Board Committee Appointments Listed

Announcement of appointments to various committees were made at the July 1 meeting of the Board of Directors of the Rancho Santa Fe Association.

Stanford Tompkins was named chairman of the Parks and Recreation Board; Rev. Chester Tolson, chairman of the Youth Activities Committee; William Weddell, chairman of the Planning Committee; Raymond Gordon, chairman of the Highway Committee; R. M. Clotfelter, chairman of the Health and Sanitation Committee; Raymond Gordon, chairman of the Tennis Committee.

It was noted that the Tennis Committee is divorced from the Recreation Board, having the same status as the Golf Course Committee and other independent committees, which report directly to the Board.

Approved

Approval was given to the appointment of the following members to the Golf Course Committee by President Jenkins: Roy Kirby, chairman, Harold Nigg, C. C. Randolph Jr., James Stockton, Margaret Muench, Sidney Jandorf, Board member, and W. A. Smart, ex-officio.

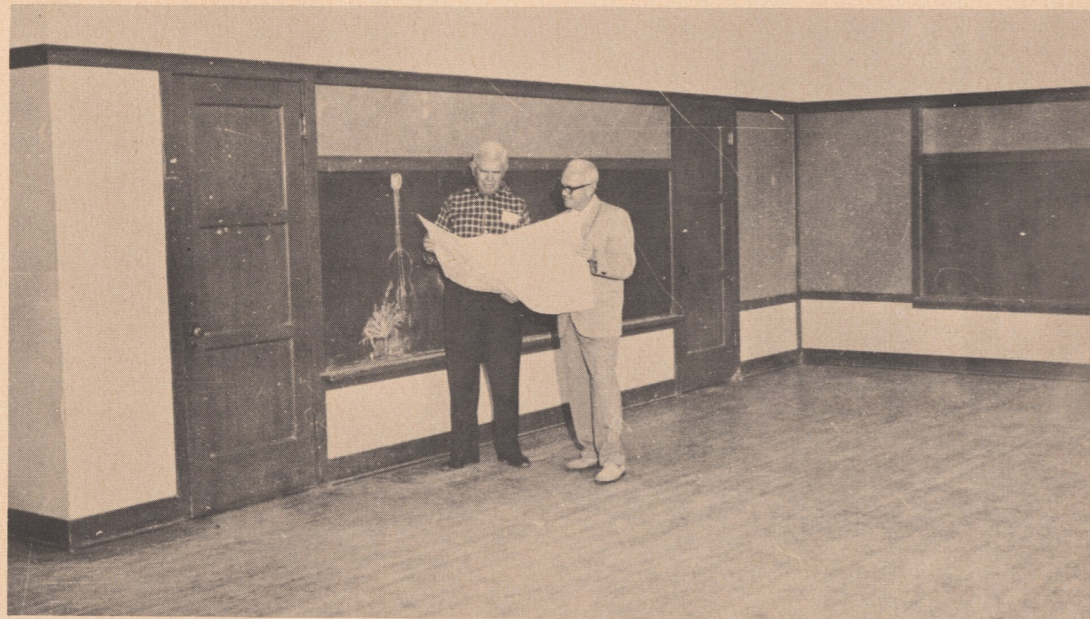
The Board adopted a resolution to amend the by laws as follows: "To appoint committees for such special purposes as may be deemed advisable by the Board, membership and tenure of office to be determined by the Board in each case as may be desirable. The appointment of the following committees shall be mandatory, the appointments to be made annually in June. These committees shall consist of not less than 3 members, at least one of whom shall be a Director of the Association. They shall serve for one year or until their successors shall be appointed, and in addition, the Association manager shall be an ex-officio member without vote."

Members of the Rancho Santa Fe Association are to be given preference on all facilities available and controlled by the Association, especially in golf, tennis and riding, so ruled the Board.

Move Courts

Two additional tennis courts are planned by the Association, arrangements for the grading already made and work to begin immediately. However, the concrete slabs will not be poured until the hot weather has abated.

