## The pastoral beauty and historic memorabilia of handsome old Scripps Miramar Ranch will be open for public view starting in mid-March.

A gala opening weekend is assured for the tour program through the plans and efforts of the Country Friends, whose countywide charities will benefit from all admissions on Saturday and Sunday, March 15-16. Donations of \$3.00 per person are asked for the opening weekend benefit tickets which will be sold exclusively through Country Friends members and the Country Friends Shops.

Tours lasting approximately an hour-and-a-half will include the richly landscaped grounds, courtyard and outbuildings as well as the 47-room furnished mansion. The staff of trained tour guides will lead groups and narrate highlights on a planned path through the facilities. A rest stop is scheduled at an attractive area surrounding the aviary, stocked with a variety of colorfully plumaged inhabitants and once reputed as "Scripps' Million Dollar Bird Cage." Complimentary refreshments will be served as part of the opening weekend favors, according to Mrs. Vernon Gaston, chairman of the Country Friends event.

Board Members of Country Friends gathered at an invitation addressing event at Scripps Miramar Ranch in mid-February. Photographs in various settings around the 47-room mansion show the charm and beauty of the famous site, acquired by E. W. Scripps in 1890.

 **Scripps Miramar Ranch**

The Scripps Miramar Ranch home and grounds comprise a 15-acre parcel near the center of an 1180-acre expanse purchased late in 1968 by Macco Corporation of New-pert Beach. The total property was sold by the Scripps family Trust for \$4.2 million. It will be developed as a carefully controlled community under the guidance of several Macco Corporation divisions.

The property is secluded on rolling hills, thickly wooded with tall eucalyptus trees and pine, and dotted with several small lakes. It is less than a mile east of Hwy. 395 on Pomerado Road.

Although some have likened Miramar Ranch to William Randolph Hearst's San Simeon retreat, it is less lavish and pretentious in its furnishings and scope, according to the head of Macco's commercial recreation division, E. D. Ettinger. He has stated, "we feel, however, that Scripps Miramar Ranch is more meaningful to the San Diego community because it is a genuinely comfortable family home that reflects the spirit of members of the Scripps family who have lived in it until only a month or so ago."

He added that the weekend tour facility also will be available on a reservation basis for weekday special events, including guided tours for business, social or academic groups. Interested parties should contact public relations director Mrs. Dorothy Clapham at 277-7110.

Management of the Scripps Miramar Ranch Tours project under Ettinger's direction includes John Crofton, operations manager for Macco's commercial recreation division, and Kenneth Jago, general manager of the Scripps Miramar Ranch Tour Project.

To quote William S. Palmer: "I retired because my hobbies interfered with my work." Seeing Bill's complete enthusiasm in his projects — it is more likely that he retired because his work interfered with his hobbies.

He will be one of many exhibitors at the Hobby Show which will be held at the Garden Club on Saturday, March 25th from 12 noon until 8 p.m. Harriet and Kenneth Stixrud are chairmen of the event, and if you have a hobby — contact them — and share it with others.

Bill Palmer concentrates on "unusual ships or ones which are about to pass into history." Some of his models are of ships "that even museums don't have." His replica of the 1630 bark "The Bachelor," which brought colonists from Great Britain to New England, now is displayed at the National Geographic Society building lobby in Washington, D.C. A fascinating fact is that the Portuguese were interested in building a full sized replica of this ship. Claiming to have the best boat craftsmen in the world — they are still building them as they did in the 17th Century.

One of our favorite models in this "home-made fleet" is a Winespusaukee Horse Boat, built by farmers and used for freighting on Lake Winespusaukee, in New Hampshire, circa 1831-1891. It was driven by two horses — walking on a treadmill — driving paddle wheels. In the winter, when the lake was frozen, the farmers took out the treadmill and used it for other purposes, such as driving a buck saw.

