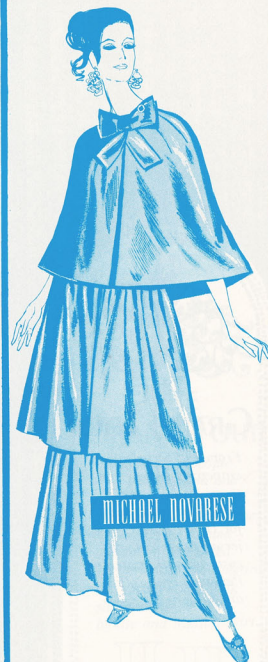

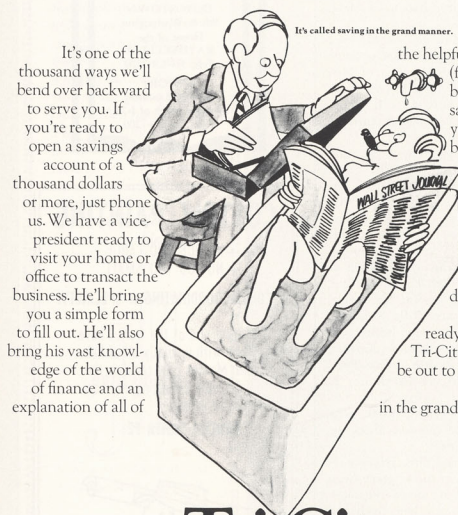

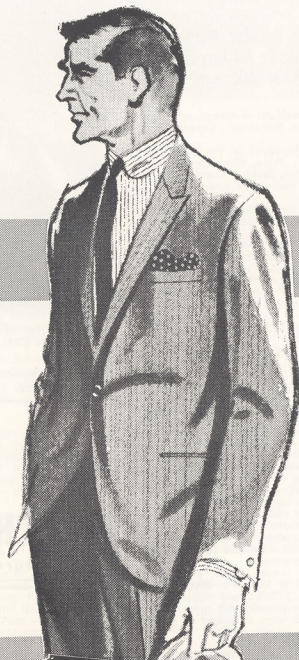

RANCHO SANTA FE GARDEN CLUB LOOKS BACK FORTY YEARS

In 1926 the Rancho Santa Fe Garden Club was founded by sixty dedicated residents. It has grown to over 500 members. The purposes were to further interest in gardening and landscaping of the Ranch. To promote civic pride through beautification and to promote social welfare.

Ten years later the Club House was given anonymously by a member and the decorations and furnishings by still another. It has been enlarged and beautified twice.

During the war years, when the army and Navy units were stationed on the Ranch, the Club was headquarters for many war agencies. Among other activities was the Christmas program of making wreaths and decorations for the Veterans' Hospitals. This

project is still carried on.

In 1942, a Christian Scientist group held their meetings in the Club House until later permanent quarters were found. Also Lenten services became an accepted part of the Garden Club activities followed by Presbyterian Sunday services. This, certainly was most influential in the organization of the Village Church.

In 1947, the Club sponsored the first Marston Company Fashion Shows on the grounds of the Inn. This led to the founding of the Country Friends and is still carried on by them.

In 1952 the Garden Club organized a very effective clean-up project which resulted in the first anti litter campaign in San Diego County. Later, the Garden Club joined the Rancho Santa Fe Association in an all over

beautification program for the Ranch. Success of this can be seen in the road-side planting and the beautification of the grounds of the Post Office — school and Golf Club.

This year 1968, a new project has been started. The lot next to the Club, which was purchased by them last year will be an experimental garden for native plants and shrubs. This will be carried on by the Horticultural chairman — Mr. Murray Hawkins and his committee. Mr. Hubert Larson is the new President of the Club.

The Rancho Santa Fe Garden Club will begin its new Club year on Wednesday, Sept. 18th.

There will be a reception for the new members in the Club House from 5:30 to 7:30, when exhibitions of Bonzi and needlework will be displayed.

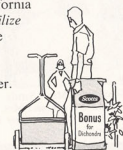

THE RANCHO SANTA FE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PREPARES FOR ITS NEW SCHOOL YEAR

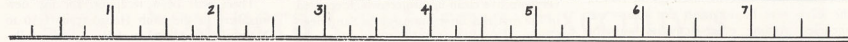
"Many hundreds of young faces have come and then gone away from my classroom, many of them to classrooms of their own, full of other faces and memories. Still, I like to feel that they have not really gone. All of them—the Fulbright scholar, the beauty queen, the young doctor, the teacher on Midway Island, the aviation machinist, the building contractor, the nurse, the car salesman, and another two thousand—are there in the dust of my room. And regardless of how the custodian sweeps and waxes and washes, the dust penetrates the wood,

the glass, the plaster, and the tile and will not wholly depart. When I leave my room at night, it is a haunted place, full of the phantom sounds of questions and answers, ghostly rustlings of papers, airy chimes of laughter, and the marvelous dreams of youth. These are my legacy—these and the yellowing pages of abandoned gradebooks.