Sewage Plans Report Heard by Supervisors

A recent report to the County Board of Supervisors recommended long-range sewage disposal plans for the North County area.

It was suggested that the North County be divided into three regions, one to consist of the Fallbrook to Oceanside area; region two, Vista, Carlsbad, San Marcos, Leucadia, Escondido, Cardiff, Solana Beach and Encinitas; and region three would include Ramona, Rancho Santa Fe, Del Mar, Camp Callan, Sorrento Valley and Poway.

Presently, 15 sewerage agencies are serving the three areas which consist of about 1,250,000 acres with a total of 10 drainage areas.

North County area, which has a population of 147,000 at present, is expected to have more than 1,000,000 by the year 2000.

Development in region three, which includes the Ranch, is expected to be the fastest due to its proximity to the city of San Diego.

The report stated that trunk sewers are to be built into the valleys tributary to Soledad Canyon; that the present Sorrento plant should be expanded; the Del Mar treatment plant should be converted to a pumping plant,

and that the waste should be discharged through a long outfall near the northern end of Torrey Pines.

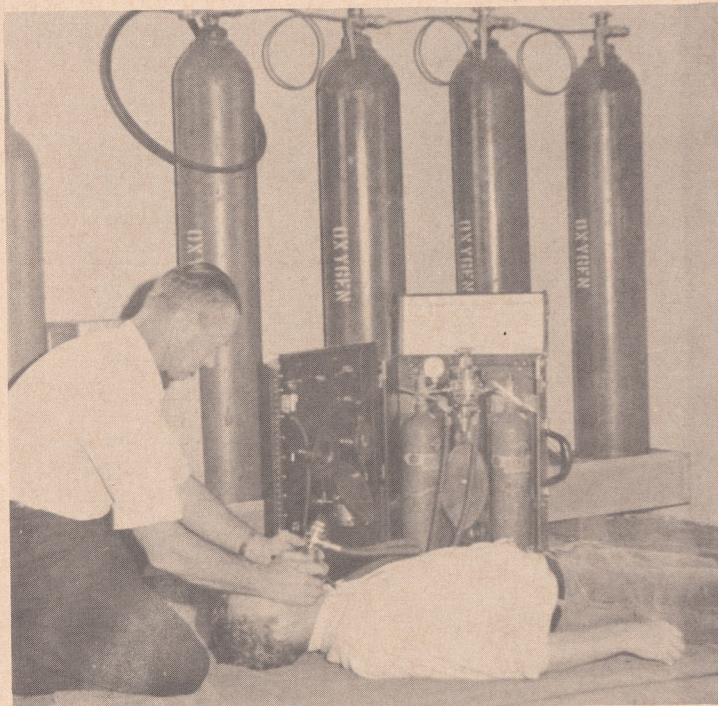

Twelve-Acre Brush Fire Threatens RSF Residences

A spark from an incinerator at the Luis Bishop home started a grass fire that burned 12 acres on La Granada in mid-July — the most serious brush fire of the season.

In accordance with the mutual aid agreement with Encinitas and Solana Beach, each sent a pumper and men to augment the facilities and personnel of the

Rancho Santa Fe fire department. The fire was under control in an hour, but the men were still fighting it after five hours and spent two days mopping up.

Fire Chief James Fox emphasizes again the need for disk-ing vacant property and for obtaining burning permits. He also states that incinerators need 30 feet clearance of ground around them.

Also in July, Fireman James Durant and volunteer fireman, Dave Fairchild, were dispatched to Arcadia with the civilian defense truck to aid in fighting the extensive brush fire in that area. The truck is for use by the local fire department under Civil Defense and can be dispatched for such emergency use.

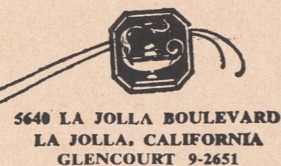

San Diego Symphony

Varied Music Programming Appeals To Many Tastes

Music for many tastes was emphasized in programming the summer series of the San Diego Symphony, held on Tuesday evenings under the skillful conduct- orship of Earl Bernard Murray.