Another is a West Coast Steam Lumber Schooner. Bill Palmer was in the lumber business, and bought the original in 1939 when charter boats were getting scarce and expensive. He used it to transport his lumber until October 1940 — when it was lost

in a hurricane off the Florida coast. This ship was 204 feet long, and the model is built on a scale of 1/8 inch equals 1 foot. There is actually lumber in the hold, curtains at the windows, and it is complete to the most minute detail.

Then there is a Chesapeake Bay Skipjack which was used for oystering. As the law in Maryland and Delaware did not permit the use of power in dredging for oysters — they had to be sailing vessels. Because of the shoals, they were of such shallow draft they could practically sail on a heavy dew. This is one of the oldest continuing types of sailboats in America — the first ones having been built in the 1700's. At one time there were as many as 2000 of them in use, but now there are only about 100 left — oysters not being as plentiful as they once were.

Bill is now working on a Gentleman's Pulling Boat, such as would have been used by George Washington, William Penn, or gentlemen of their stature in the 17 and early 18 hundreds. They were used in general transportation purposes, such as visiting, rather than go by horseback over the rutted roads. There were two seats in a rear cabin for the owner, and they were rowed by 6 men if there wasn't wind enough to hoist a sail.

This indefatigable hobbyist is also exhibiting a large board on which he has placed — step by step — the process of trying a trout fly. This should be of interest to all the fishermen on the Ranch.

The hobby of collecting varies greatly. One person is called a Collector — another a Pack Rat. Carol Mackie is a Collector . . . OF PIGS!

Her unusual collection started some years ago when she tucked a china pig into her Mother's Christmas stocking. Thus began her accumulation of these comical porcelains,

which has been added to over the years by gifts from friends—plus her own browsings through Antique Shows and Shops all over the country. They were made in about three factories in Germany from 1850 to 1900 for export — mostly to the United States.

One of the most beguiling is a tiny pig looking into a huge green bottle — in which sits a red devil. Obviously old demon Rum . . . Another is a pig in the barber's chair with the inscription "A little bit off the top."

There are several pink pigs coming out of green purses — proving that even though you can't make a purse out of a sow's ear . . . you can make a sow's ear come out of a purse! This is a fun collection.

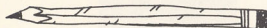

A happy 1969 to you.

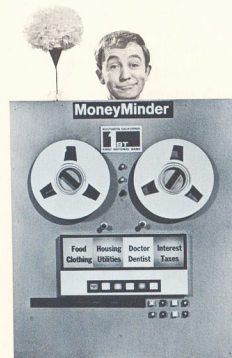

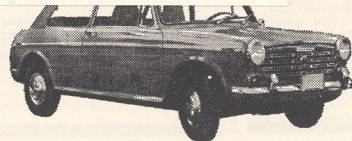

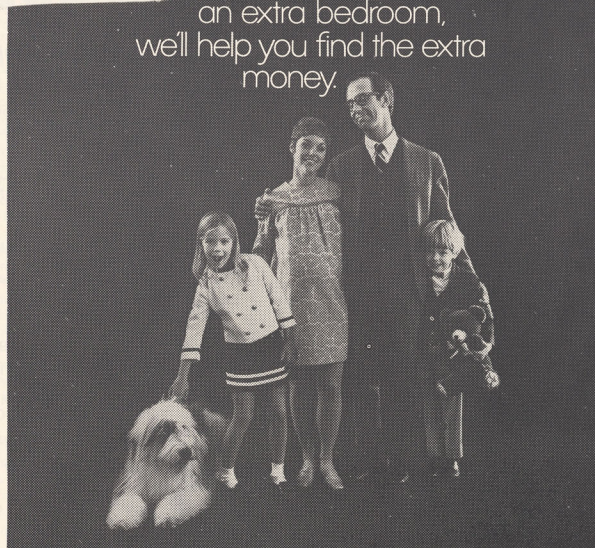

### FINE ARTS GALLERY OF SAN DIEGO RECEIVES GIFT OF CHINESE HANGING SCROLL

A recent acquisition of major importance in the field of Asiatic art has been added to the collection of the Fine Arts Gallery in Balboa Park. It is a Chinese hanging scroll painting of a landscape by Wang Yuan-ch'i (1642-1715) and is the gift of Mrs. Frederick G. Jackson.

