Director's Report

Board of Directors of Rancho Santa Fe Association meeting September 2, visited the site of Wishing Well Hotel to study the request of Mme. J. J. Larrea for an on-sale light wine and beer license. The license was denied with Messrs. Jandorf and Weddell abstaining from voting.

President Jenkins on behalf of the Board presented past Board member, Dr. Neil J. Randol, with a plaque thanking him for his service to the community.

It was decided to hold a special meeting of the Association at the Meetin' House, The Inn, Rancho Santa Fe, Friday October 14, 8 p.m. At that time the Board will present Association members a proposed plan for operation of the Rancho Santa Fe Golf Course.

The recommendation of the Golf Course committee to increase the budget for fertilizer to \$4,000 and for maintenance and repairs to \$13,180 was approved.

Moved and carried that President Jenkins represent the Board and accept the memorial in the name of the Association at the dedication of the John B. Megrew Memorial set for Sunday October 9, 2 p.m. at the Old School building.

President Jenkins appointed Ralph Mangan chairman of a committee to interview applicants for the position of assistant manager. Smart is to serve as an ex-officio member of the committee.

The Board deferred action on the following: placing of a road sign on portion of lot 10, block 32; reconsideration of the subdivision application of Capt. Frederick Bruning on portion of Lot 11, Block 47, plat map dated 6-60; and the subdivision application of Ralph Biggers of Portion of lot 3, block 33, plat map dated 7-60.

The Board directed a letter sent to San Diego County Regional Planning Committee endorsing Alternate B of its publication "Objectives and Policies."

President Jenkins presented gross revenue for the month of August as follows:

GOLF COURSE, green fees cash, \$8,744.25; playing privileges, \$5,282; electric carts, \$2,195.40; lockers, \$5. Total, \$1,6226.65, a gain of \$1,027.65 over last year.

Dedication To Be Held

The dedication service of the John B. McGrew Memorial will be held Sunday, October 9 at 2 p. m. at the site in front of the "Old School House."

The Memorial, a 40-foot high flagpole, with bronze plaque set in flagstone, and a semi-circle of benches rising from an appropriate setting of plantings, is the gift to the community of Mr. and Mrs. George Megrew, long time residents of Rancho Santa Fe, in memory of their son, Lt. John B. Megrew.

Lt. Megrew was the only Rancho Santa Fe boy to lose his life in World War II. He was wounded at Bataan and taken prisoner by the Japanese. He was confined to Japanese prison for 3½ years and died aboard a prison ship enroute to Japan.

The service will open with an invocation by the Rt. Rev. Walter Mitchell. The words of the memorial will be read by Mr. Robert Franchiso. Presentation will be made by Mr. Megrew, and Capt. B. F. Jenkins, president of the Rancho Santa Fe Association, will accept the Memorial. The plaque will then be unveiled.

Boy Scout Troop 717 will Present the Colors. After the pledge to the Flag and the singing of America, the Rev. Chester L. Tolson will give the prayer of dedication. Memorial Taps will close the impressive service.

Fire Prevention Week Memorializes Chicago Fire

Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 9-15, marks the 89th anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire and the 38th anniversary of the founding of this special week to memorialize the great destruction.

Fire Prevention Week is proclaimed by the President to emphasize the year-round need for greater attention to fire safety. It is stressed that nearly all fires are preventable, that human carelessness and ignorance are responsible in almost every case.

The cost of the Chicago fire in 1871 was \$168,000,000. In almost every six weeks this nation burns up a like amount of property. Each day, fire destroys or damages 1525 homes, 105 industrial plants, 149 stores, 11 churches, 11 schools and 4 hospitals, according to National Fire Protection Association records. A more tragic figure is the annual toll of more than 11,000 lives.

To combat public apathy, Fire Prevention Week was organized in 1911, sponsored international-

ly by the non-profit public service organization, National Fire Protection Association, with many other organizations joining in the effort.

Fire Chief James Fox stresses that Rancho Santa Fe can make the week meaningful if each resident decides that fire prevention is his, or her, job too and that individually and together the present shameful record of fire losses can be corrected.

Explorer Scouts Find Fall Clean-up Heavy Work Due to Fiesta, Fair

A continuing project of the Beautification Committee of the Garden Club is the clean-up program by the Explorer Scouts of Rancho Santa Fe, for which the Garden Club pays them \$35 a month, a \$10 advance over last year.

Early in August, nine boys using two trucks, one the RSF Association truck which is donated each month, the other available through the generosity of Robert Francisco, harvested the heavy crop of trash at the corner of Paseo Delicias, proceeding down Via de La Valle to La Gracia.

Because of the very heavy accumulation of debris, due to the San Diego County Fair and race time, only about a mile was covered by the workers.

In September, the area to be covered was La Granada to the boundaries of the Rancho. The usual lunch was provided for the boys at the Fire Station by Mrs. James Fox, wife of Fire Chief Fox.

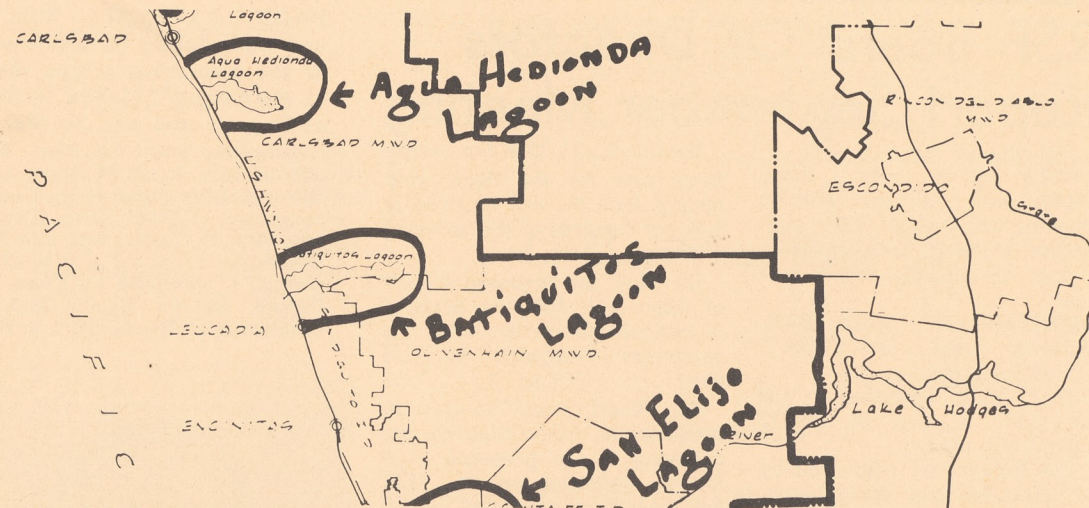
