


Mrs. Mary Thomason was recently elected President of the Central California Art Association.

L. T. Cook, Principal of the Sierra Joint Union High School, talked with and interviewed the members of the Eighth Grade Class regarding the work for the coming year.


It is not unusual now days for the absentee list to not exceed four at the local school.

IN RECOGNITION OF CALIFORNIA PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK, Let us take a look at some of the things found at NORTH FORK UNION, that is not usually found in other elementary schools.

1. Small number in each class room. Our average is 21, the STATE has an average of 33, and most of the cities in California average over 40 pupils per class room.
2. Full time playground supervision. From 8:30 A. M. until the last bus leaves the playground is under constant supervision by the teaching staff.
3. A complete meal at mid-day. At mid-day on every school day a complete hot meal is served to every child in school at no cost to the child.
4. An adequate Audio-Visual program is maintained. Necessary motion pictures (educational only) slides and supplemental weekly readers are furnished to all children. This program is carried on in cooperation with the County Office of Education. A radio in every room.
5. A full school and community health program is scheduled each year. Preventive measures are taken with the preschool child, and continued through his school career. This program is carried out by the local school, the Madera County Health Department, and the Federal government. Kleenex is available in every room.
6. A Kindergarten is in full session daily for the younger children.
7. Pre-Industrial training is offered to all boys and girls of the Junior Hi grades.
8. Instrument instruction is offer to all pupils of the upper grades.
9. All rooms texted last year, by and outside authority, averaged above the grade in which they were studying.
10. Special Art instruction is given the pupils. Annually the school is asked to exhibit at various institutes, conferences, and fairs over the state.
11. A complete transportation scheduled is maintained by the school. In almost 20 years, not even a fender has been damaged. This is due to the many excellent drivers we have had during that time.
12. A school paper, The Mono, is published monthly to carry facts of the school's activities to the public.
13. An annual play day and exhibit time is annually held in May.
14. A Mothers Group that cooperates with the school program and works for the community 100%.