Wang Yuan-ch'i, the last of the "Four Wangs" of the late Ming and early Ch'ing Dynasties, was the most advanced of this succession of painters. They were followers of the great innovator, Tung Ch'i-ch'ang (1555-1636), who freed Chinese painting from the academic tradition and picturesque realism. The reduction of nature to its basic compositional elements was the primary concern of these artists with new vision. They prepared the way for the creative development of Chinese painting during the 17th and 18th centuries.

This landscape by Wang Yuan-ch'i, depicting a mountainous scene with a lake surrounded by trees and houses, is the second Chinese painting recently acquired by the Fine Arts Gallery representing the "Four Wangs." A monumental hanging scroll of a landscape by Wang Chien (1598-1677) also is on view at the Gallery.

### FROM THE OFFICE OF ASSEMBLYMAN JOHN STULL

The change of command in the California Assembly has not come about without a loud and continuing shifting of gears. Last year's Speaker, Democrat Jesse Unruh, has gone to the smaller quarters of the minority leader, and Republican Bob Monagan has moved to the larger domain of the Speaker, but there has been no appreciable diminution of press releases or pronouncements from the deposed leader. In fact, the sound and fury seem to be building. Last year's democratic Speaker Pro-Tem, Carlos Bee, has declined to move from the pro-tem's quarters in spite of his eviction notice, and new Pro-Tem, Republican Charles Conrad, is faced with the unexpected harassment of having to fight for space. So it goes.

In my own case, after considering a wide variety of possibilities, I decided to run for Majority Whip. This precluded my accepting a full committee chairmanship and also, forced a choice between Whip and a chance for a place in the powerful Rules Committee. However, possibilities for achieving certain goals seemed greater in the position of Whip, and I was elected with unanimous consent of the caucus. This puts me in a leadership position from which, hopefully, I can serve the Great 80th and California with greater strength.

Speaker Monagan has also appointed me to the Assembly Committees on Education, Revenue and Taxation and Labor Relations. To say the least, this is a challenge, as the first two committees deal with subjects that are considered of prime importance this year, and the third, with increasing strikes of public employees, is definitely interrelated.

Frankly, I meet the challenge with great hope and eagerness for, as the old saying goes, "The game is definitely worth the candle."

