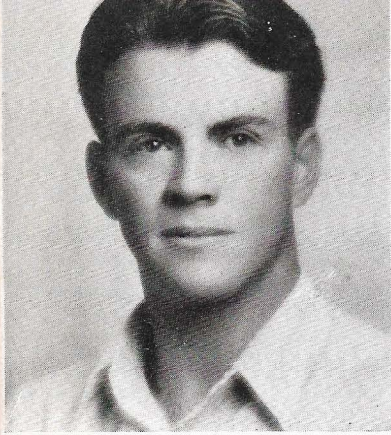

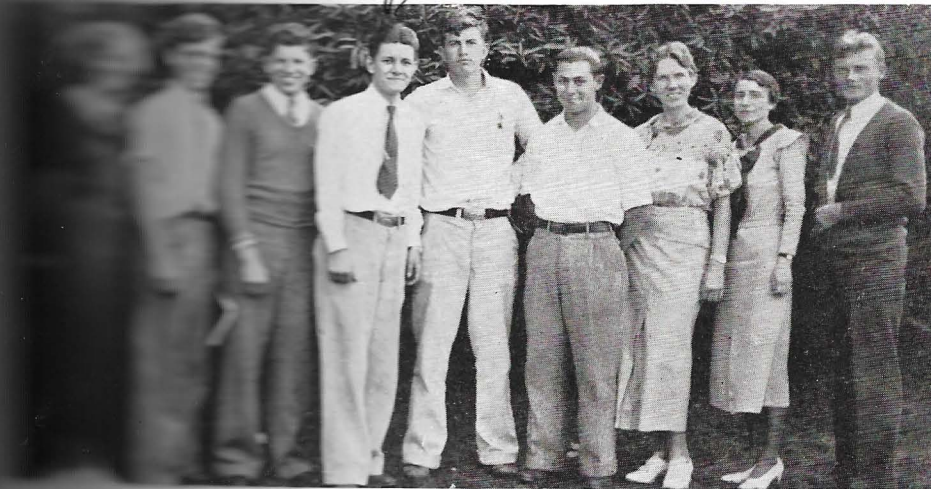

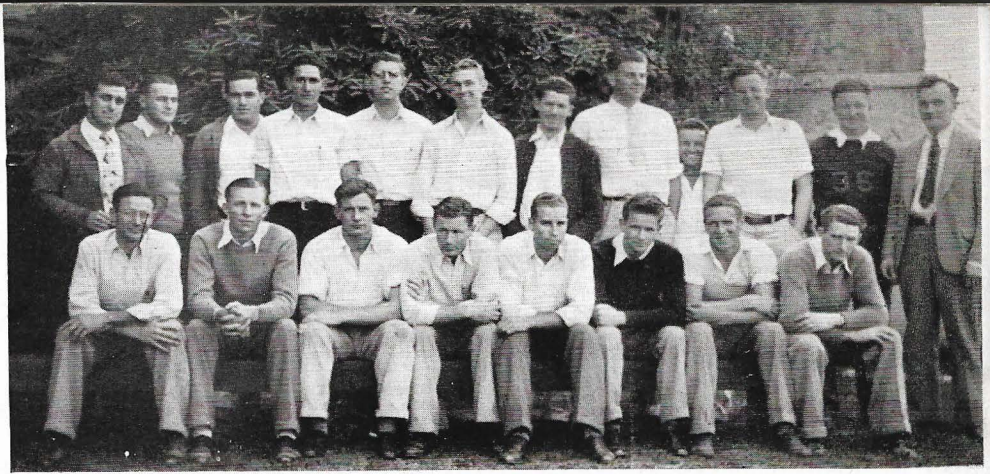

● VARSITY CLUB

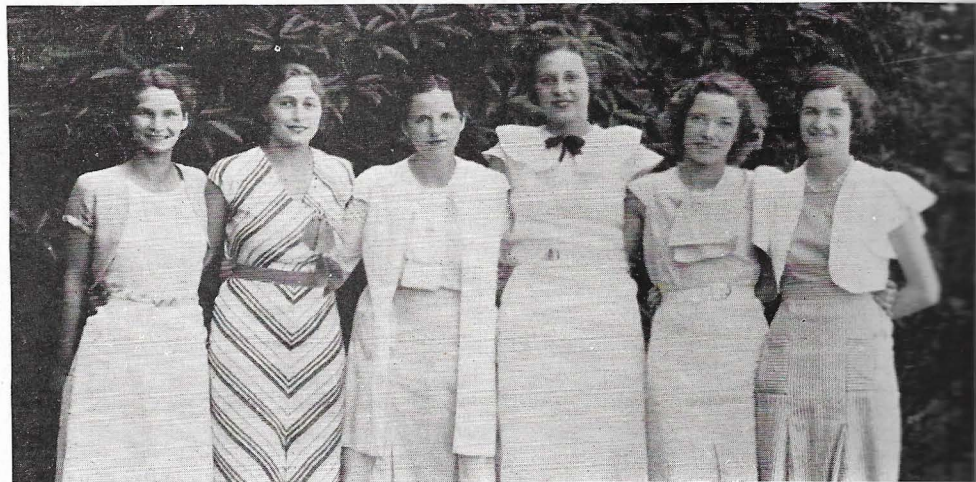

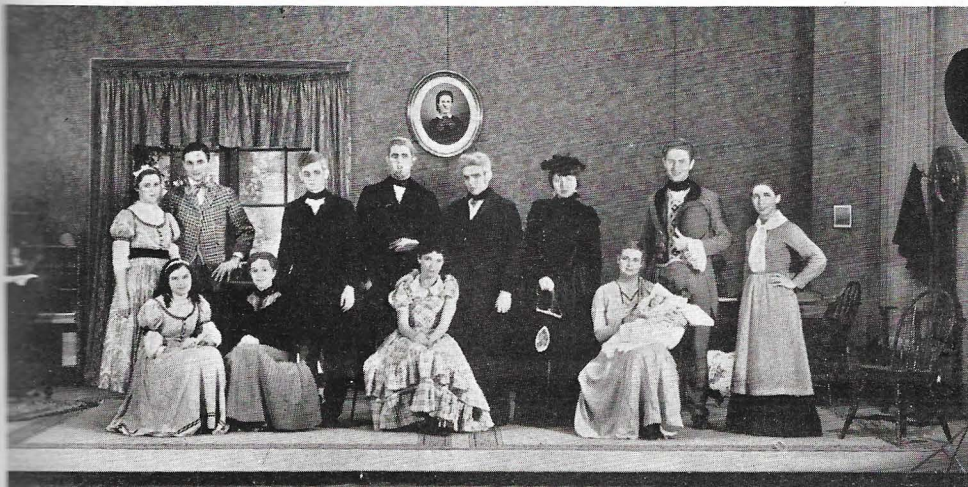

• CHI DELTA CHI

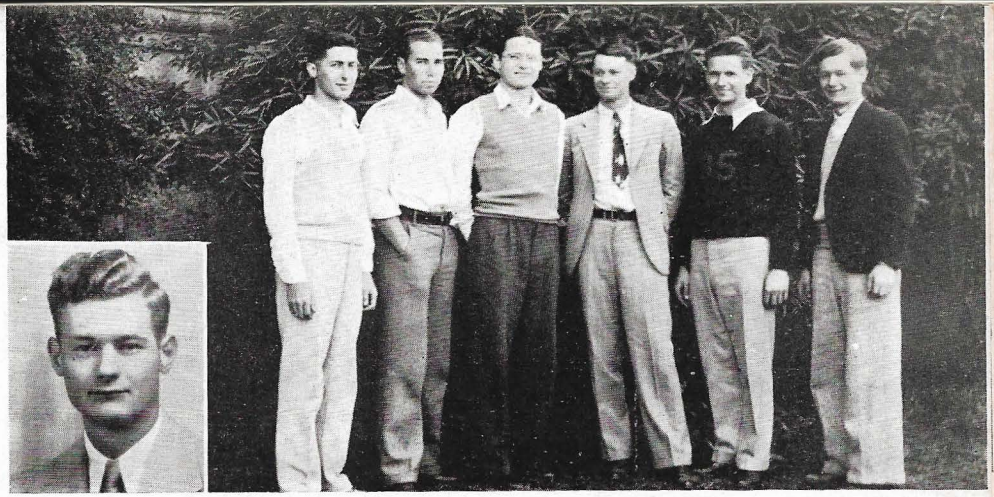

DINNER CLUB •

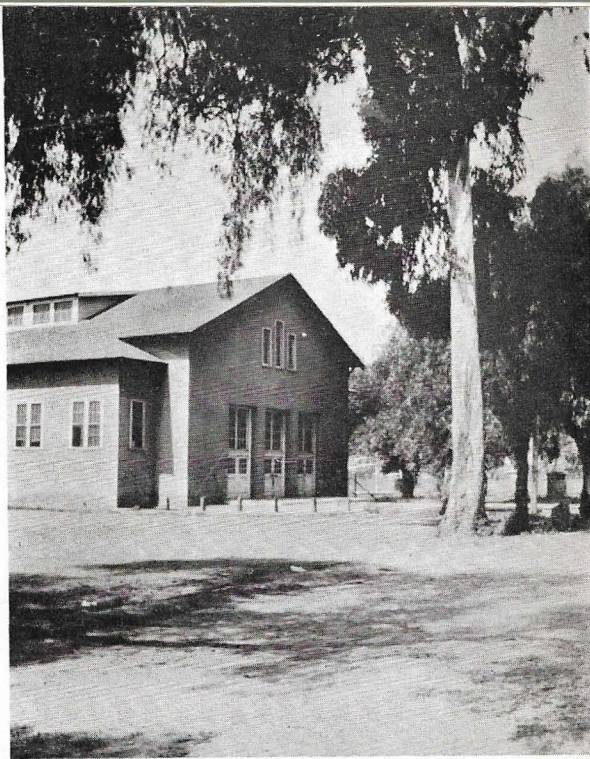

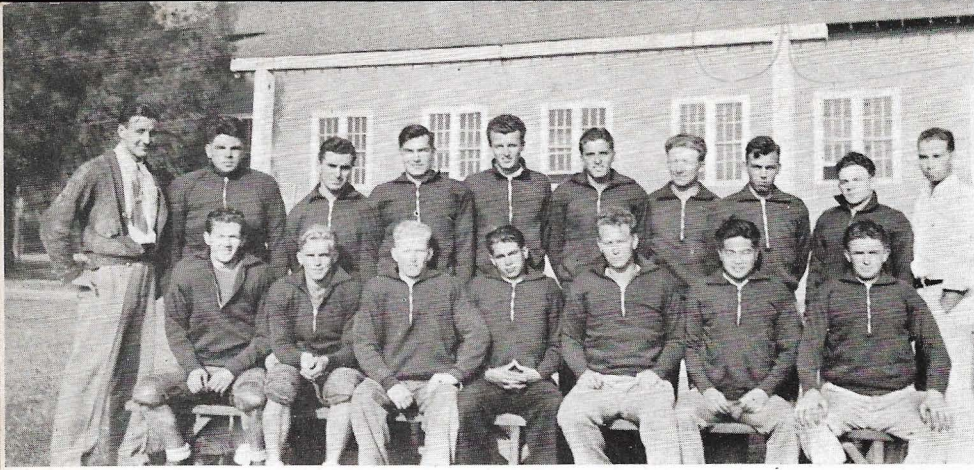
Behind the brilliant coaching of Lee Eisan and the inspired playing of a scrapping band of Leopards, La Verne College this season continued its reputation as a "conference menace," finishing the year in second place. The Leopards won five conference contests and lost two. Although the Occidental