There is nothing that is extraordinary about my life. Nevertheless, when I see the chalk dust sprinkled over my clothing, I like to imagine that I have been given a raiment of distinction and been purified somehow

by the only cloud that can obliterate the mushrooming atom. The chalk dust invades the pores of my hands, rains over my desk, and feeds my dry cleaner; but my heart insists that it cloaks me with joy and honor. When the chalk breaks and scatters in bits upon the floor and when I lean to retrieve them, I am in fact picking up the pieces of my life. I am a teacher."

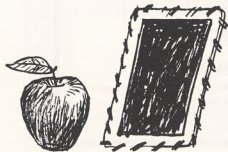

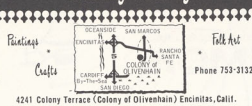

Q. What is the minimum amount required to open a bonus account?

I'm Rufus the Red-Tailed Hawk. In my kind of bird family all first hatched sons are named Rufus—probably because the tops of our tail feathers are "rufescent" or "rufus-red" in color. My Father is named Rufus as was his father and his father before him.

The day I hatched everything was wet and darkish, and I was uncomfortable in

the shell I'd outgrown. I'd been poking fiercely with my beak against the inside of my shell when suddenly it cracked open and I was bathed in blinding light. Two roundish eggs next to me were still

uncracked though I could hear faint sounds inside them. Soon there were two more damp baby hawks in the nest beside me. I had a brother and a sister—Reginald and Regina. Our baby feathers fluffed out quickly in the hot sun and we were warm and comfortable. Our world was a shallow, flattened nest of large sticks which Mother and Father had built high in the top of a tree and had lined with smaller sticks and other delightfully soft things. I soon found a favorite corner where I could poke my head over the edge and watch the world below or scan the skies above.

Days passed quickly. Mother and Father began to feed us fresh meat dinners—mice, squirrels, rabbits, rats and luscious, crunchy beetles-bugs-and-insects. We had excellent appetites and grew quickly. But not quickly enough—we wanted to learn to fly. We pestered our parents daily. Every morning we'd wake them up with the question, "How-many-more-days-is-it-til-we-can-fly?" At last the Big Day arrived. We were to have our first flying lesson! We'd all awakened long before sunrise and were a mass of happy feathery flutterings before morning finally dawned—bright and cloudless. We were far too excited to eat breakfast, and after what seemed like forever our parents took us out on the launching limb. I was first, of course, and even though my heart was half way into my throat I didn't let on that I was frightened because I knew that Mother counted on me to lead the way for my more timid brother and sister. Breathlessly I waited for Father's signal—then spread my strong young wings and for the first time felt the glorious sensation of flight. Soon we were all in the air and covered the sky with our swoops and soaring circles. When the lesson was over Mother and Father could hardly get us back to the nest. It was such glorious fun—we wanted to fly forever.

Day followed day, filled with exciting flying and hunting lessons. We became masters of The Sear, The Glide, and The Diving Swoop. From high in the sky we learned to recognize even the faintest sign of mouse, ground squirrel, or rabbit. Soon we were able to catch our own dinners and often didn't see our parents for long periods of time. One day, Father began our final lesson. I was too anxious to be off on my own and unfortunately didn't pay as much attention as I should have. He was talking about people—especially the ones who have a third arm which is long and shiny black and makes fearful thunderous noise. I'd never seen anything like that and didn't think it was important. I wanted to fly free, and I could take care of myself. I was sure that I knew just as much as did my wise Father. When we left our nest for that last time I hardly looked back. I knew exactly where I wanted to go—a special valley with tall trees and superb mouse hunting. For many happy days I lived there, and I made the acquaintance of a pretty girl hawk named Rebecca. We hunted and took long soaring flights together.

Then one day it happened. I was circling

back over a spot where I thought I'd seen a mouse. Suddenly I heard a dreadful noise and felt my left wing shatter and tear painfully. All too late I remembered my Father's last lesson. Why hadn't I listened? The next moments were blurred. Somehow I landed and, dragging my crippled wing, found cover. I didn't know what would happen next, and I didn't care. Everything was blackness stabbed with blinding, bright spears of pain. I dimly heard a kind voice saying, "You poor dear thing." I felt motion and knew I was being taken somewhere.

That was many days ago. I'm now getting well and strong again and am grateful for the good care I've been given at this Shelter for all needy animals. Here I've learned that we Red-Tailed Hawks are valuable friends of man because our diet of rodents and insects helps keep nature in a proper balance.

I do hope that my wing heals completely and that I can soon return to my world of winds and open skies. I want to be free, and I'd like to go back to my special tree and beautiful valley.