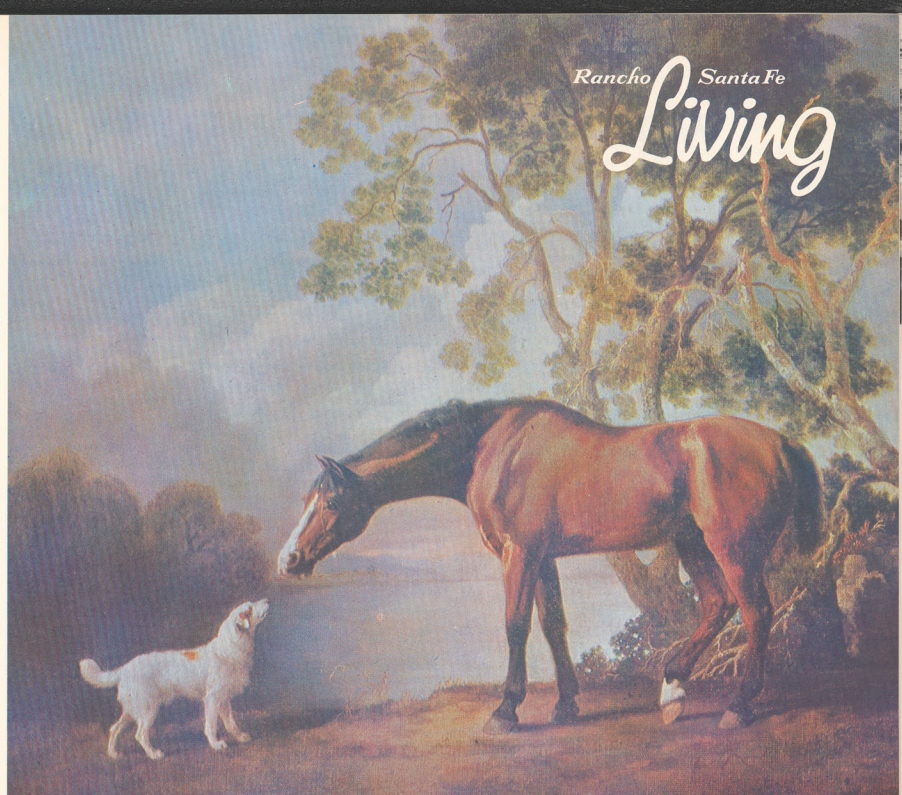

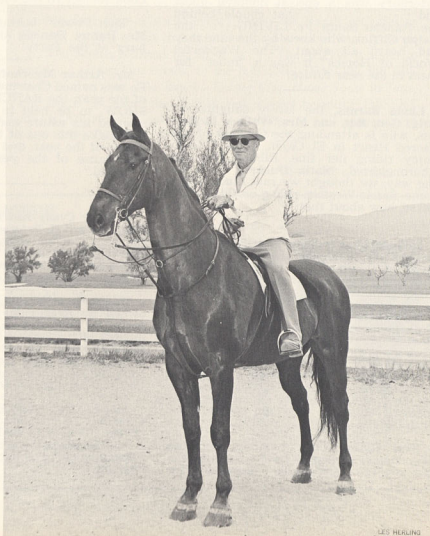

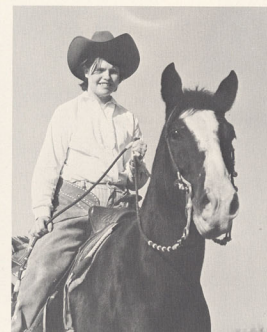

# "TAKE IT FROM A PRO"\*

## DID YOU KNOW?

Xenophon said that "The outside of a horse is food for the inside of a man." Not only is it food for the man, but it is food for the man's economy or the economy of the man's community.

California has the *largest* horse population in the U.S.A., *excluding* the multi-billion dollar racing industry. Pleasure horses and show horses make up this population, with Southern California leading in density of "population" and San Diego County in local popularity in the South.

Consider the economy—A man who buys a horse, any horse . . . pleasure, farm horse, working cow horse or show horse . . . automatically begins to support many segments of the economy.

**AUTO INDUSTRY** . . . Cars to haul trailers, station wagons, pickups, campers, light trucks, tractors, trailers, (2, 4, even 6 horse trailers) for horses, palatial 6, 8, and 9 horse vans, with tractor trailers, air conditioning and 2-way intercommunication service, all are needed to convey horses every day. On the farm, manure spreaders, tractors to haul manure to the fields are needed, and various tools.

**FARMING INDUSTRY** . . . The hay, feed and grain merchants do a huge business with the owners of horses. Hay, straw, oats, corn, sweetfeed, baled shavings (for bedding), all are essential!

**METALLURGICAL INDUSTRY** . . . Horses need shoes—*steel shoes*. They wear them out and need new ones. To do this one must employ a blacksmith or farrier as he is often called. He buys shoes and horseshoe nails, from the factory. He needs a travelling forge and bellows, plus anvil, hammers, rasps, paring knives and pincers; as well as other tools to enable him to shoe a horse.