and Pomona wins occurred as the result of forfeits, it was conceded that the Leopards could have defeated either of these teams in actual contests. It was a successful season for La Verne College, as the once tame and docile Leopard was transferred into a raging, dangerous Jungle Cat. The Eisan-men trounced Santa Barbara 18-6, defeated Cal Tech 13-0, lost a thrilling contest to San Diego, 6-0, were downed 13-0 by the championship Redlands team, and then staged a brilliant comeback to put the skids under a highly vaunted Whittier eleven to the tune of a 6-0 score. The Leopards lost to Fresno State 14-7 in a practice contest. Starting the season with the following returning lettermen: Captain Aubrey Calvert, Ernest Swihart, Marion Noll, Jay Bessey, Howard Nordstrom, Adrian Wright, Captain-elect of the 1934 season, Cecil Brooks, Maxson "Red" Montgomery, Frank Elder and Orville "Tuffy" Adams; several Junior College transfers, including "Bud" Grady, Ted Allen, Paul Clay, Gerald Jarvis and Ken Brownsberger; Bob Haines from the frosh team of '32; and John Dickey, Kenneth Heckman, Ed Baer, Jerry Harshbarger, Harold Hylton, Ellis Holl, Elwin White, and Frank Saylor from the reserve ranks of the previous year, Eisan's prospects were far from promising. The Leopard Coach was able to mold a strong team because of his outstanding ability, and

