Jacob Lutes made peach and apple brandy and  
whiskey. His distilleries (three of which  
burned down) were located in Lutesville  
where the Dollar Store is presently sited  
on Main Street. He also ran a flour mill  
and used to haul flour to Cape Girardeau  
to market and peach brandy to St. Louis.  
He served as post master for about 25  
years when mail was carried by stage-coach.

Jacob Lutes died 3 June, 1854 of cholera,  
contracted from wayfarers camped on his  
property. He had learned that there was  
illness among them, went to see if he  
could help, contracted the disease, and  
died.

On 12 May, 1892, his son, David Lutes, made  
the following notarized statement regarding  
a land dispute:

"State of Missouri, County of Bollinger\*,  
ss: I, David Lutes, being duly sworn,  
make the following statement...My father  
and mother, Jacob Lutes and Sophia Lutes,  
had eleven children born to their marriage,  
namely:

1. Elisabeth Lutes, now widow of Joseph  
Baker
2. Sophia Lutes, now widow of A. B.  
Snider
3. Hannah C. Lutes, now wife of Andrew  
M. Sitzes
4. Sarah Lutes, was wife of Jacob  
Sitzes
5. David Lutes (myself)
6. Daniel Lutes
7. Jesse Lutes
8. Jacob Lutes
9. John Lutes
10. Eli Lutes
11. Martha E. Lutes, now wife of W. S.  
King

and my father died without making a will.  
I administered on his estate and the above  
named heirs were his only heirs and legal  
representatives. & D. L. Philips and  
those under whom he claims have held  
peaceable, continuous and adverse possess-  
ing the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ , the SE $\frac{1}{4}$  of Sec. 6 W31 R10E in  
Bollinger County, Missouri, for more than  
fifty years.