**SADDLERY AND ALLIED EQUIPMENT** . . . Riding clothes, breeches, boots, hats, shirts, ships, velvet hunting caps, riding coats, spurs, chaps, bridles, reins, halters, lead ropes, feed pails and horse blankets, coolers, false tails for saddle horses, tail sets, horse medicines, patent feeds, as well as electric "hot walkers" are needed.

**MEDICAL ASPECT** . . . Ever important is the role of the veterinarian, his services to preserve the life and usability of each horse, as well as the pharmaceutical supplies necessary for healthy maintenance of the animal, and expensive and custom X-ray equipment that is necessary in this service.

**WAGES AND SALARIES** . . . Groom and horse trainers make up a big part of the economy. They command good wages and are much in demand (demand exceeds supply of good ones in either category), and during the show season they draw "board wages," which are spent in local restaurants and motels.

**HORSES** . . . The figures here have the widest scope—from a few hundred dollars for a hack (a horse used merely for pleasure riding, not show) to \$25,000.00 to \$40,000.00 for a top quality show horse, parade horse or jumper . . . and again, the demand for good ones exceeds the supply. A rough estimate of the more than 2,200 horses entered in the Del Mar Horse Show (the World's Largest Horse Show) produced the *staggering* total of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  million dollars as the capital investment for horses, equipment and wages at this twelve day horse show!

"Good for the inside of a man?" Truly the horse must be food for man, many men's business!

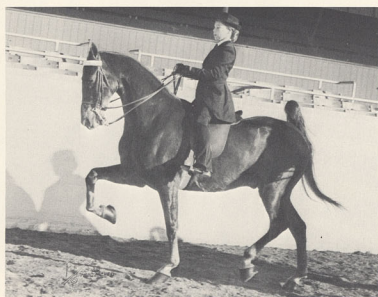

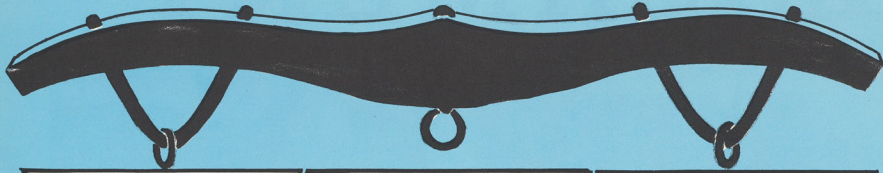

The Rancho Santa Fe Association Board has authorized the Golf Committee to proceed with the replacement of dead plantings and to add trees and shrubs. ## THE BEAT GOES ON AT LOMAS SANTA FE

... as all phases move ahead

Now that those PGA qualifying rounds for the Andy Williams San Diego Open golf tournament are a pleasant memory, along with all the flattering things said about the course when more than a hundred pros played it under conditions that had other courses in the area in really bad shape, a quick look at the many other projects moving along in unison at Lomas Santa Fe is certainly in order.

Before leaving golf: course superintendent Ed Mena, who attended a national convention of golf course superintendents last month in Miami, has been the recipient of praise from all sides for the superb condition of the course after only one year of play, as well as for its exceptional drainage. And professional Charlie Rizzo has a number of member and member-guest events lined up ahead, following on those which proved popular in the past few weeks.

### TENNIS

Four championship courts, two of them night-lighted and with extra out-of-bounds space on all sides, are now ready and in use, complete with wind screens which also serve to eliminate possible distraction from motion outside the courts. A tennis professional has been engaged; more about him and about the actual schedule of spring and summer tennis activities to provide maximum use of the courts by members and their entire families, and for individual and group instruction, will be forthcoming immediately.

### SWIMMING

Last phases of construction of the swimming pool were under way as this was being written. The pool, a 25-meter one conforming to AAU specifications for competitive use, boasts both 1-meter and 3-meter boards, which offer full scope for both recreational and competitive diving. A professional swimming instructor has been engaged and will be working with Lomas Santa Fe Country Club vice president and general manager Kent Staab on schedules and arrangements for private and class instruction immediately. Full details will be reported in LIVING'S

next issue. A wading pool and play-yard for the enjoyment of the youngest are near at hand—but not close enough to interfere with serious swimming.

