Through the lips and intellects of these knowledgeable men, we learn and refuel to meet the challenges of tomorrow that have been thrust upon us . . . today!



DR. BILLY GRAHAM

The Reverend Dr. Billy Graham, 48 year-old evangelist, started in Los Angeles in 1949 and drew only 3,000 people. He was raised near Charlotte, North Carolina on a 200-acre farm. A traveling revival sparked his interest and he began to make daily visits which resulted in his “decision.” In 1939 he was ordained to the Baptist ministry and preached in rural communities from one end of Florida to the other. He received a scholarship to Wheaton College where he received his A.B. degree. After graduating he was pastor of a little church in Western Springs, Illinois and from there went to the Youth for Christ movement.

In 1949 his real life work began with a Los Angeles Crusade. Today his staff numbers more than 400, and his magazine Decision, has a circulation of almost two million, making it one of the largest selling monthly publications in the religious field. He has a syndicated column and a radio and TV show “Hour of Decision” that reach millions weekly.



HUBERT H. HUMPHREY

The Honorable Hubert Horatio Humphrey, Vice President of the United States, was born in 1911 in Wallace, South Dakota. On September 3, 1936 he married Muriel Buck, and at her urgings went to the University of Minnesota where working as a pharmacist graduated Magna Cum Laude and Phi Beta Kappa in political science in the year 1939. He entered the Senate in 1949 as an administration supporting liberal after having been Mayor of Minneapolis. The Humphreys have four children: a daughter, Nancy; and three sons, Hubert H., III, Robert Andrew and Douglas Sannes.

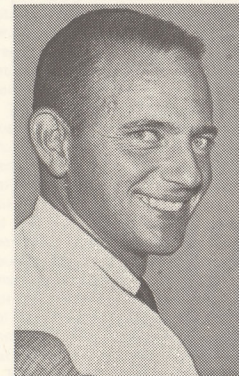
In 1961 his political know-how brought him to assistant floor leader or party ship, in such a position of leadership, he followed a tactic criticized by old time liberals who believed in all or nothing. “If I believe in something, I will fight for it with all I have, but I do not demand all or nothing. I would rather get something than nothing.” And with this viewpoint he is today Vice President of the United States.

JOHN GEORGE DIEFENBAKER

John George Diefenbaker, former Prime Minister of Canada, is a lean six-footer reared in the hardships of a pioneering farm on the plains of Saskatchewan. Early in life he decided on a career as a lawyer and to reach for high public office.

He is a graduate of the University of Saskatchewan where he received his B.A. in 1915, his M.A. in 1916, and LLB in 1919. During World War I he served overseas in the Canadian Army. His political career began in 1940 when he was elected a member of the House of Commons, and led the Conservative Party in Saskatchewan from 1937 to 1940, and in December 1956 he was chosen to lead to Progressive Conservative Party in the federal field.

The most important day for Diefenbaker occurred in 1957 when he became the Thirteenth Prime Minister of Canada since that country's confederation. He participated actively in his county's United Nations activities and now at age 71 continues to lead the loyal opposition.



L. B. MAYTAG

Lewis B. (Bud) Maytag, a native of Minnesota, began his aviation career in 1948 when he founded the Maytag Aircraft Corporation in Colorado Springs, Colorado. In 1958, he purchased controlling interest of Frontier Airlines, based in Denver. After building Frontier to a prosperous company, he sold it in order to buy National Airlines, the airline he now is guiding to greater success. As president of National Airlines he is the youngest president of any trunk airline in the nation, (40 years-old).

National is now the sixth largest airline, which last year flew 3,983,000 passengers and Maytag's plans for it and the airline industry are formidable and will bear watching. Bud Maytag can fly any jet airliner flying commercially today . . . he has the necessary credentials to speak with authority on this subject.

Guest Editorial

"A GIFT FROM A NEIGHBOR...AND WHAT IT MEANS TO YOU"



An "Intensive Care Unit On Wheels" is being assembled right now at the Rancho Santa Fe Fire Station. It will be equipped to save life where it is humanly possible . . . and to make available the very best of care for any accident or illness. The unit will be used on emergency

runs through the Ranch area when time and immediate treatment are important factors. The rig, when equipped, will be the only one of its kind in the world — a traveling surgery capable of handling up to three patients at one time and mobile enough to arrive at the accident scene within minutes.

The idea was first promoted by a Rancho Santa Fe physician, Dr. Quentin Wood. A guest at his home collapsed, was sent by ambulance to the nearest hospital, and unfortunately died there. There are many emergency cases where a delay of 30 minutes enroute to a hospital (before treatment can be started) means loss of the accident victim, Dr. Wood explained. Rancho Santa Fe and other inland areas are approximately 30 minutes from hospitals in the region. The main idea, according to Dr. Wood, is to get the equipment needed to do a tracheotomy, defibrillate a heart and even start intravenous fluids . . . all in one place right at home!

