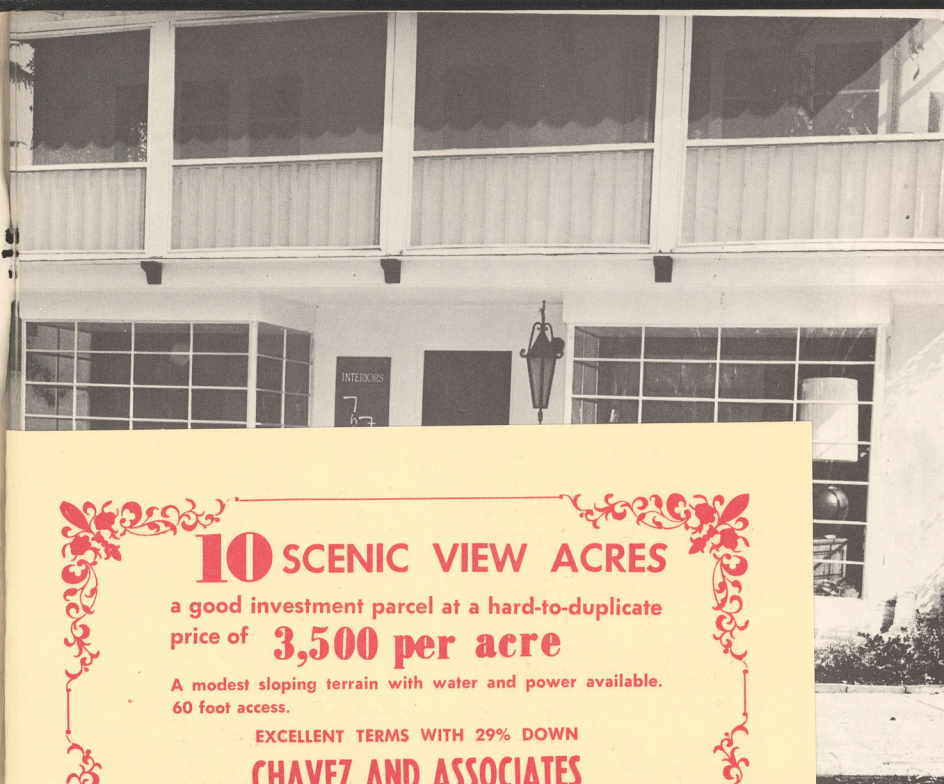

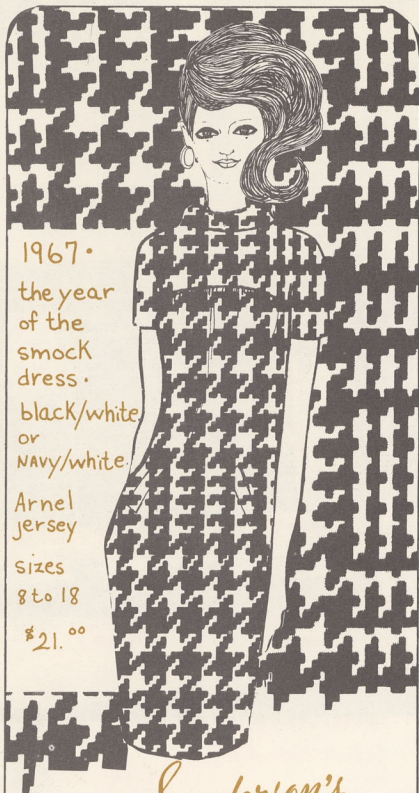

She is Governor of the San Diego Colony of Mayflower Descendants.

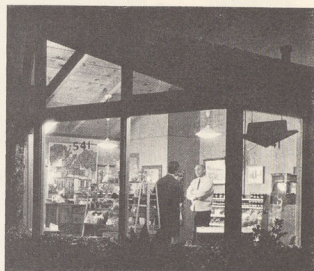

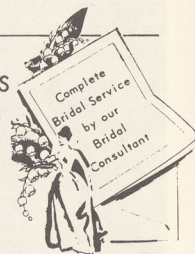

Season tickets are \$6.00 for the strip of four and in addition each purchaser of strip tickets will receive two guest tickets which like the strips, may be used singly or all at one program. There will also be a No-Host Luncheon following each of the Opera Interpretation Series.