### THE POOL CLUBHOUSE

The authentically Spanish Colonial pool clubhouse between the courts on the west and the pool on the east is scheduled to be completed during March. It will be a beautiful but thoroughly efficient center of recreational and social activities, providing not only locker rooms, showers and rest rooms for members and their guests, but an attractive lounge, a dining room, kitchens, cocktail lounge, sauna baths—and above them all a sun deck with additional dining space and excellent close-up views of both tennis and swimming activities. Look a little farther west from this vantage point and you'll have a fine view of the blue Pacific!

### THE ISLA VERDE AREA

These larger, deluxe home-sites are the first to have been graded and offered for sale, and a majority of those in the first group of 61 lots to be placed on sale had been sold at this writing. "Isla Verde" is a thoroughly

apt name for this group of home-sites; it means "Green Island" and so it is in truth; this section of the development is surrounded by fairways and greens of the golf course, and commands gorgeous prospects of the nearby and distant countryside. As announced recently, five fine home builders of the area (Bernardo Investment Co., Inc., of Rancho Bernardo; Collins Development Co. of La Jolla; Shelstead Bros. of Del Mar; Weir Bros. Adobe Design & Construction Co. of Escondido; and Warren L. Wyman of Rancho Santa Fe) have joined in a "participating home builder program." Purchasers of Isla Verde home-sites will thus benefit from a wide selection of plans and elevations offered by these builders—or, if they choose, they may employ their own architects.

### PLAZA OF THE FOUR FLAGS

Grading has been completed just east of Interstate 5 and south of Skyline Drive (now renamed and shortly to be re-signed Lomas Santa Fe Drive) for an 80,000 square-foot shopping center; construction may well be under way by the time this issue of *Living* is printed. Such major tenants as Walker Scott, Safeway, United California Bank, are among those with space already leased, and a full complement of fine small shops, a boutique pharmacy, and other services will occupy the facility, scheduled for opening late in 1969. A notable and exciting aspect of the Plaza of the Four Flags (where the flags of Spain, Mexico and California as well as of the United States will fly from tall poles in the mall where artistic old fountains will play) is the avowed determination Lomas Santa Fe principals have to go 'way beyond the demands of mere housing for this center.

Describing the Plaza as a place where shoppers must be happy, and must wish to relax and enjoy the beauty of the premises as well as of the area, they point out that their investment here will be far above the cost of mere utility; their goal is a combination of superior construction and absolutely faithful conformity to authentic Old Spanish Colonial architecture and design that will mark a new milestone in shopping center attractiveness and appeal.

### FAMILIES, GREENBELTS AND GOLF CARTS

Most notable features of the Lomas Santa Fe complex, other than its great golf course and Spanish Colonial atmosphere, are undoubtedly these three: the fact that the country club facilities are completely family-oriented to embrace every member of the family; the abundance of greenbelts meandering everywhere to accomplish a delightfully pastoral atmosphere; and the fact that residents can use golf carts for shopping, neighborhood visiting and social activities generally as well as for sports and recreational activity—without needing the car or the highway at all!

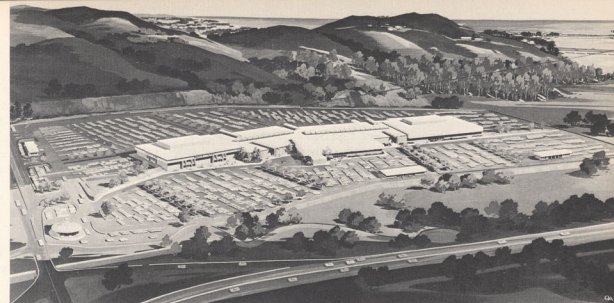
### PLAZA CAMINO REAL TO OPEN ON MARCH 5th

## GAS TURBINE POWER PLANT WILL BE INSTALLED ON POINT LOMA

The San Diego Gas & Electric Company recently announced plans for installation of a gas turbine power plant at San Diego's sewage treatment plant on Point Loma.