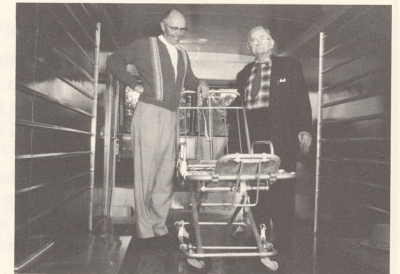
The nearest Intensive Care Unit is at an area hospital — about 30 minutes away. This can be a true life saving half hour. Assuming, in an emergency, the doctor and/or the Fire Department is called. Next an ambulance must be called from the coast (15 minutes away). Finally the victim is rushed frantically to the hospital. This first half hour is too often the crucial time when every second counts, when all available help is needed and no time should be lost. It is a fact that the doctors of Rancho Santa Fe and the Fire Department personnel have had to become extra-ordinarily competent and responsive in emergencies because time runs out so fast!

The unit will contain three beds, air conditioning, running water, oxygen, refrigeration, self-contained AC and DC power, and will carry portable equipment that can be rushed to the scene on the van and then hand carried to spots inaccessible to

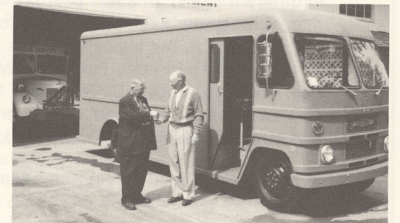
the unit. Its drawers and shelves will contain the instruments, drugs and equipment needed to stop a hemorrhage, restart a stricken heart, take an electrocardiogram, give oxygen and, in fact, provide just about any emergency procedure needed to revive a patient in danger of dying.

The work of building up the unit and fitting the equipment is being done by Fire Department personnel and I am very proud to give this my personal supervision.

The van-like emergency unit is a gift to the Fire Department and to the Community from Leon Janinet, a retired ranch resident, whose thoughtful generosity will bring life-saving benefits to all of us . . . a vigilant "intensive care unit on wheels"—ready every minute, every hour, every day.

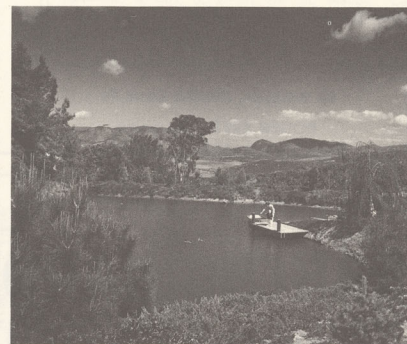
In the adjoining formal dining room the magnificent crystal chandelier dominates the room.

Because I feel the need to be traveling (my thoughts are of misty Scottish moors; English lanes seen softly pastel through gentle rains; April showers in other, unfamiliar, parts of the world.) I want a coat which will travel lightly, in every weather, through Spain to Big Sur.

Security First National Bank Holds Annual Meeting

LOS ANGELES—Frederick G. Larkin, Jr., president of Security First National Bank, told shareholders attending the bank's annual meeting on Tuesday (March 14) that 1967 holds promise of being another good year for the bank, although "a substantial increase in earnings seems highly improbable . . ."

In addressing the stockholders, Larkin said that based on "developments since the beginning of 1967, it is quite clear that this year (1967) will be no carbon copy of 1966. Federal Reserve policy has softened, rather than hardened. This moderate turn towards ease is in recognition of a faltering in many areas of the private sector of the economy.

"What the effect on our earnings will be is hard to say," Larkin stated. "The question is: Will competitive forces reduce rates more on loans and investments than on savings and time deposits? This

is difficult to answer," he added.

The annual meeting, held at the bank's head office, was presided over by Lloyd L. Austin, chairman of the board, and all 25 directors of the bank were re-elected.

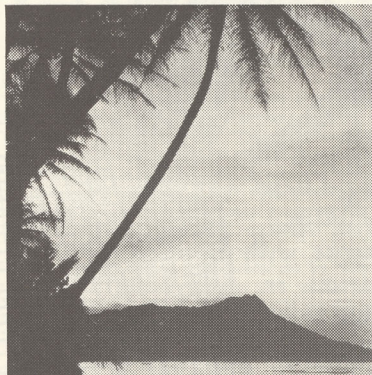
Commenting on 1966, Larkin said that earnings for the year totaled a record \$39 million, up more than 15 percent over 1965.

He said approximately \$14.5 million in cash dividends was paid to shareholders, a record high that marked the 15th consecutive year of increased cash dividends. Capital funds also increased to a record \$352 million.