I wonder if Rebecca will still be there . . . I do hope so.

SACRAMENTO REPORT

FROM THE OFFICE OF
ASSEMBLYMAN JOHN STULL

One of the most exciting developments in the near future for the Great 80th (and all of California, for that matter) is the proposed Torrey Pines Underwater State Park. Markers are already placed for this deep sea wonderland right offshore and the first steps will be taken soon to preserve the area in all its natural splendor. On September 27, there will be a tour conducted for San Diego's congressional and state legislators and various other officials. On the 28th, there will be a meeting at Scripps Institution on this development.

The Torrey Pines Underwater State Park is one of three proposed by the Advisory Board on Underwater Parks for the Department of Parks and Recreation, to preserve outstanding biological and geographical features along California's 1300 mile ocean shoreline. The other two are the Julia Pfeiffer Burns State Park in Monterey County and Salt Point in Sonoma County.

There is also a survey being conducted of the entire coast, which is the first phase in developing a comprehensive plan to establish a chain of underwater parks. The environmental planning being developed in cooperation with the Department of Fish and Game will provide for the needs of skin divers, line fishermen, tide-pool collectors, underwater photographers, and marine-science educators. Business and industrial needs will also be taken into consideration.

The sea around us is one of my primary interests, perhaps because of my years in the Navy. At any rate, I'm glad to participate in this new and imaginative project and that we will be able soon to invite people from all over the world to visit and observe this great Marine showcase in the 80th Assembly District.

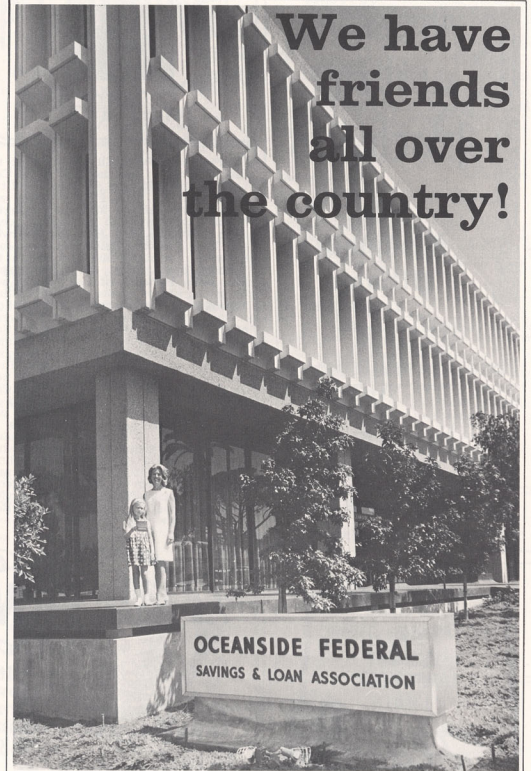

LOCAL CAR DEALER OPPOSES ODOMETER DISCONNECT LAW

Emphatically stating his opposition to the new state law which allows disconnection of a new car's odometer before the vehicle's sale Wayne Gossett of the Wayne Gossett Ford Agency in Encinitas, today called for repeal of the controversial measure.

"I value the confidence and trust of the public and believe this new law does not give the customer the protection to which he is entitled," Gossett declared.

"I am particularly concerned," Gossett said, "about the provision of the law which requires the dealer to give the buyer only an estimate of the number of actual miles on the new car. Not only is this unworkable and unenforceable, but it sows the seeds of doubt and mistrust in the mind of the customer."

The bill, sponsored by Fred W. Marler (R-Redding), was signed into law by Governor Reagan August 14.

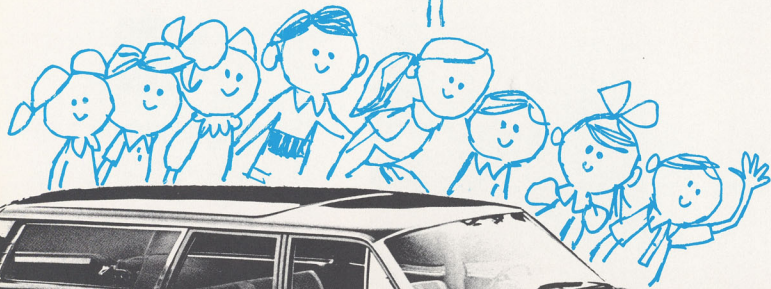
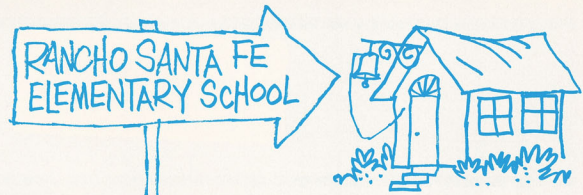