because the small band of athletes cooperated brilliantly. Captain Aubrey Calvert, Ernest Swihart, Frank Saylor, Marion Noll, Kenneth Heckman, Max Montgomery, "Cece" Brooks and Ed Baer are the graduating seniors. Several outstanding men return including Captain-elect Adrian Wright, Frank Elder, Jay Bessey, "Bud" Brady, Harold Hylton, Jerry Harshbarger, Ted Allen, Paul Clay, Elwin White, Howard Nordstrom, Ken Brownsberger and John Dickey. Starting the season, the Leopards downed Santa Barbara 18-6, in a night contest played in the northern city. Montgomery's 70 yard run back of a kick-off, and Elder's brilliant 20 yard scamper to a touchdown featured the contest. Captain Calvert and Ade Wright sparkled in the Leopard line while Montgomery, "Cece" Brooks, Frank Elder and "Tuffy" Adams shone in the backfield. Lack of reserve strength and the injury of two stars, Jay Bessey and Bud Grady resulted in a defeat of 14-7 in the second game of the season, against a powerful Fresno team. The Leopards defeated Cal Tech 12-0 in a brilliantly played night contest on the La Verne gridiron, before some 3500 fans. Montgomery led the attack on the Cal Tech goal, and was indirectly responsible for both La Verne touchdowns. Adams, with his smashing drives into the Cal Tech line, Grady, Elder, Calvert, Wright, Noll and Swihart starred for the winners. San Diego destroyed the Leopard's title chances when they won 6-0 from La Verne before the largest crowd ever to witness a game on the Arnett Field. Five thousand people witnessed the contest. Montgomery, Brooks, Elder, Wright, Bessey,

Haines and Calvert played brilliantly for the Leopards. The powerful San Diego Marines defeated La Verne 25-0 in the next game. Redlands downed La Verne 13-0 in another brilliantly played night contest. Breaks of the game prevented La Verne from winning this contest, as the Leopards had their toughest breaks of the season in this tussle. Rocketing to a comeback that caused sport fans throughout Southern California to applaud the fighting Leopards, La Verne College defeated Whittier 6-0 in the final game of the season. A surprised Whittier team saw a well-coached and determined Leopard team fight off the powerful Poet offensive thrusts, and then stage a brilliant fourth quarter comeback to ring up victory. An eighty yard drive that will live forever in La Verne football history allowed the Leopards to score. Montgomery featured the drive, which was climaxed when Elder snagged Montgomery's 17 yard pass to score. At the conclusion of the year, five Leopards received all-conference honors on either the first or second string, while one other Leopard earned honorable mention. Captain Calvert and Max Montgomery made the first team, Captain-elect Ade Wright, Marion Noll and Cecil Brooks were placed on the second eleven, and Frank Elder earned honorable mention. Although not represented by a freshman team, the five Frosh got plenty of competition by playing on a Tomcat team coached by Max Forney which engaged in four games. Eisan and Hershey were the outstanding stars.