In addition to this progress, there were other reasons to regard 1966 as a year in which the bank performed favorably, he said. "This has to do with maintaining a strong liquidity position throughout the entire so-called 'tight money' period of 1966."

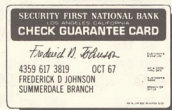

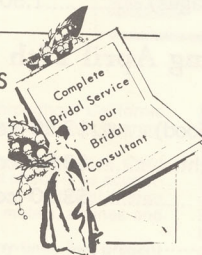

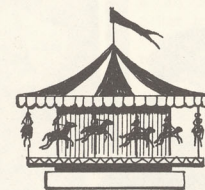

THE DECORATIVE MERRY-GO-ROUND

A column called *The Decorative Merry-go-round* needs some explaining. Aside from the fact that the carousel horses which were in our windows seem to have become our signature, there is another reason for the title.

Interior design is an endlessly turning, delightfully changing, carousel of trends and styles, turning up each year something different from the last. And it is a revolving process. Eventually what has gone before whirls back to us again, refurbished and re-adapted to our way of living at the time.

Take, for instance, today's trend toward Traditional. Before the war there was very little decor that wasn't Eighteenth Century based. Then, after the war, came the rebellion. We plunged into the purely functional. We scoffed at "dust-catchers," eschewed ornamentation, straightened our lines and struck out with such new materials as plywood and plastics. We preached practicality, and unclutteredness and worshipped at the shrines of

Charles Eames, Hans Knoll and other great designers of the time. They still are good, but now, inevitably, the merry-go-round has turned again, keeping the best of their designs but offering us Traditional re-stated, from Elizabethan to Georgian.

However, the over-burdened ornamentation of the past has been refined. The "new" Traditional has all the glamour of the "old" — the formality and richness of a gracious age — but we have adapted it somewhat. Our tastes, conditioned by the last turn of the carousel, care more for the simplicity of an Adams or a Hepplewhite than for some of the more intricate designs of a Chippendale.

An original Chippendale in all its turned and ornamented glory is a beautiful thing, but today's designers are taking these lovely old designs and pacing them to our more restrained sense of line, without losing the original effect.

So, the old is back. Fresh off the decorative merry-go-round it is also new.

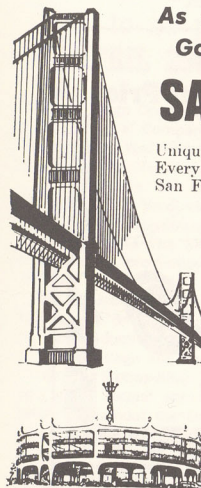

THE OPERA GUILD

With the spectacular American Premier of "The Young Lord" by the San Diego Opera still a provocative memory, the Rancho Santa Fe Associates of the San Diego Opera Guild are looking forward to April 25th and the third Opera of this season. The San Diego Opera will sponsor an appearance of the Metropolitan Opera National Company in "La Traviata."

The National Company's initial appearance in February of 1966 proved the ensemble concept of this bright new company to be well conceived, properly executed and most appealing.

Set in the time of Louis XIV in and around Paris, "La Traviata" is a touching story of love triumphing briefly over social order. Mrs. William Jack will again be taking reservations for the Interpretation Series lecture in the House of Hospitality, Balboa Park, at 11:00 on April 24th and also the no-host luncheon which follows.

This year brings another San Diego Guild First with the annual meeting and installation of officers held as a Luncheon and Reception for new members.

Mr. W. Allen Perry, President and Mrs. Carl M. Hillenbrand, 1st Vice-President and Social-Coordinator have announced the appointment of Mrs. John Northall Williams as chairman of this event which will be held on April 10th at the Hanalei Hotel. This gala event will include a no host social hour and an outstanding program by Mr. Dean Dierks, Music Critic for the San Diego Union.

"LA TRAVIATA" to be presented APRIL 25th and 26th

The San Diego Opera will present the Metropolitan Opera National Company in Verdi's "La Traviata" Tuesday and Wednesday, April 25 and 26, in the San Diego Civic Theatre at 8:30 p.m.

Marilyn Niska will sing the celebrated role of Violetta in the Verdi classic, marking her second Civic Theatre appearance since she created the role of Mimi in The San Diego Opera's premiere Civic Theatre production of "La Boheme" in May of 1965.

The following week — Thursday and Saturday, May 4 and 6—the San Diego Opera will present its own production of "Tosca" featuring Jean Fenn, Placido Domingo and Chester Ludgin.

For the Metropolitan Opera National Company, now in its second season of major opera presentation throughout the United States under the management of Rise Stevens and Michael Manuel, Robert La Marchina will conduct the Metropolitan Opera National Company orchestra in the presentation of "La Traviata."

Miss Niska will be joined by a combination of the 27 principal artists who constitute the company travelling ensemble.