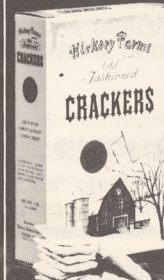

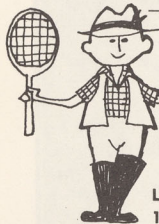

## In Memoriam

KATHERINE KIMBALL MITCHELL

1906-1967

Kay Mitchell was a wonderful woman. There is hardly a person in Rancho Santa Fe (except the brand new newcomers) who did not know Kay and admire her. Always enthusiastic, friendly, and happy she possessed a "green thumb" with plants and shrubbery that has never been equalled. Her "Bird Spa," which she designed, was a consuming interest to Kay . . . and the hundreds and thousands of birds who will enjoy the delights of her invention will be a tribute to her over the years.

Katherine Kimball Mitchell was born in Chicago, Illinois on March 26th, 1906 and came to California when she was a young lady of sixteen. At the age of twenty-four she met and married Glenn Alexander Mitchell, an architect and building contractor. The following year (1931) they moved to La Jolla where their son Steven was born . . . followed by Jimmy in 1934. Fifteen years later they moved to Rancho Santa Fe. Mr. Mitchell passed away in September of 1954, and Kay made Rancho Santa Fe her permanent home.

Kay had always been very busy with garden design, garden clubs, flower arrangement and landscaping . . . a background of some thirty years in this profession. The Rancho Santa Fe Garden Club was Kay's very special pride and joy, and the hours she spent there "above and beyond the call of duty" are very apparent. The "Bird Spa" design was patented last year, and the trademark was issued (officially) just a month ago. The designs, the original artwork of Ranchoite and close friend, Priscilla Fawcett are very delightful—and were a source of great satisfaction.

Kay died very suddenly on Tuesday afternoon, January 4th after a severe stroke. Private services were followed by cremation and her ashes have been entombed in El Camino Mausoleum in Sorrento Valley, next to those of her husband. In addition to her sons, she is survived by her two daughters-in-law and four grandchildren. She will be long remembered by her scores of many friends.

ROBERT KEITH

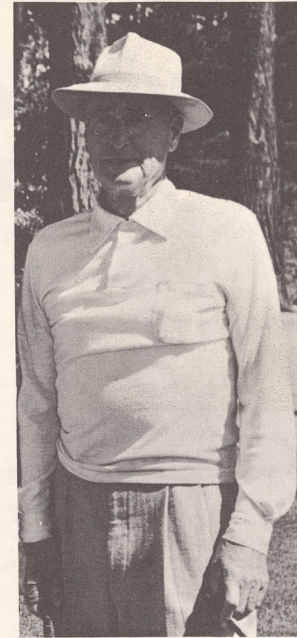
1898-1866

Robert Keith, veteran actor, died in his sleep on Thursday, December 22nd in Hollywood. Mr. Keith, a well-known, respected and admired member of our community divided his time between Rancho Santa Fe and Hollywood . . . and was a well-known figure on the Rancho Santa Fe Golf Course. A Requiem Mass was celebrated on Wednesday, December 28th in St. Victor's Church in Hollywood, and burial was in Holy Cross Cemetery. Funeral services were delayed for the arrival of his son, actor Brian Keith, from Europe. Active pallbearers were Ranchoite George Lewis, John Veitch, Fred Howard, Lawrence Wolff, Michael Kelly, Jr. and A. C. Lyles. Honorary pallbearers were Gov. Ronald Reagan, James Cagney, Norman Foster, Henry Fonda, Josh Logan, Edward G. G. Robinson, Abe Lastfogel, Ricardo Montelban, Louis Edelman and William Demarest. Besides his son, Brian, and daughter-in-law, Judith, Mr. Keith is survived by his widow, the former actress Dorothy Tierney Keith, and four grandchildren.

Mr. Keith was a onetime Broadway star who also appeared in many Hollywood films and television shows. He started his 55-year show business career as a stock player at 15.