Balboa Park Bowl is the setting for the concerts, with five scheduled this month.

The first will be Aug. 2, a Chorale Concert under the direction of Roger Wagner. By public demand, last year's highly successful presentation of Orff's "Carmina Burana" will be repeated and Mr. Wagner will conduct the local premier of Sir William Walton's "Belshazzar's Feast."

"Music for the Dance" is planned Aug. 9, when Lola Montes and her brilliant dancers will present a program of classical and folk dances and flamencos from Spain, also native dances of Latin America.

An all-Beethoven concert is

scheduled Aug. 16, with Leon Fleisher, pupil of Artur Schnabel and winner of the Queen Elizabeth of Belgium International Competition, as soloist.

Soloists and chorus of Star-Light will join the San Diego Symphony for a Rodgers and Hammerstein Night, featuring "Flower Drum Song," "State Fair," "King and I," "Carousel," "South Pacific" and "Oklahoma!"

Crowning the series for the last concert Aug. 30, will be the New York Philharmonic under the baton of the noted conductor, Leonard Bernstein.

Pillar Rose Long Caned

Many people have expressed confusion over the difference between a climber and a pillar rose. Basically the difference is

this: A pillar rose might be called a bush rose with extra long canes. It only grows to a height of about eight feet. And unlike the climber, it does not need support but will train itself nicely against a pillar or post.

It was voted to increase the liability insurance coverage of the Association to \$500,000 and \$1,000,000; also Raymond Jung, who has been serving the unexpired term of George Vernon Russell as architect of the Art Jury, was re-appointed for a period of three years, beginning January 1, 1960.

Recognized for their outstanding work on the Maintenance District Committee, Carl Muench, W. R. Fawcett and Harry Booth Jr., were recommended by President Jenkins to the County of San Diego for re-appointment to the committee.

Account Change

The Board also voted that the Corporation open an account or accounts with the Security-First National Bank and that a \$10,000 government security note be changed to Time Certificate of Deposit. Aims of the new Humane Society are as follows:

1. To prevent cruelty to animals.
2. To rescue and relieve animals from distress, want, harsh and cruel treatment and to protect animals against danger, suffering and misuse.
3. To labor for the education of a public sentiment to secure high ideals of humanity toward animals.
4. To maintain or assist in the maintenance of animal pounds or shelters.
5. To assume the responsibilities of law enforcement which

are obligatory, under the laws of the State of California, upon societies for the prevention of cruelty to animals, and to exercise the powers and privileges conferred by such laws upon such societies and upon non-profit corporations generally.

6. To do and perform all acts reasonably incident to such purposes.

7. To solicit, raise, accumulate and spend funds exclusively for such purposes.

Dr. James Moriarity, chief cartographer at Scripps Oceanography, brought displays and addressed the archeology class at Rancho Santa Fe summer school recently.