"La Traviata" will be staged by Yoshio Aoyama, a director, dancer, and opera librettist connected with the Kabuki Theatre in Japan. Mr. Aoyama has worked in Italy, France and Germany. An international authority on "Madame Butterfly," Mr. Aoyama's version for the company's repertoire last

Dr. Cropp serves the United Presbyterian Church as a member of several committees of Los Angeles Presbytery. He is a member and Vice President of the Board of Trustees of the San Francisco Theological Seminary located at San Anselmo, California. He has written many articles for the religious press.

Rev. and Mrs. Roland Anderson and their two daughters were granted an early vacation by the Session, the governing body of the Village Church, for a six-week tour of Europe. The last week of their vacation they shall be joining with other couples from the Ranch, in the Rotary Convention in Nice, France. PAW PRINTS

(translated by Jan Cantwell)

You wouldn't look at the camera either, if you had been as humiliated as I have been. Can you imagine? — a dignified and self-respecting little girl dog being captured in a cat trap!! I'm not sure I'll ever get over such shame. Of course I'm not really much of a dog — only about five or six pounds worth I guess. But considering that I'm part miniature Pinscher and part Chihuahua, my size (or rather it's lack) is really quite proper.

Anyway, what I lack in stature I more than make up for in brains. The people here at the Rancho Coastal Humane Society say that I must be a very clever and resourceful little dog to have survived the dangerous life I was living. I was hopelessly lost and for at least three months made my home in the brush between two large highways in San Diego. Everything was so frightening, and I had to eat such horrible things. Fortunately I'm so little I don't need much to eat, and believe me, I didn't get very much. Then some kind ladies found out about me and tried to feed me. I was too frightened to make friends or let them near me, but I was grateful for the food they put out and always ate it after they had gone away. Then one day the people at this Shelter loaned the ladies a cat trap in which they put some irresistible tidbits (I think it was liver) and so here I am!

After my arrival the first few moments were really terrifying — I was afraid they not only had caught me in a cat trap, but that they intended to cage me next to one!!!! (I should have known better, but fear does things to one's imagination.) A little Persian kitten about seven weeks old was caged right next to me before we were given our proper places to live. She was in such frightful pain she couldn't talk very much, but I gathered that she had been found in a field all alone and injured. I heard the people here say something about a broken cartilage in her hind leg. I felt so sorry for her — she really had been worse off than I because she couldn't even hunt for food. Although

I frankly don't care for cats (the big ones terrify me), this was the cutest kitten I had ever seen. She was just a little bundle of long, soft, pretty fur with big sad eyes. Someone should take good care of her and give her a loving home.

After I got over the initial terror and indignity of my capture, I made friends here at the Shelter very quickly. Everyone was so kind and gentle — I didn't even mind getting shots! Things have settled into a comfortable routine for me now. You have no idea how wonderful it is to have regular meals and a nice warm clean place to sleep until you've been without them.

I must admit that even now I'm easily frightened, but you would be too if everybody around you was two or three or more times your size. Fortunately my roommate is not too large. She's a "Cocker-Poo" and is really very nice for a long-haired dog. Around the corner there is an adorable boy Puli, who is just about my age and is loving and friendly even though he was cruelly abandoned by his family. He sits up and waves his furry little fore-paws when he wants to talk to people. I think he would love to live with children and play with them.

I guess that some of the dogs have been here for a long time. Angel, the lovely Weimaraner pup lost her litter and is now trying to recover from a terrible case of worms. The poor thing is very thin and yet so dear and friendly. The big Blue Tick hound is still here too, and probably will be until he improves his table manners. He said that he feels so much better than he did a month ago that he just can't eat fast enough. Of course boy dogs never are as dainty as we girls are.

The last author and her little puppy found happy homes and I hope to have the same good fortune. I do so wish for a nice quiet lap and someone who will be gentle and not frighten me. I would love that person very much and, if they'd let me, I'd would kiss them gently on the ear.

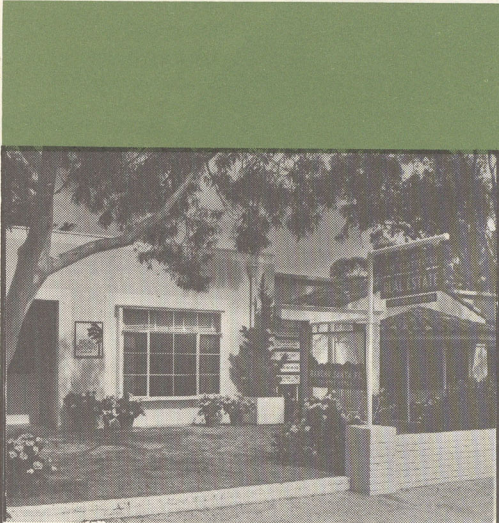