His first Broadway starring role was in 1921 with the late Helen Menken in "The Triumph of X." He later wrote and produced "The Tightwad," and appeared in "The Children's Hour," "Yellow Jack," "Peace on Earth," "Kiss and Tell" and "Mr. Roberts."

Mr. Keith appeared in many motion pictures, including "Cimarron," "Guys and Dolls," "Love Me or Leave Me," and "My Foolish Heart." On television he appeared in such series as "Alfred Hitchcock Presents," "The Fugitive," "Eleventh Hour" and "Twilight Zone."

## Santa Fe Irrigation District Taking Steps to Serve Better Quality Water; Prior to Completion of new Filtration Plant For Area Residents

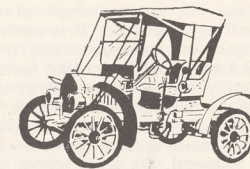
At its regular meeting held on Monday, January 9, 1967, the Board of Directors of Santa Fe Irrigation District discussed the quality of water being supplied to the San Dieguito and Santa Fe Irrigation Districts by the City of San Diego, which is the sole source of supply. The Districts were receiving water from the Second Aqueduct from late summer to December, 1966, at which time the city shut off this source of supply, and started delivering water from Lake Hodges via the flume leading to San Dieguito Reservoir, and will continue to do so as long as it is available. This necessitates the development of an emergency method of treating the water.

It has been suggested by District engineers that the flume be utilized as a coagulation and settling basin, upon installation of two 12,000 gallon tanks for chemicals in a section upstream from the outlets to Solana Beach and Rancho Santa Fe.

A resolution authorizing emergency measures for improving the quality of water was adopted which directed the management to cooperate with the San Dieguito Irrigation District in this emergency action.

It was determined by the Board that the flow of Lake Hodges water be stopped, effective immediately, and request from the City of San Diego temporary delivery of Second Aqueduct water. The present supply of water in the San Dieguito Reservoir is to be treated with a coagulant to reduce the turbidity, tests made, and if the tests are successful proceed immediately with the installation of two 12,000 gallon tanks for chemicals, and appurtenances. If this method of purifying the water proves to be unsatisfactory, the Districts must then negotiate with the City of San Diego for delivery of water from the Second Aqueduct. If such negotiation is required, it must be recognized that the price of water to the consumer will have to be increased by a substantial amount.

It is the desire of your Board to serve a better quality of water, and steps are being taken to do so, prior to the completion of the new filtration plant which is being designed by James M. Montgomery, Inc., Consulting Engineers.



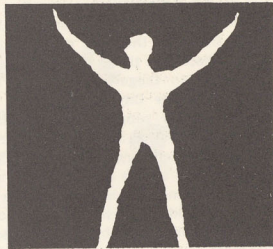

Alan Watts holds a master's degree from Seabury-Western Seminary in Illinois, and a doctorate of divinity from the University of Vermont. He has been an editor, Episcopal minister, university professor, and a research fellow of Harvard University. His interest in the relation of Eastern thought to psychotherapy has led to lectures before many professional groups, including the C. G. Jung Institute in Zurich, and to frequent consultant service to mental hospitals. His most recent books are *Beyond Theology* and *The Book*.

T. A. Munson is this year working with Kairos as Advisor and Resident Fellow. An M.D., he is currently engaged in the private practice of psychotherapy in La Jolla, California. Dr. Munson has successfully developed a unique method of process-oriented psychotherapy working with both individuals and groups. This style emphasizes the here and now, rather than the traditional psychoanalytic approach of interpreting the past. This idea has grown from his association with the Japanese Zen Master, Ishiguro, and particularly the approach of dealing with the present psychological defenses as shown by Hellmuth Kaiser in his book *Effective Psychotherapy*. This fusion of Zen therapies and Orthodox Western therapy is particularly congruent to our times and the spirit of Kairos.

Richard E. Farson is Director of the Western Behavioral Sciences Institute. He took his Ph.D. in Psychology at the University of Chicago, having received his B.A. and M.A. from Occidental College. A Ford Fellow on the Harvard University Human Relations Faculty and Research Associate at the University of Chicago, he served in the Navy as Research Officer studying problems of leadership, motivation and morale, and is a member of the National Training Laboratories.