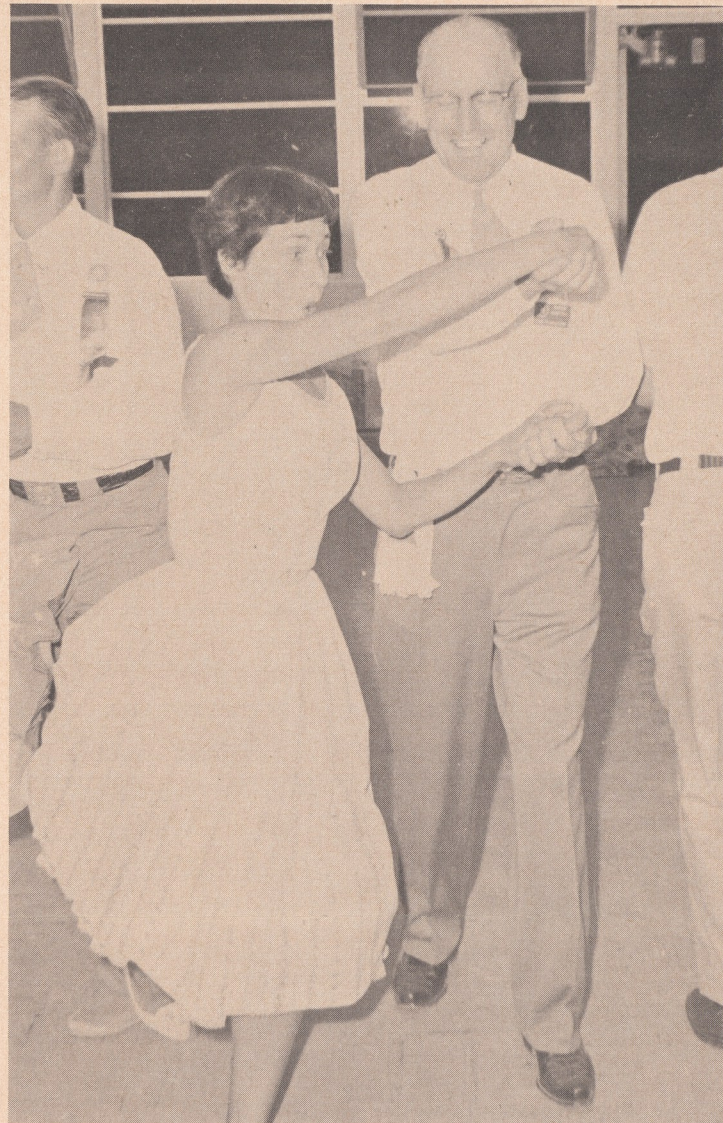
Taught by Roger R. Rowe, the class numbers 40 students, fifth and sixth grade students. Mr. Rowe arranges weekly field trips for the group.