The 1600-kilowatt unit will operate on sludge gas from the sewage treatment plant. In utilizing this undesirable gas, the turbine will also dispose of the ventilating air from the plant by using this second undesirable waste product as combustion air.

Plans for the power plant were firm ed up with the authorization of an incineration service agreement by the San Diego Gas & Electric Company and the City of San Diego.

The gas turbine power plant will be

owned and operated by the utility company. It is expected to be in operation in about 20 months. Electricity generated by the unit will be utilized in the company's distribution system.

Designed for continuous use, the gas turbine generator will be able to operate on natural gas if needed during periods of low sludge gas production. The sludge gas is formed by bacterial decomposition of sewage in digester units at the treatment plant. Currently, this gas is piped to an incinerator where some of it is used to burn the ventilating air. The excess sludge gas is flared into the atmosphere.

Until his death, Whitney continued on the Advisory Board of the Y and as Chairman of the Y.M.C.A. Board of Trustees supervising the investment of Y.M.C.A. Endowment Funds.

Owner of Whitney Department Stores, he still found time for many other community services including President of San Diego Rotary, Chairman of the Board of the First National Bank, State Park Commission and Mission Bay Advisory Committee, etc.

The Y.M.C.A. is designing the facilities to serve as not only a family program center, but to serve all members of the family on an individual basis in such programs as teen center dances, physical education class for all

ages, special interest classes in such things as bridge, Yoga, Jogging, etc., swimming and life saving classes, day camping and seminars in parent and child relations.

Various community groups such as Scouts, churches and service clubs will be invited to use the facilities when it is not scheduled for other programs, as the Y.M.C.A. feels strongly that they want it used 100% of the time, seven days a week.

Since last May, the Y.M.C.A. has raised \$250,000, and has been interviewing for a third full time professional staff man who will start organizing new programs right away.



### COPENHAGEN SPA SIGN IS A UNIQUE SAND-CASTING DESIGN BY TALENTED MILBURN HUTCHISON OF OLIVENHAIN

An unique art form, handmade original sign from the Country Gallery-Studio of Milburn Robert Hutchison (Colony of Olivenhain) hangs over the entry way of the Copenhagen Spa. Recommended by Norman Krause, Rancho Santa Fe Designer, Mr. H. Henning commissioned Hutchison to design and create a sandcasting for his new Spa, carrying out the theme of the name.

Integrally laced with welded iron, the challenge of making a double-faced sign was next met, and as a result of many, many hours the dried and completed sandcasting was raised.

As proven by the sign, this relatively unfamiliar craft known generally as "Sandcasting" has been developed by Mr. Hutchison to be of greater detail as well as more textural quality than most. Interesting features to look for are the flat finish, deep shadowy undercut, and the rough appearance caused by the sand adhering to the surface. You will find occasional areas where the sand has "yielded to the pour," but these prove to be accidental effects that establish each side as a true original. These qualities are enhanced by side lighting to reveal the fascinating interplay of light and shadow.

Although the Artist's work is well represented on the Ranch the small sandcastings have been Coat-of-Arms plaques, entry way identification, popular as they do not fade, rust, nor need painting, and patio and pool side "murals," it was a great honor to be included in the over all plans of the Copenhagen Spa and meet highly professional and standards of quality set by Mr. Henning.

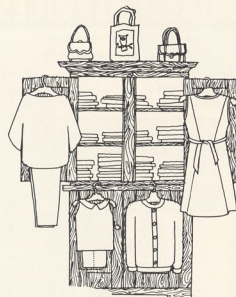

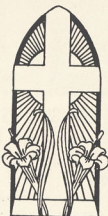

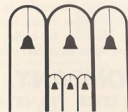