Handicapped somewhat during the practice season by the loss of Forney, Snell, Kercher, Wilson and Howell from last year's squad the team nevertheless, won a number of practice games, defeating Creighton's C.C.C., Alhambra and others although losing to U.C.L.A., C.C.C., Hollywood "Y" and to San Francisco University on a northern trip. During the conference season we defeated Occidental 34-23 and lost the next night 36-34. We then defeated Pomona 35-27 and Santa Barbara 44-23 and 43-19. We had a let down against Redlands and lost a double-header 31-23 and 35-22, but in a torrid series with Whittier lost the first game 31-29 and came back to win 34-33 the next night. Against San Diego we lost a double header but only after the first game had ended in a tie. In the overtime period we lost out 46-38 and lost the next night 32-25. The team generally lined up with Calvert at center, Elder and Adams at guards, and Captain Carter at forward with Brooks or Stutzman as the other forward. Bannister, Butterbaugh and Grady played a good deal of the time, making their letters. Jarvis and Dickey were also reliable substitutes. Captain Carter was high point man of the conference and was unanimously picked all conference forward. Elder was the outstanding floor man of the league and was unanimously picked as utility man, on the first team. He will be Captain next year and another good team is in prospect although the loss of Carter, Adams, Brooks, and Calvert will be severely felt.

Also turning out with these lettermen, were three Pomona J. C. transfers, "Toby" Tobias, Aubrey Grady, and Bryce Rathburn; all were baseball men at Pomona last year. With these nine men our ever struggling coach, Dale Glick, turned out a baseball team that every Southern Conference School feared. Our season was one of many thrills. The Redland's game was one that will long be remembered. The game was won in the last inning by a walked-in run, making the score 2 to 1. When the Cal Tech game rolled around everyone seemed to be fired up and full of pep. As a result we won the game by the very convincing score of 8 to 1. "Ade" Wright, our iron man chucker, pitched a wonderful game, striking out ten Cal Tech men. Later in the season a few more baseball players reported for the squad. These were: "Bill" Butterbaugh, Roy Smith, and Fred Butterbaugh, increasing the total number of players to twelve. This increase of players helped put our ball club on a par with the best teams of the Conference. Next week we played a returning engagement with Whittier, losing in the ninth inning after playing a hard fought battle. The boys played "heads-up" ball the whole game, but Whittier happened into a couple of lucky hits at the wrong time. The season created a great morale for the team, and gave the boys a sport to enjoy without too much worry and training. The team finished its season in the ranks of the first five of the Southern Conference standings.

The track season at La Verne College this year was very outstanding. The interclass meet held on March 6 was won by the Juniors with a score of 55, followed by the Sophomores with 18, the Seniors with 16, and the Frosh with 8. Several school records were shattered during the afternoon. Conference dual meets, upon which our conference standing is based were held at Redlands on March 17 with Whittier and Redlands, and at Pomona College with Pomona, Whittier, and Santa Barbara on March 31. The scores of the meets were: L. V. C. 66, Whittier 63; L.V.C. 39, Redlands 99; L.V.C. 78, Santa Barbara 50; L.V.C. 15, Pomona 116. Our conference standing is fourth place, a position never obtained before in the conference. A squad of eleven men entered the all-conference meet at Oxy on April 7. Montgomery placed third in the broad jump and Myer placed third in the mile. In a practice meet with California Christian College the La Verne team won by a margin of 78-55. Outstanding performances of the season were made by Myer in the mile, Grady in the hurdles, Montgomery in the broad jump, Smith in the 440 and sprints, and Brownsberger in the 440 and hurdles. The squad was composed of: Brownsberger, hurdles, 440, relay; Butterbaugh, 2 mile; Clay, mile, 880, relay; Grady, hurdles, high jump; Harshbarger, javelin, weights; Myer, mile, 2 miles; Holl, 880, mile, relay; Hylton, high jump, pole vault, 220, relay; Moore, sprints; Noll, shot; Smith, sprints, 440, broad jump, relay; White, hurdles, sprints, relay; Wright javelin. As only two men are graduating, we have a nucleus upon which to build next year a team of greater strength than the college has ever seen.