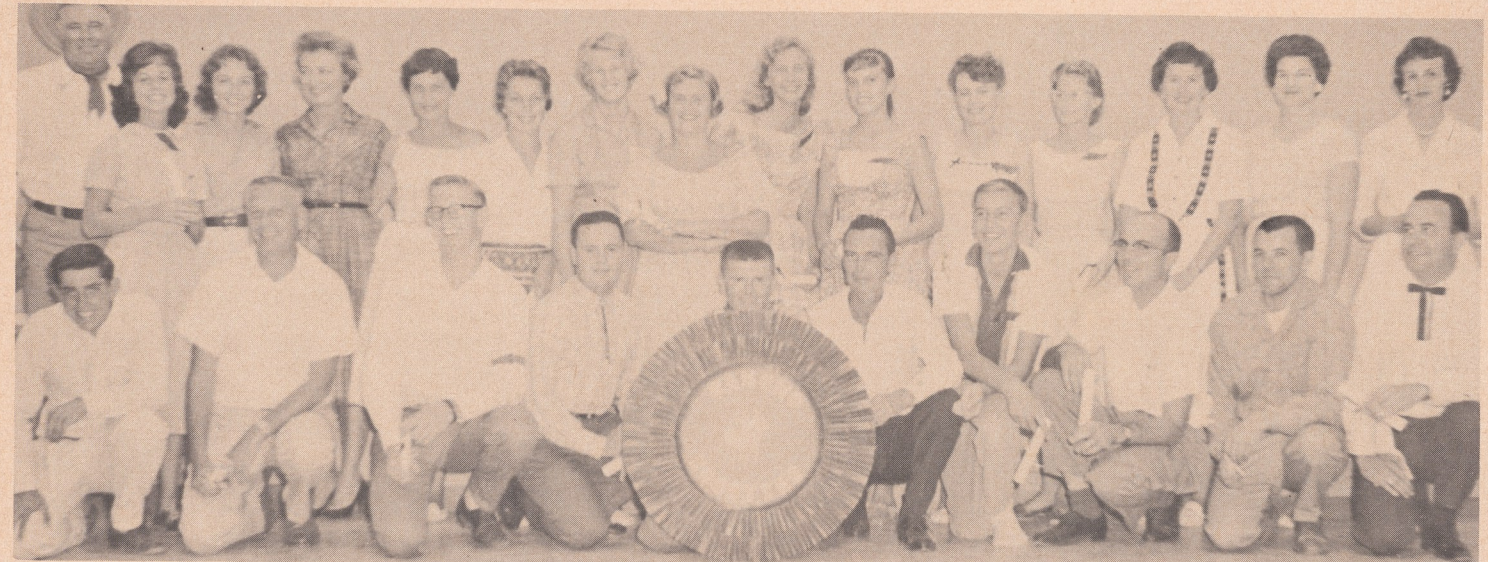

The youngest was Bertha Rae Young, six-year-old daughter of callers Kenny and Julie Young,

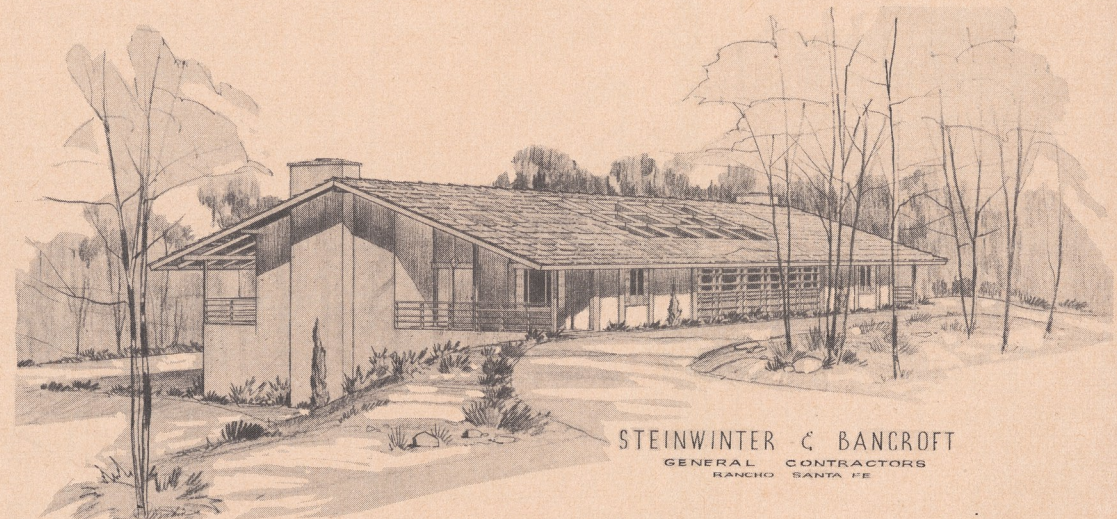
who by reason of her regular attendance was considered eligible. The affair drew a crowd of approximately 120, some from adjacent communities.

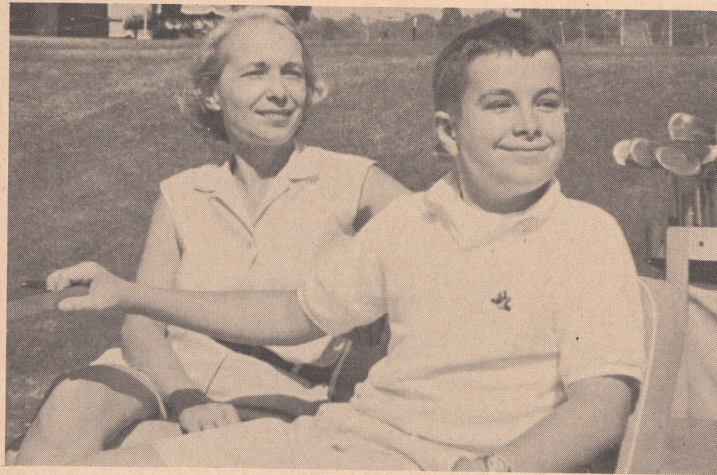