Dr. Farson is the author of a number of papers and is editor of the recent book, *Science and Human Affairs*. His research has been in the area of small group processes, leadership, and social powers and organizational behavior; he is particularly interested in developing new ways of dealing with the human problems of the future and in the application and communication of behavioral sciences knowledge.

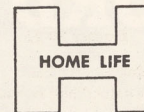

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE RANCHO SANTA FE ASSOCIATION HELD THURSDAY, DECEMBER 1, 1966, AT 9:00 A.M. IN THE BOARD ROOM.

PRESENT: President Blackman, Vice President McLaughlin, Directors Lasswell, Lewis, Millard, Teagle and Thieme.

ALSO PRESENT: Non-Association member Bruce Dillon, representing Rancho Santa Fe Times; also Secretary Van Evera, Building Commissioner Warren and Assistant Secretary Allen.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING:

The minutes of the meeting of November 17, 1966 were approved, as corrected.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

**Keeping of Animals Regulations.** It was moved, seconded, and carried that the revised Keeping of Animals Regulations, as recommended by the Art Jury, be approved.

**Schedule of Fees.** The Association Manager proposed an Annual Association Schedule of Fees listing all charges levied by the Association. It was recommended by the Golf Committee that in order to increase the number of non-Association players a provision be added to the Schedule of Fees providing for monthly billings of prepaid green fees with a premium of \$2.50 per month to be added to monthly billings of all categories of advanced playing privileges. In order to avail themselves of this special reduced rate for playing privileges rather than paying the daily rate at each time of play, golf players would be required to execute a contract with the Association guaranteeing payment of the full annual amount. The privilege of annual or semi-annual prepaid playing privileges is to be retained. This new payment plan was approved for inclusion in the current Schedule of Fees, but not to be effective until July 1, 1967.

A further recommendation of the Golf Committee was to the effect that a private cart rider charge be changed to nine holes at \$1.75. This recommendation was approved.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the schedule of fees, with the additions recommended, be approved for fiscal 1966-67.

DIRECTORS' REPORTS:

**Mr. Lewis, Golf Committee Chairman.** Upon the recommendation of the Golf Committee, it was moved, seconded, and carried that a request from Mr. Perry Lieber for a refund of his six months private cart fee, amounting to \$87.50, be approved.

Upon the recommendation of the Golf Committee, it was moved, seconded, and carried that a request from Mr. L. David Taylor for a refund of his six months leased cart fee, amounting to \$87.50, be approved.

It was agreed that the Friday evening dinners at the Clubhouse would be extended for another four week period, as recommended by the Golf Committee.

It was approved that the Clubhouse be closed to the public on Tuesday, December 13, 1966, with proper posting, for the Women's Golf Club Annual Christmas luncheon; also approved was a Turkey Shoot scheduled for the same day, with the course to be closed from 8:30 A.M. to 1:30 P.M.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that approximately \$800 be approved for the purchase of three tables and twelve chairs for the Men's Locker room.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to authorize an expenditure of approximately \$40 for installation of an intercom between the Men's locker room and the clubhouse bar.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to approve the expenditure of approximately \$30 for installation of a time clock for outside lights around the pro shop.

**Mr. Millard, representing the Parks and Recreation Board,** advised that it had been determined that the cleaning and grading of the barranca through Richardson Park could not be handled with Association equipment. Two bids were presented for performing this work, the low bid being from Escondido Sand & Gravel Co. He explained that when this has been accomplished by a professional firm it can be maintained in the future by Association employees. It was moved, seconded, and carried to accept the bid from Escondido Sand & Gravel Co. in the amount of \$1128.00

SECRETARY'S REPORT:

**Christmas Tree Lighting.** It was moved, seconded, and carried to authorize the annual lighting of the Christmas trees, scheduled for December 12, 1966.

**Board Policy Regarding Subdivision Policy.** Continued for further study.

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

The Board went into executive session at 11:00 A.M. to discuss personnel matters.

ADJOURNMENT:

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 12:30 P.M.

**LEGAL REPORT:**

**Board policy on subdivision procedures.** Administrative procedures for processing subdivision applications were reviewed and on the advice of the counsel the Procedures Concerning the Division of Property Under the Jurisdiction of Rancho Santa Fe Association of January 1, 1966, as revised, currently being employed shall be followed, and in the event the Board of Directors disapproves the subdivision, the applicant shall be afforded the opportunity for further recourse in the manner set forth in Article III, Section 9 of the Protective Covenant.

**SECRETARY'S REPORT:**

**Miscellaneous communications:** A letter from an Association member concerning 1966-67 assessments was read and discussed; the Secretary was ordered to acknowledge the letter and file same.

The Secretary read a letter concerning tax exemption for the Nature Conservancy property. The letter referred to a Board decision of March 4, 1966 waiving the Rancho Santa Fe Association assessment fee against the property, subject to similar action being taken by the County of San Diego. Documents enclosed with the letter showed that the County of San Diego had granted such exemption. The Board approved the granting of exemption from Rancho Santa Fe Association taxes on said property, so long as Nature Conservancy controls same.

**SPECIAL ORDER OF BUSINESS:**

**Policy concerning Covenant Acceptances.** On the recommendation of the Art Jury the following resolution was approved: RESOLVED that no application for annexation to Association covenanted area be considered within a five year period immediately following an unacceptable subdivision of non-covenant property or the construction of a residence upon the property that does not conform to existing Art Jury standards.

**Policy concerning subdivisions.** The Art Jury brought the attention of the Board to the fact that a pattern has developed in recent years to approve subdivisions on a first-come-first-served basis until the limit of permissible sites is reached and then advise the next applicant for subdivision to amend the Covenant to permit a greater number of sites. The Association Manager was directed in all instances where there is a limit on the number of sites by Covenant Acceptance that all affected property owners be informed of the effect of the proposed subdivision on their properties.

**ADJOURNMENT:**

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 12:30 P.M.

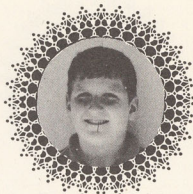
Now I am going to tell you about some other stories about what school meant to children we have read about in the book "Tales To Enjoy."

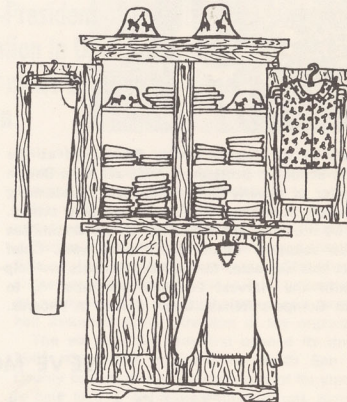
Before Christmas Vacation, a can-of-food for the needy drive was started, and was the most successful drive in the school's history.

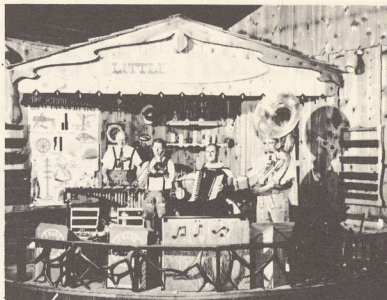
# Peggy Dalzell's Favorite Recipe

## BAKED CRABS

- 1 lb. Crab meat (light or dark meat)
- 1 cup bread crumbs
- 1 large onion, minced
- 1/2 cup celery, minced
- 1 small green pepper, minced
- 1/2 stick butter or margarine
- 1 tbsp. prepared mustard
- 1 tbsp. mayonnaise
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1/4 tsp. garlic salt
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 10 medium crab shells



Saute minced seasoning in butter or margarine until it becomes glazy, but not brown. Mix crab meat and bread crumbs and add cooked seasoning. Also mustard, mayonnaise, eggs, garlic salt and pepper Mixed until well blended. Pack into well greased shells, top lightly with bread crumbs, bake in hot oven, (400°F.), until lightly brown. This mixture should yield about 10 medium sized baked crabs.
